Meeting almost monthly the College Advisory Board has assisted in the study and solution of a number of community-related problems of the College and its student body activities. The board has been instrumental in setting up an assistance budget to be used for such projects and activities that cannot be entirely borne by the student body or which cannot be paid for by the College budget. Financial aid has been made available for the news bureau, band uniforms, spring sports training table, the choir tour, conservation projects, partial salary of the Executive-Manager of the student body and other worthwhile endeavors. The officers of the H S C. Board are Mr. Don O'Kane, chairman; Mr. G. Edward Goodwin, vice-chairman; Mr. Chester Connick, treasurer; and Dr. Cornelius H. Siemens, executive-secretary.

The Board lost one of its most active and effective members in the untimely death of Charles R. Barnum on March 1953, who in the last meeting he attended established an endowment which will provide an annual scholarship to a student making a contribution to the study of the history of Humboldt County.

Now in his third year as President of Humboldt State College Dr. Cornelius H. Siemens continues his lead in the program of College expansion and development which he inaugurated in 1950.

Three new campus buildings were completed in 1953 the new library a biological science building and the corporation house. Approval for construction of a fourth the half-million dollar wildlife management and fisheries building, has been obtained from the State Legislature for the near future.

The schedule of remodeling of offices and classrooms has been continued this year and re-landscaping of the College grounds will be undertaken this summer.

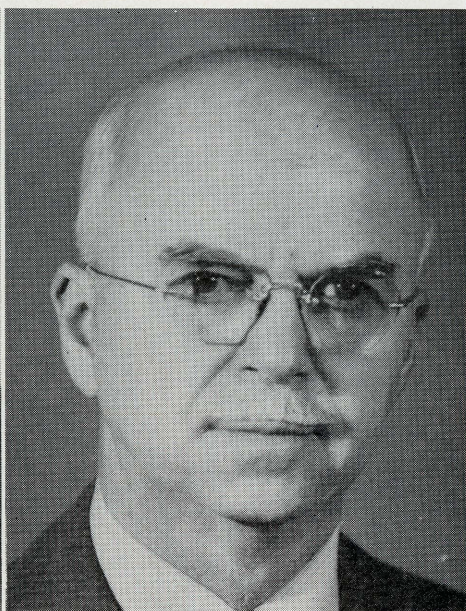
The course of instruction at the College has been expanded to meet the needs of students of Northwest California in such fields as lumbering, forestry, dairying and agriculture. A sizeable increase in the College staff has been approved for the enlarged curriculum and expanded campus. Also a revitalized intercollegiate and intramural program of athletics and other student activities is stimulating student morale and the interest of the public in HSC affairs.

With the cooperation of the State Legislature the leaders of industry, business and the professions in the area, President Siemens and the College Advisory Board are achieving steady advancement and expansion of our regional College.

