Dedicated to Homer L. Arnold



The man of science who is also a man of letters can be said to have a breadth of learning not found in the thinking of many teachers of the world. Homer L. Arnold, in his 33rd year of class instruction to Humboldt State College students, believes like the 16th century's Sir Francis Bacon that a good man of science should be a man of philosophy.

The two fields of study were combined for Professor Arnold when he set to teaching in the southeast corner of the Humboldt Normal School Administration building in the fall of 1921. His courses in mathematics and philosophy were the only classes taught that first year in the new building not then completed. Other HSC classes were conducted in wooden structures in the surrounding area.

In the years to follow, the young College made good use of his broad educational background, which included both a Bachelor of Science degree from Indiana State Teachers College, a Bachelor of Arts from the University of Indiana, and a Master of Arts from the University of Chicago. He also took additional graduate work at Chicago, Stanford and Michigan.

At Humboldt Mr. Arnold was called on to teach 41 courses of study throughout the years, ranging from education, psychology, math, and philosophy to surveying and aerial navigation, just before the outbreak of World War II. In those days, he called himself the faculty "swing man," pertaining to the variety of courses he taught.

Speaking of those pioneer and hardship days, HSC's oldest instructor, in point of active teaching, reports that it was "very discouraging at Humboldt," and he says that he might have left if he hadn't liked the freedom and environment for his family. Now he is "sold" on Humboldt and enthusiastic concerning the future of the College and the area.

His two sons are Lt. Homer S. Arnold, a Navy doctor; Charles, a student at the University of California. His two daughters are Mrs. Helen Stover, of Santa Rosa, Calif., and Mrs. Elma Draut of Ukiah. All four attended Humboldt State for part of their college education.

If and when Humboldt's highly respected "dean" of faculty instructors decides to retire, his sly sense of humor and youthful laughter will not be forgotten by his students in the arts and sciences. In those freer days to come he plans to revise his syllabus into a philosophy textbook, pursue his hobby in lapidary, and perhaps do some travel in the U.S. and Mexico.

At the close of the College's 40th year, the remembrance of one, who has served the College and community so well almost the entire span of its growth and development, seems proper especially while he still serves.

Advisory Board

The College Advisory Board continues to play an active part in the development of the College. One of the main functions of the Board is to present the higher educational needs of Northwestern California to the College and also to interpret the College program to the lay public.

A program of discussion and action is formulated at its monthly meetings resulting in many benefits to the College program. These include advice on public-related matters, and financial aid for activities that cannot be borne by the State or for student body projects.

This year the Board has been enlarged to the statutory limit of 13 members with the appointment of Waldron Hyatt, Samoa; Don Larson, Eureka; William Patton, Fortuna and Edwin Fraser, Crescent City. Thus, the College has strong board representation from Ukiah to Crescent City and from the principal industries and professions of the region. The officers are: Don O'Kane, Chairman; G. Edward Goodwin, Vice Chairman; Chester Connick, Treasurer; Cornelius H. Siemens, Executive Secretary.

The Board representative for Del Norte County for the past six years, Henry Westbrook, Jr., was lost to the Board through his untimely death on December 31, 1953. He participated actively in the work of the Board and provided an annual scholarship to assist a worthy student.

Under the vigorous leadership of President Cornelius H. Siemens, the program of College expansion and development is making steady progress.

This year's highlight was the dedication in October of the new Library, Biological Science Building and the Corporation House. These modern structures added about 44,000 square feet of space or more than the entire College building. The Fish and Game Building and facilities to cost over \$500,000 will be under construction in 1954, giving Humboldt State the first building of its kind in the nation. It will permit the College to carry out more effectively its commission to train personnel in Wildlife Management and Fisheries for the entire State of California.

A major project of relandscaping large portions of the campus, repaving the main streets and adding several parking lots will be completed this year. The areas in front of the buildings will feature azalea, rhododendron, and other flowering and berry shrubs. Numerous other improvements on various parts of the campus are in progress or nearing completion.

