Innovation & Makerspace @ Cal Poly Humboldt Library

With each new year, we have an opportunity to reflect on our accomplishments and to consider the future. As we celebrate this new academic year, we recognize an important milestone: the Library is fully open this fall after being closed for two prior fall semesters. We are open again much stronger with the Seismic Retrofit of the building. So you might be wondering what is next at the Library?

I invite you to be a part of that conversation, as we continue to build the Library as the heart of the University, an inspiring place for students to learn and research, and a safe place to explore and connect ideas. We welcome your thoughts about the road ahead, and would like to share some works in progress:

- We publish over 600 authored works a year, thanks to the Press at Cal Poly Humboldt (formerly HSU Press). We teach student assistants publishing skills to support a vision of providing every student the opportunity to publish before they graduate. On the horizon, we also look forward to publishing Jerry Rohde's three-book series detailing the fascinating history of our region.
- Librarian Janet Calderon is renovating The Brain Booth, seeking your input, and exploring new ideas. Also, try out the new cycling desk that monitors your heart rate while you are reading or researching with a laptop.
- We are supporting faculty in evaluating and creating open educational resources to replace expensive textbooks that present financial barriers to student success. So in addition to providing over 1,000 textbooks on reserve, we are helping innovate free textbooks with faculty.
- The Library Makerspace has grown from pop-up to dedicated space outfitted with new 3D printers and a suite of expanded resources and services, including a VR station, music recording station, green screen room, and more.

The Library Makerspace is an important interdisciplinary active learning environment providing resources and a gathering place to imagine, explore, create, design, and iterate; along the journey, students learn collaboration and fabrication skills. This expands the opportunity for students to learn hands-on and creative skills, developing problem solving and experimentation skills, as well as design thinking and 3D modeling skills. We offer students access to the latest technologies for self-directed learning opportunities, to develop prototypes, or explore fabrication at the Library.

Cal Poly Humboldt Library is one of

the most innovative libraries in California, thanks to the dedicated library staff and faculty who collaborate to research, design, and build this interdisciplinary learning and research environment, welcoming everyone to connect people and ideas. Many of the positive changes in the Library are based in applied research, from information resource cost/use studies, to seating analysis. We actively AB Test innovative ideas at the Library. Currently, you can find three different types of monitors in the Library computer lab: futuristic curved monitors, large flat screens, and dual monitors. All are available to determine students' favorite digital displays to research with.

This fall, as Project Sponsor, I am working with three Computer Science student teams developing innovative software to address challenges in need of prototype solutions. The Humboldt County GIS Data Archive will prototype a dynamic interface that will visualize geographical data as select layers that include historical maps, photos, and GIS project data such as invasive species or hydrology reports, all from a touchscreen. The second touchscreen project, similarly inspired by the digital dissection table, is the Flora Digital Herbarium, seeking to cultivate learning and discovery

by creating interactive 3D models of flowers or redwood trees, adding many complex layers of visual data about the plants. The third project focuses on continued development of Citing Insights, student writing assessment software designed by library student assistants in 2019.

In addition, Cal Poly Humboldt Library, in partnership with the College of the Redwoods and Humboldt County Public Libraries, is requesting federal funding to develop entrepreneurship networking and library services that strengthen partnerships with local agencies, focus on supporting underserved populations, and support an inclusive entrepreneurial and innovation ecosystem.

You are invited to explore the Library Makerspace, check out the technologies, design and create prototypes, test ideas, research, and share your projects during ideaFest. Visit ideafest.humboldt.edu for more information. Each spring, this lively

event showcases the research, performances, digital projects, and scholarship of our University, celebrating the amazing work of this academic year.

Most recently, we celebrated the Library's seismic retrofit with a ribbon cutting. This construction enabled us to create other transformations, including a new Special Collections space, the Center for Teaching and Learning, and more. As we curate research and learning experiences, connecting people and ideas, we foster a continual innovative and inclusive Cal Poly Humboldt Library.

The Press at Cal Poly Humboldt offers digital versions of all of our publications in PDF form, and our new fiction books (and some non fiction titles) are also made into reflowable eBooks so that they may be enjoyed on multiple eReaders and platforms. Now you can read our novels on a Kindle, phone, Nook, KOBO, on Apple Books app, or any other eBook reader. There are many free readers available for download as well. (We like Calibre: calibre-ebook.com)

eBooks differ from their PDF counterparts in a few ways:

- They reflow as you read, so that you can view them in any size.
- You can bookmark them and come back to your spot.
- You can make the font larger or smaller depending on your needs.
- You can put them in night mode so that the print is white and the page is black (handy for reading in bed).
- You can use an interactive table of contents.

What is it?