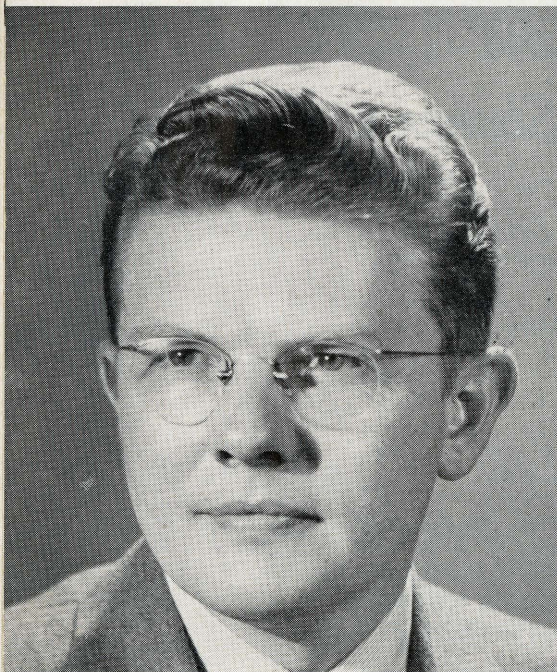

WOMAN OF THE YEAR

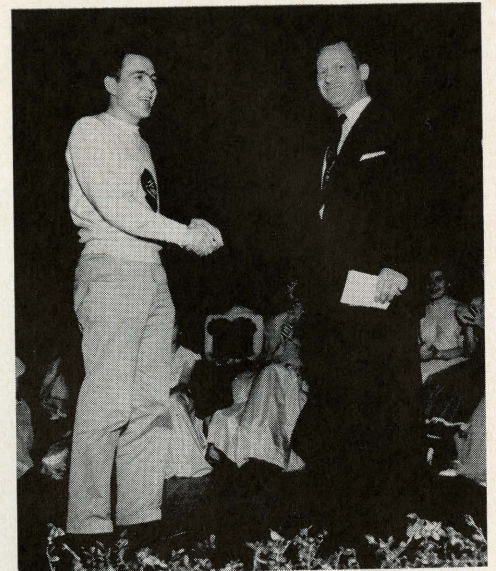
Miss Blanche Evans

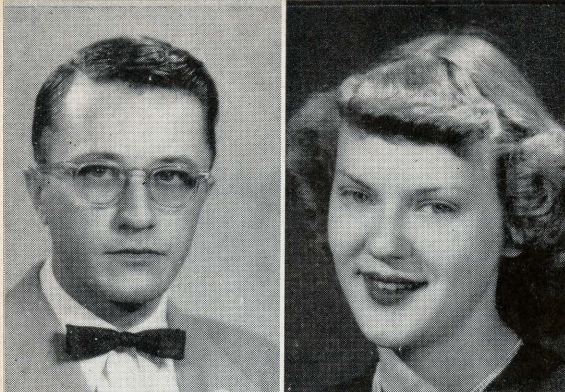

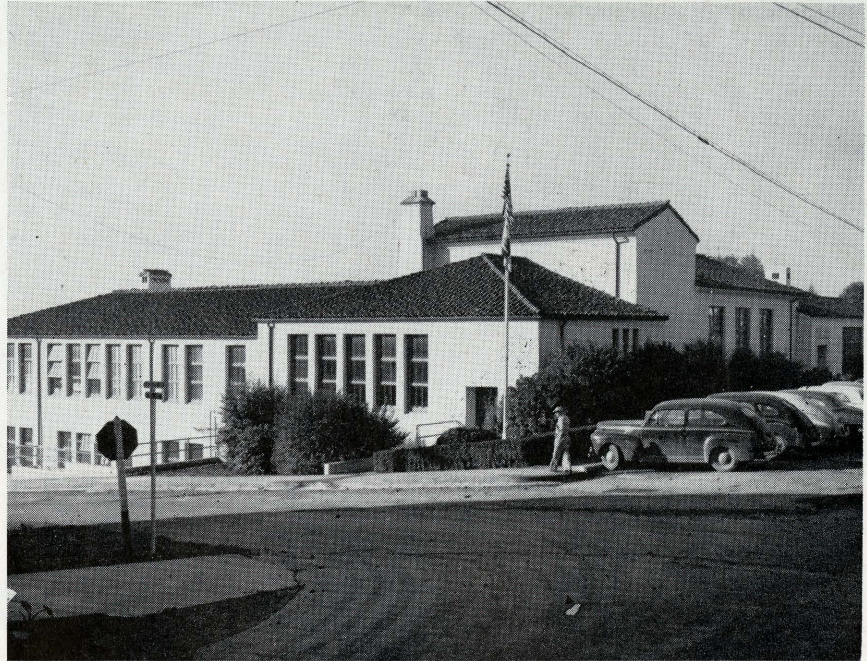


Elementary and

Teaching methods in various subjects as well as educational and child psychology are courses taught the prospective elementary and secondary school teacher in the College Administration Building.



Approximately one-third of the student body is enrolled in a teacher education program. The College maintains a large well-equipped elementary school on the campus, a short distance from the main building. It is here as well as in the schools of Eureka and Arcata through the cooperation of their school authorities, that the students practice teach under supervision for experience and training.