A greatly increased freshman class resulted in a record Fall enrollment of 786 at HSC, the highest percentage gain in the State College system. The new programs in Forestry and Agriculture were begun with plans for expansion next year. Many other areas in the curriculum were strengthened and expanded by means of additional teaching staff and facilities.

The President has continued to encourage and develop a strong student activities program with emphasis upon balance among activities and wide student participation. As in the past few years the College Advisory Board has provided financial assistance for a number of student activities for which there are insufficient student funds.

"The State Legislature, through its annual appropriation now in excess of one million dollars, and the general support of industry, business and the professions in the area," stated President Siemens, "is making it possible for Humboldt State to provide a college education of high quality and at very little cost for every qualified youth in Northwestern California."

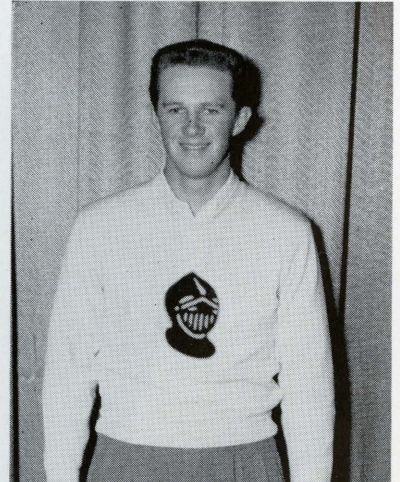

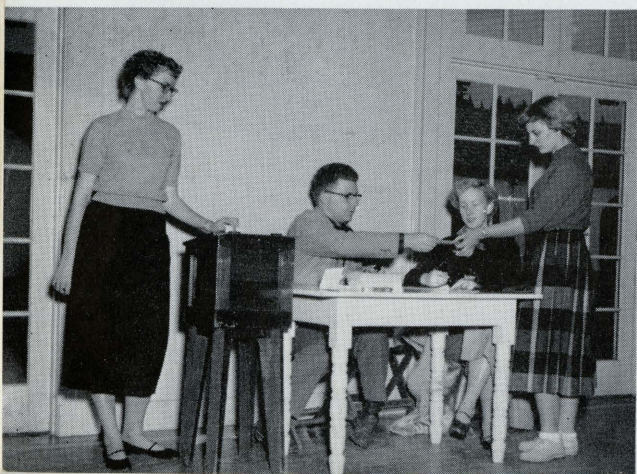

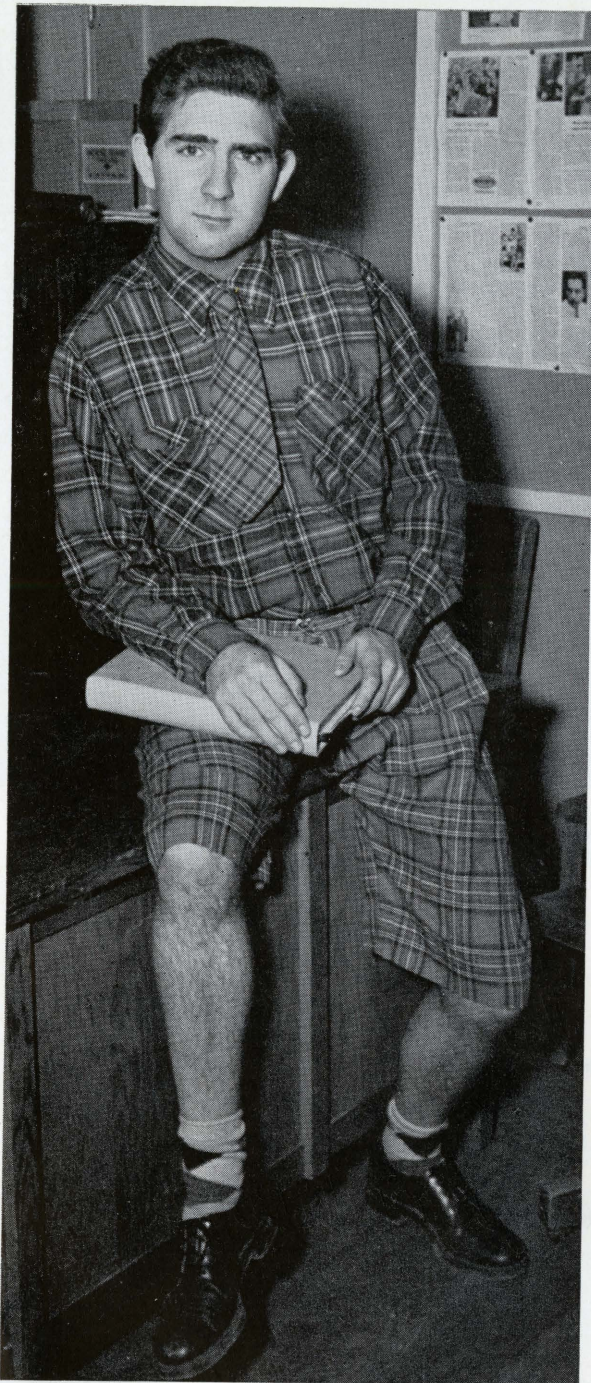

Forestry-Lumbering and Agriculture-Dairying are new two-year terminal curricula being offered for the first time at HSC.