Centered on the idea that the mind-body connection must be nurtured and sustained to support holistic health and wellbeing, the Brain Booth is a drop-in space in the Library with mindfulness activities and wellness pick-me-ups. 
We asked students **“What did you see at one of our tables that will be a useful resource for you during the year?”** Here’s what they said:

The Library Makerspace has moved and expanded our offerings! Find the Makerspace on the second floor in room 205 and the surrounding area near the whiteboard study spaces. The Makerspace hours are posted regularly on the whiteboard located outside the room. The flight simulator, virtual reality, and augmented reality sandbox stations have moved with us, and we now have a collage and zine making station available for you to make unique paper prototypes, creations, and do-it-yourself publications. An audio workstation for creating and editing music and other audio projects is newly available in the Makerspace. Feel free to use the stations located outside the Makerspace classroom at any time when the Library is open. The Makerspace has several additional locations in the Library on the first floor. The Makerspace Studio (room 120, libguides.humboldt.edu/thestudio) has a green screen, photo light booth, lighting, and video recording/editing station. The Makerspace Computer Lab (room 122) has new Mac Minis and Windows PCs for your digital media projects, such as photography, video/audio editing, or animation.

SkillShops Help Students Take Control of their Academic Careers

We are excited to announce that in-person SkillShops are back! Keep an eye on the SkillShops calendar to see what will be available throughout the semester (libguides.humboldt.edu/skillshops). The Library offers topics like 3-2-OneSearch, where you'll learn how to navigate searching for articles, books, and more with the Library's OneSearch online catalog. The Learning Center is offering a variety of learning and study SkillShops, including *Time Boxing* and *Pomodoro Retrieval Power Boosts*. New SkillShops will continue to be added as the semester progresses, so don't forget to check the calendar. We look forward to seeing you in person at a SkillShop soon!

We're also proud to share that our asynchronous online Canvas SkillShops are continuing after a year that saw the most online participation in our history, with a 24% increase from the previous year, for a total of 2,049 attendees.

2021-22 Year in Review

During the 2021-22 year, 2,882 people attended SkillShops through live Zoom and asynchronous Canvas SkillShops. While many students attended more than one SkillShop, 30% of all Cal Poly Humboldt students participated in at least one SkillShop. Almost 1 in 3 Cal Poly Humboldt students completed one or more SkillShop during the 2021-22 year!

We offer 17 different free Canvas SkillShops that can be completed at your own pace and are awarded a badge upon completion as a way to share what you've learned. In AY2021/2022, 2,049 badges were awarded to learners who completed these asynchronous offerings. Just a few of these SkillShops topics include: Writing With Sources, Research Basics, Zotero Citation Management, APA/MLA/Chicago Citations, Career Values, Making Academic Posters, Video Storytelling, and Podcast Basics.




The Brian D. Tripp Papers

The Cal Poly Humboldt Library is excited to announce that the Brian D. Tripp Papers will soon be available to researchers in Special Collections. Tripp was a renowned Karuk painter, sculptor, poet, activist, and singer. His work was exhibited at the American Indian Contemporary Arts, the C. N. Gorman Museum, and the New Museum in New York and can be found in the permanent collections of the Crocker Art Museum, the Denver Art Museum, and the Oakland Museum of California. In 2021, the Goudi'ni Gallery had an exhibition that celebrated five decades of Tripp's artwork, which highlighted Karuk worldview and culture through visual imagery, material, and story. In 2018 Tripp received the California Living Heritage Award for his transformative cultural and artistic leadership. Tripp was instrumental in the revival of Karuk ceremonies and dances, and was an activist for Indigenous rights and sovereignty.

The Brian D. Tripp Papers reflect a lifetime of creative work. It includes research notes, publications, journals, correspondence, and other documents that reflect his process as an artist. There are also photographs of Tripp, and artwork created in a variety of media. The collection is organized and described by archivist Susan Gehr, who knew Tripp personally and worked with Tripp and his family to support the collection coming to Cal Poly Humboldt. This collection will be available to researchers soon, so please look for more information in the Library's Spring 2023 newsletter.

Fred Korematsu was an American civil rights activist who stood up to the U.S. government's wrongful incarceration of over 120,000 people of Japanese ancestry living on the West Coast during WWII. Even though Fred was vilified and ostracized by his Japanese American community and had no support from his family, he was not afraid to speak up. He knew the government had violated the civil rights of thousands of its citizens and immigrants when it forced them to leave their homes and live in remote incarcerations camps.

For those who would like to register to vote, go to registertovote.ca.gov or drop by the Library Nordstrom Lobby to pick up a physical voter registration form at the front Checkout desk. These forms are available in both English and in Spanish. Upon completion, voter registration forms can be dropped in the mail; postage is free.