College Elementary School is maintained by HSC as a laboratory for the elementary teacher training program. Secondary teacher training is also a popular course of study. Besides the teaching credential, collegians can earn a Master's degree in education or in the social sciences.

Every phase of student teaching is practiced by Humboldt State College teacher candidates.

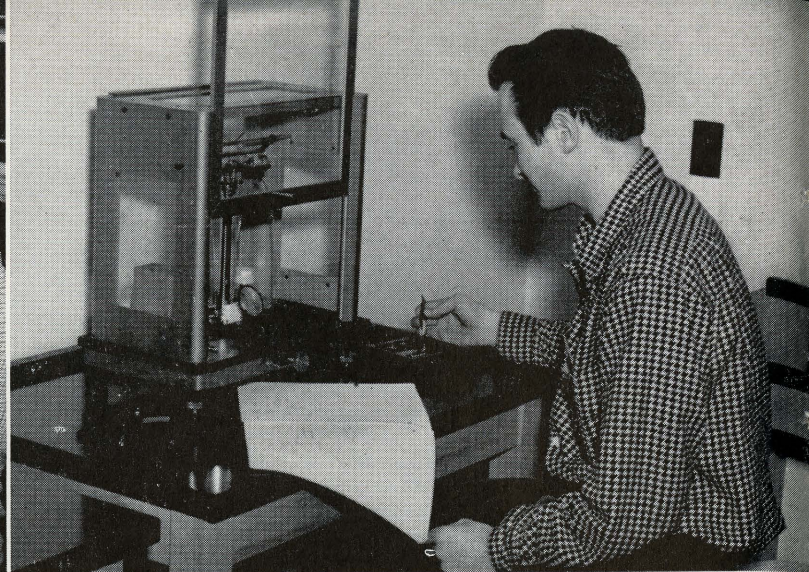

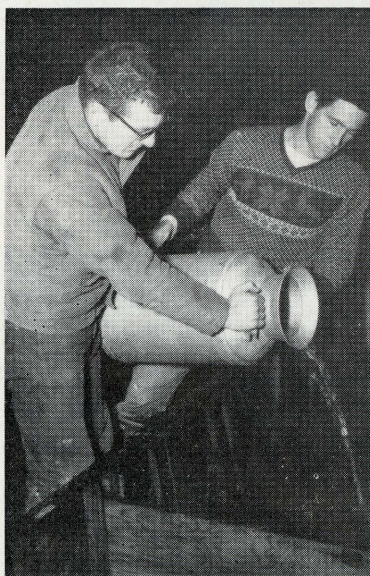

An ever-increasing number of fishermen has created a greater need for trained personnel in the field of fish management and research. It has been the main objective of the fisheries program at HSC which was instigated in 1939 to 'turn out' men who could ably compete with the 'best' in the country.