With the cooperation of lumber and wood products firms, the Forestry-Lumbering course is important since HSC is located in a region of the last great stand of virgin timber in the United States with Douglas fir and Sequoia redwood.

The Agriculture program, in our area of fine dairy production, is designed to provide an understanding of the concepts underlying scientific land and crop management.

Both curricula programs give students a balanced training in classroom study and field experience.

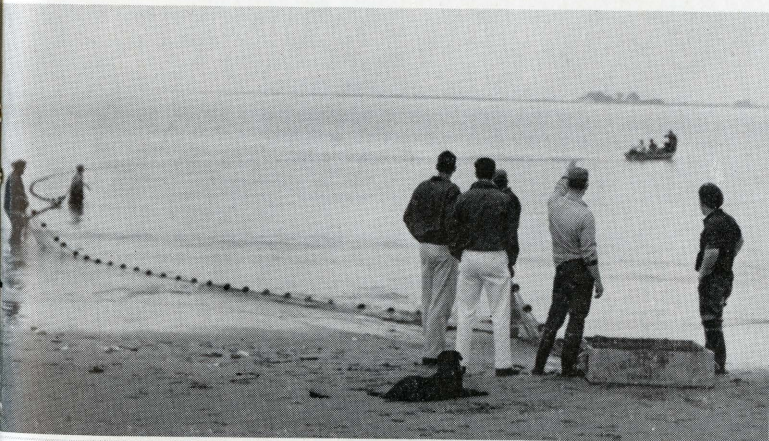

The Wildlife Management and Fisheries program at the College is one of great attraction to students from all parts of California and many other states. At present HSC offers the only bachelor of science degree in Game and Fish Management in the State.

The construction of a new wildlife building on the campus in the fall of this year will give HSC the only College building in the nation devoted completely to the study of fish and game. Rearing pens, breeding ponds, and other experimental facilities will be available.

The beautiful natural environment of the region provides a rich natural laboratory for the students' practical experience. In addition, wildlife and fisheries students assist State agencies in checking and research projects and in the promotion of conservation of natural resources in the United States.