The College is ideally located in the heart of salmon and steelhead fishing and in an area which has one of the largest commercial fisheries on the West Coast. Thus, the student not only learns from books but through practical experience as well.

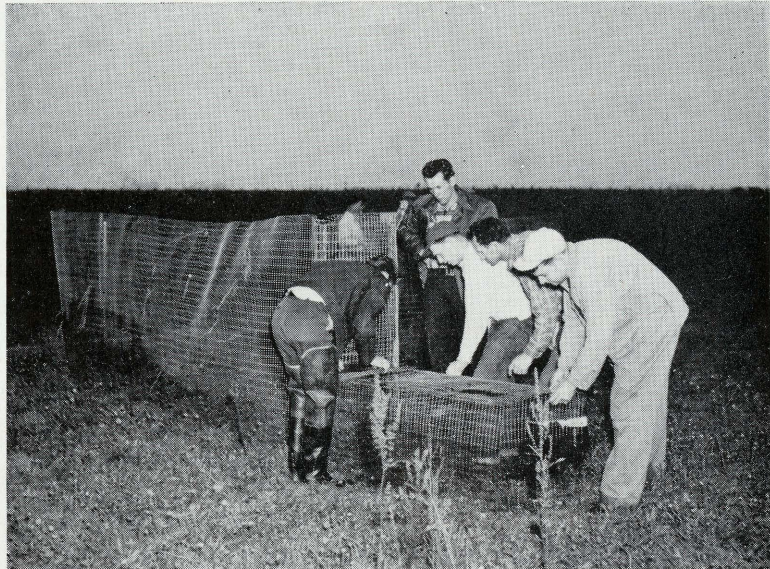

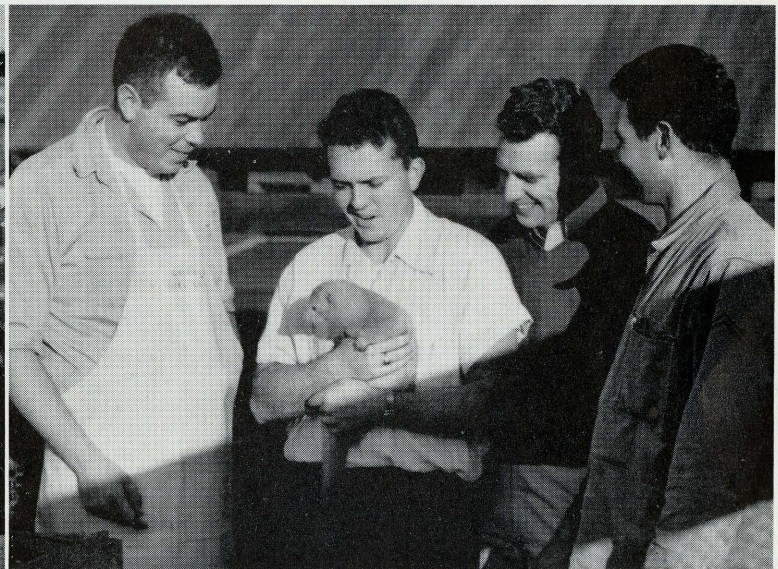

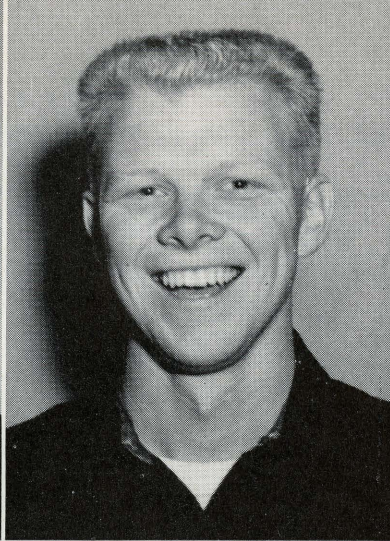

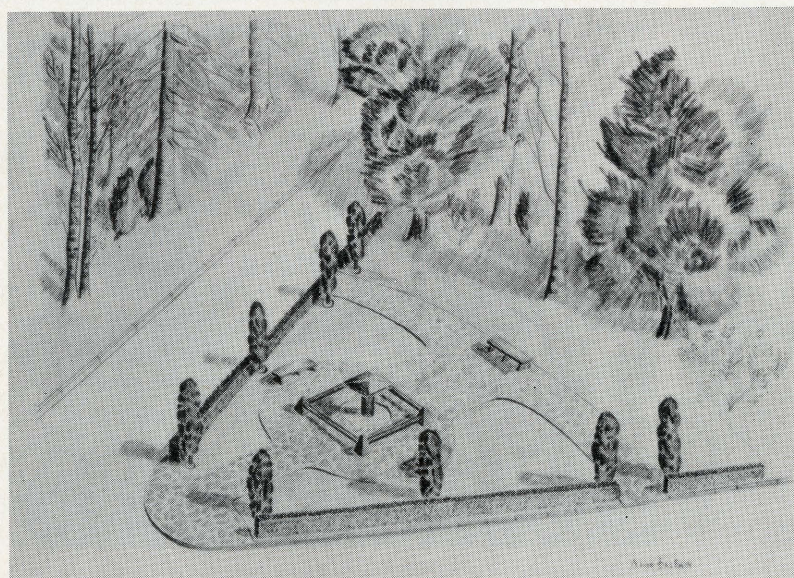

Drama

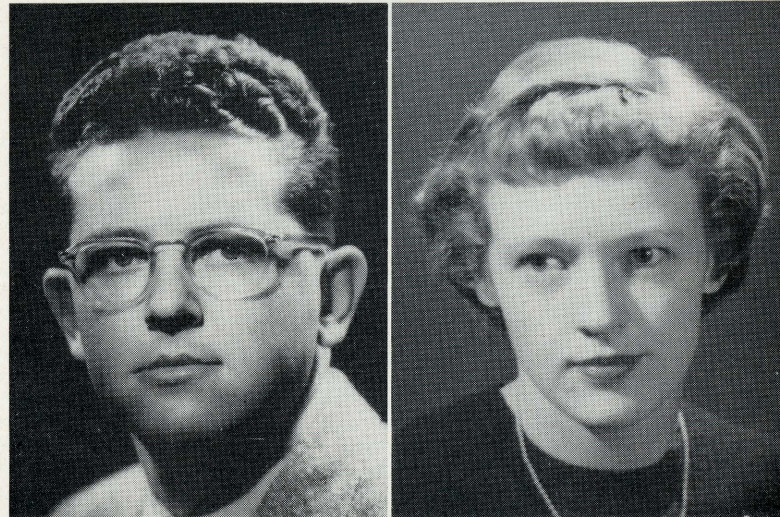
The Division of Fine and Applied Arts has many excellent courses in drama and stagecraft that enable Humboldt State College to present one of the outstanding programs in this field in Northern California.

This department regularly produces the road shows for the Greater Humboldt Committee; planned and staged the Seventh Annual Drama Festival in conjunction with Chico State College, hosting high schools in this area.

Other activities include the publishing of a drama news sheet called *Stage and Studio*, furnishing entertainment for community organizations, presenting two major productions, and graduate student-directed plays for public performance, which are teaching projects for the master's degree in education. During 1952-53 five original one-acts were presented, written by playwright students. On alternate years the music-drama divisions present musical-dramas.

Faculty-directed productions this year included *Our Town* and *The Curious Savage*, and the graduate student program was an evening of five one-act plays by Eugene O'Neill. Alpha Psi Omega, national dramatic honorary society, and the Drama Club, the two drama organizations on the campus.

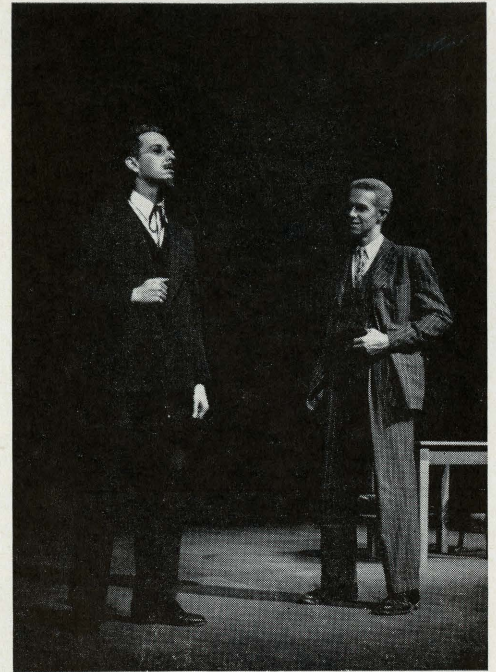

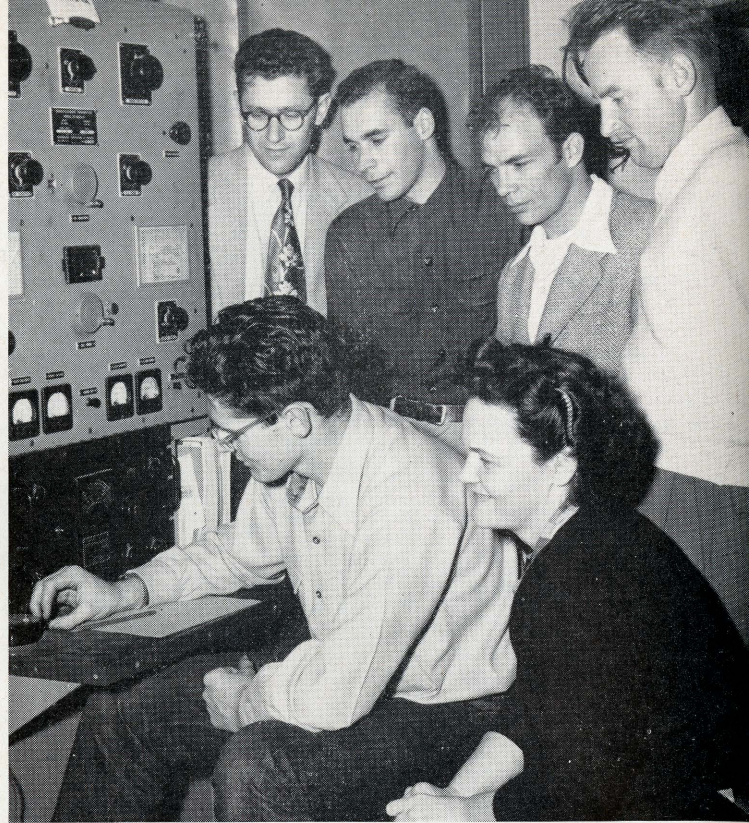

Drama Festival

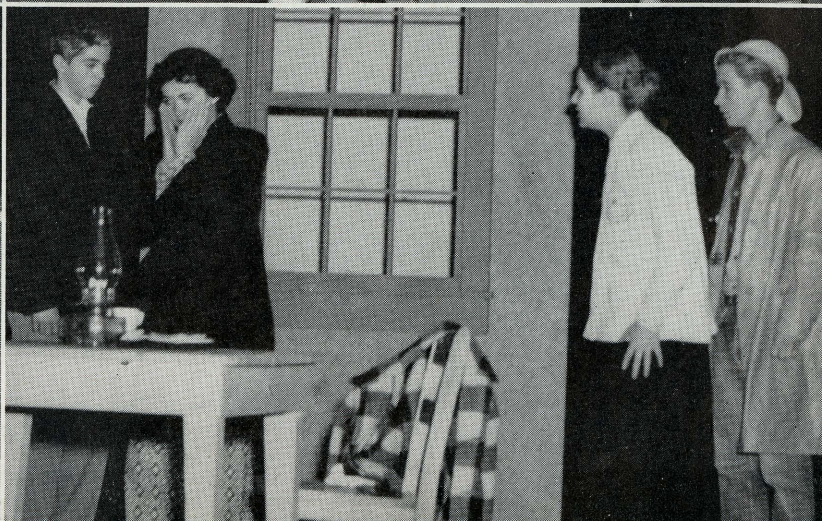
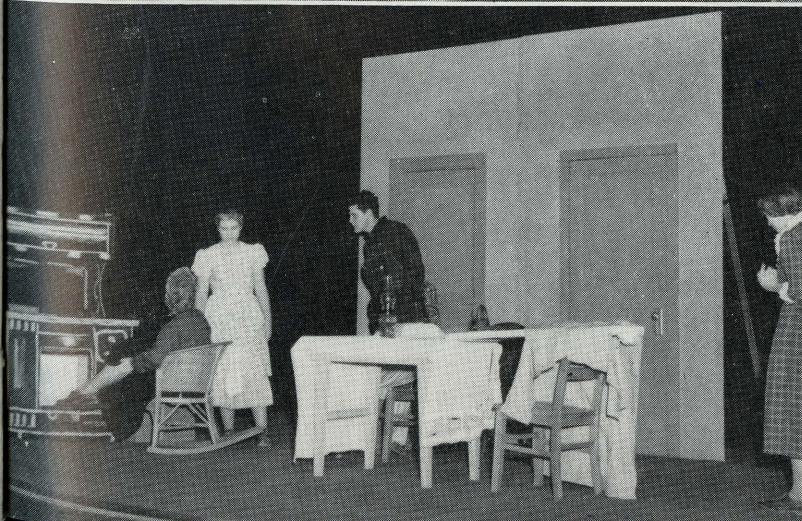

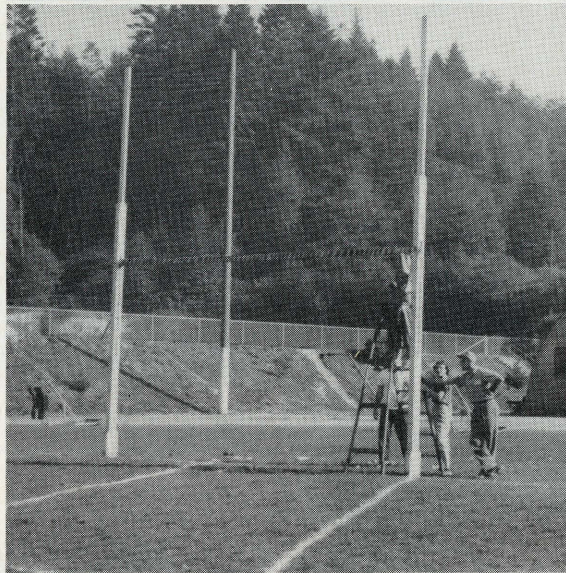

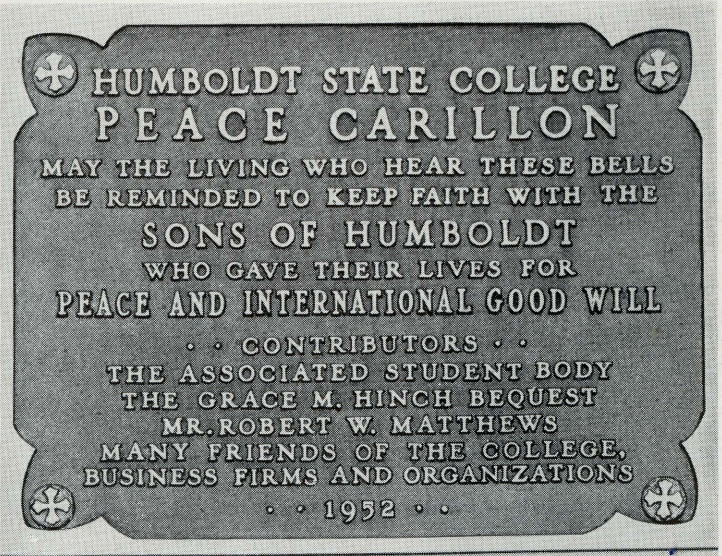

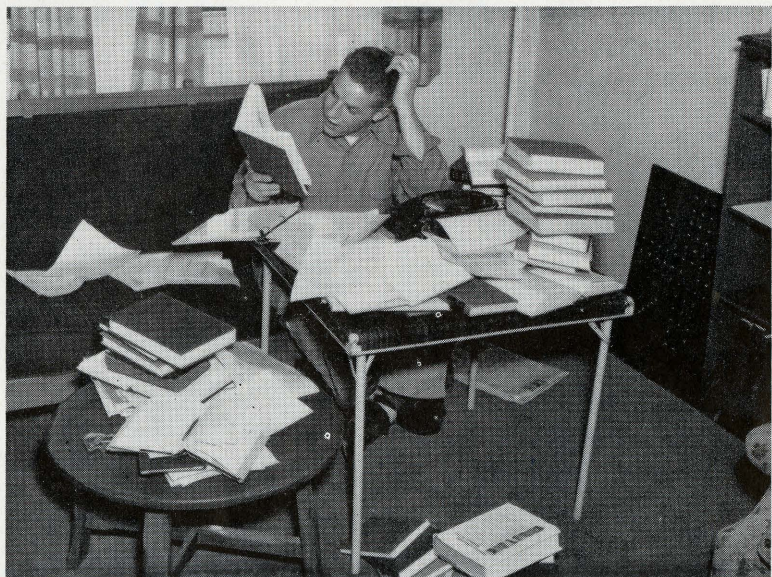

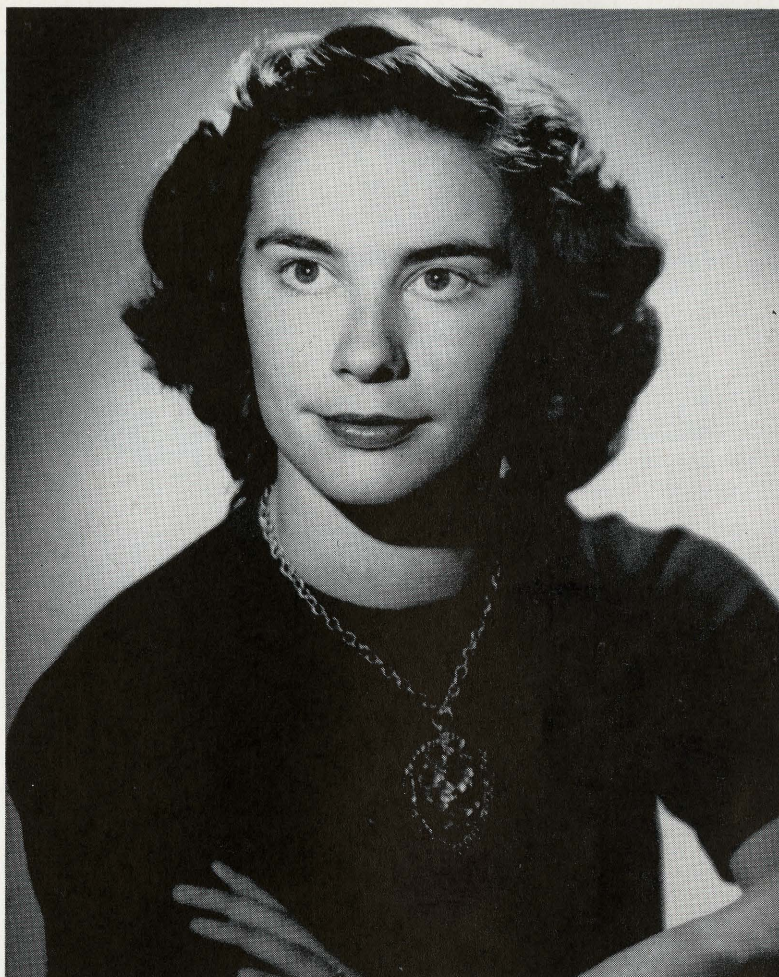


October 2 to 5

That is the football story for the Lumberjacks of Humboldt State College in 1952 second season under Coach Phil Sarboe. The most successful campaign in the history of the College

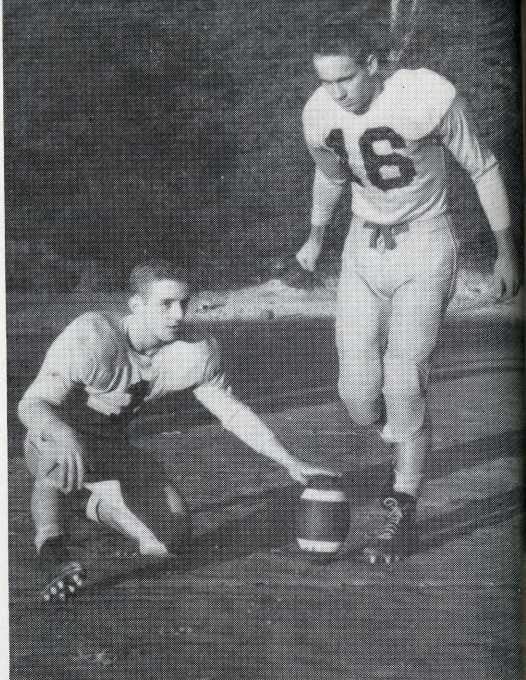

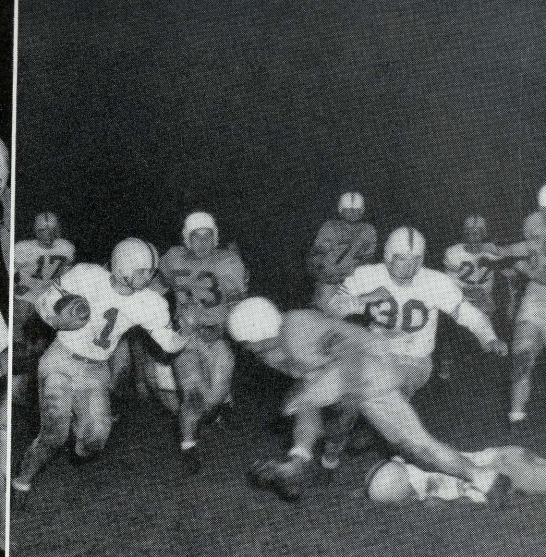

The Story of Champions

Champions in the making the Lumberjacks of 1952 had their few uncertain moments at the beginning of the season. Conditioning practice began September at the YMCA camp near Garberville. A short two weeks later the HSC boys opened against Oregon Tech in Albee Stadium showing their lack of offensive coordination in losing 7-6. Rudy Diaz' sensational diving catch for the touchdown was offset by the hard-driving Owls.

WIN OVER PACIFIC LUTHERAN

Uncertain offensive power again plagued the Jacks in the Pacific Lutheran College game. Neither team scored until late in the game but it was the Lutes who got six points first this time. On the succeeding kickoff with but minutes left to play freshman fullback Gale Drake took the Gladiators' boot on his 30 and threaded his way to an electrifying score. Dale Thomas too proved the margin.

KEEP AXE FROM CHICO

The traditional nine-foot axe of the Paul Bunyan country stayed with the Hiltoppers as a result of the 4-6 win over arch-rival Chico State College. Jerry Garcea had scored on a pass and Keith Darling had plunged from the 10, but the Jacks led by only one touchdown at the half. In the fourth period the Sarboe men let loose to add four more. Garcea and Darling each scored again and linebackers Bruce Freeman and Bob Dunaway intercepted passes and scored on 5-yard runs. Thomas kicked four points against the Wildcats.

SCALP RED RAIDERS

Eight players figured at least six points each in the 50-0 win over Southern Oregon College the second of three conference wins. Thomas had seven points to lead the pack three on a field goal and the rest on P.A.T.s. Touchdowns were made by halfbacks Jerry Garcea, Jim Alexander, Jim Conley, Hank Yamagata, and Rudy Diaz. Fullback Lee Marvel and end George Psaros had six points the latter catching a blocked Red Raider punt in the end zone. Alexander's 82-yard run and Marvel's 36-yard scamper were the standouts of the win.

DUCKLINGS SURPRISED

EMBARRASSING BRONCO WIN

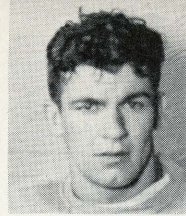

Substituting for the cancelled game against Eastern New Mexico University, George Pepperdine College came to Albee Stadium in Eureka to become the final victim of the high-scoring Lumberjacks in the full bloom of their offensive prowess. The score 47.

George Psaros' pass interception and 35-yard run had given the Jacks a 7-0 midpoint advantage over the Waves. Then the game broke wide open in the final two periods. Bob Dunaway gathered in a juggled pass for the second score followed by Psaros' repetition of another pass steal. The yearling speedsters Conley and Marvel added two more in the fourth on short plunges before Jim Ingram on a guard around play ran 69 yards for the longest run of the evening and the final score. Thomas kicked four P.A.T.s during the evening and Mechals caught a P.A.T. pass.

Thus ended Humboldt State College's 25th year of intercollegiate football with seven wins and one defeat—a fitting celebration for a Silver Anniversary.

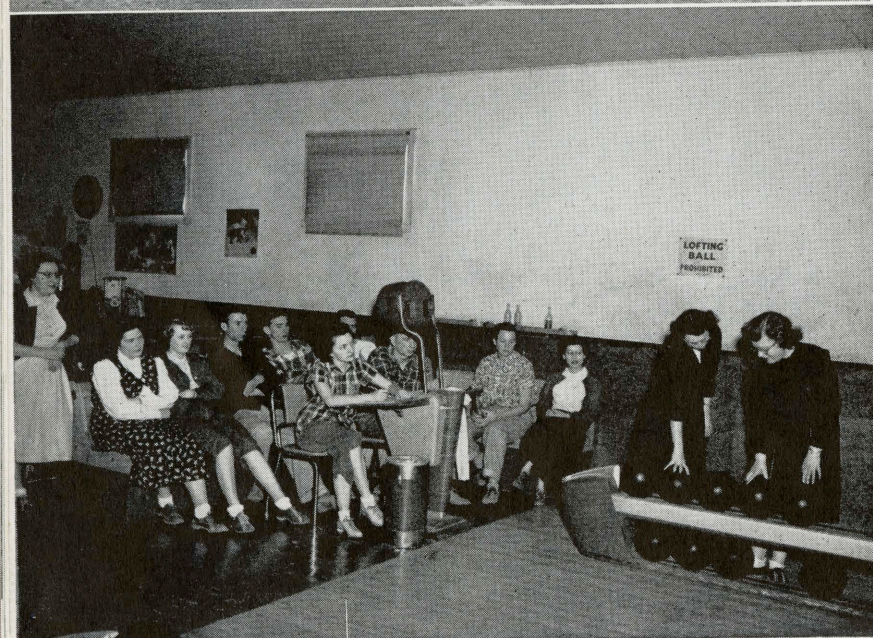

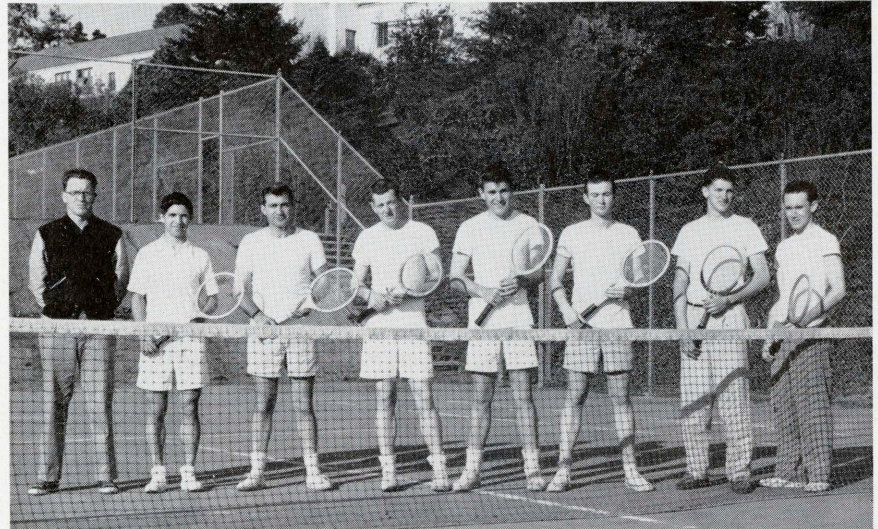

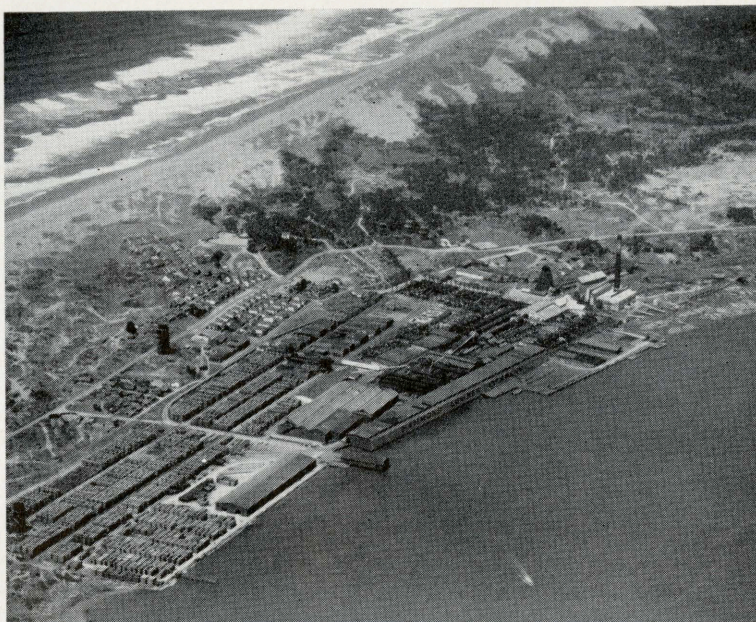

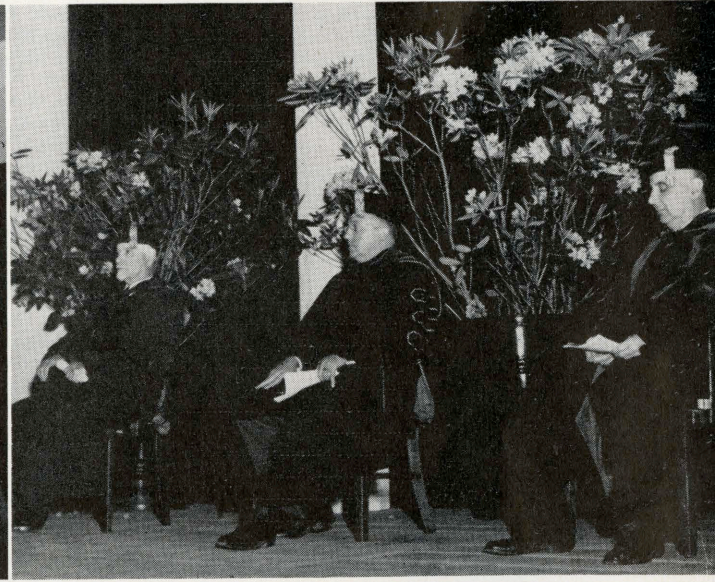