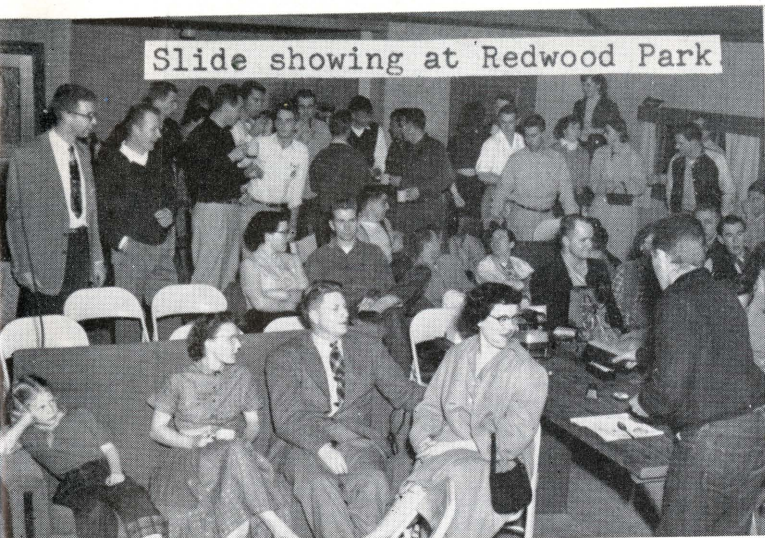

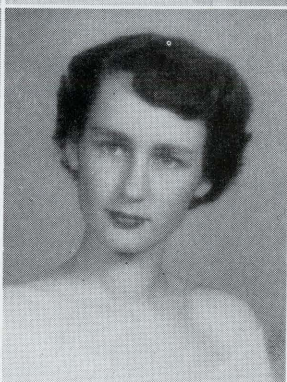

The Division of Fine and Applied Arts has many excellent courses in drama and stagecraft that enable Humboldt State College to present one of the outstanding programs in this field in Northern California.

Faculty-directed productions included Shakespeare's "Twelfth Night" which was presented at the College and toured high schools in Humboldt and Del Norte Counties. The Music and Drama Departments jointly presented Gilbert and Sullivan's "Iolanthe." In the spring "Room Service" was shown at the College and also taken to Chico as a contribution to the 13th Chico-Humboldt Drama Festival.

Seven student-written original one-act plays and three additional one-act plays were presented under the direction of upperclassmen and graduate students this year.

Other activities sponsored by the department included the Eighth Annual Northwestern California Drama Festival, which was attended by 250 delegates from ten regional high schools and community theatres; the publishing of a department bulletin called "Stage and Studio;" the furnishing of entertainment for community organizations; the conducting of a forensics program including participation in local and regional tournaments; and the sponsoring of the two student dramatic organizations on the campus, the Drama Club and the national dramatic honorary society, Alpha Psi Omega.

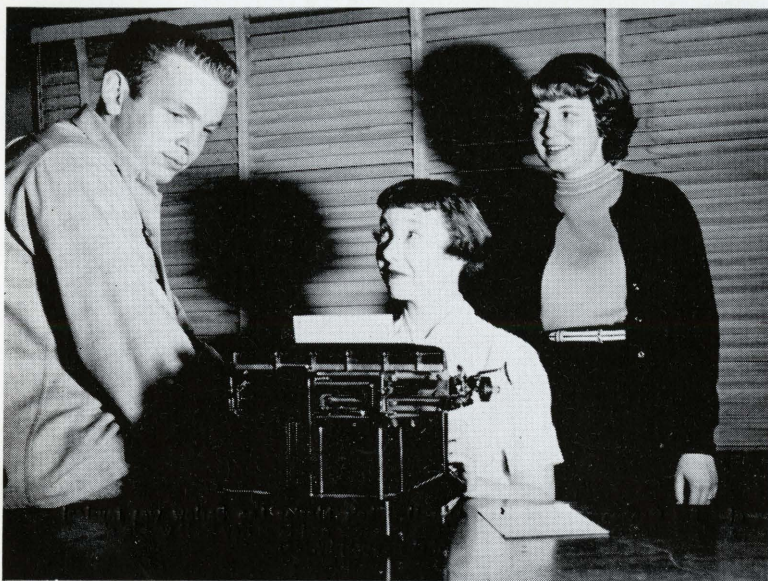

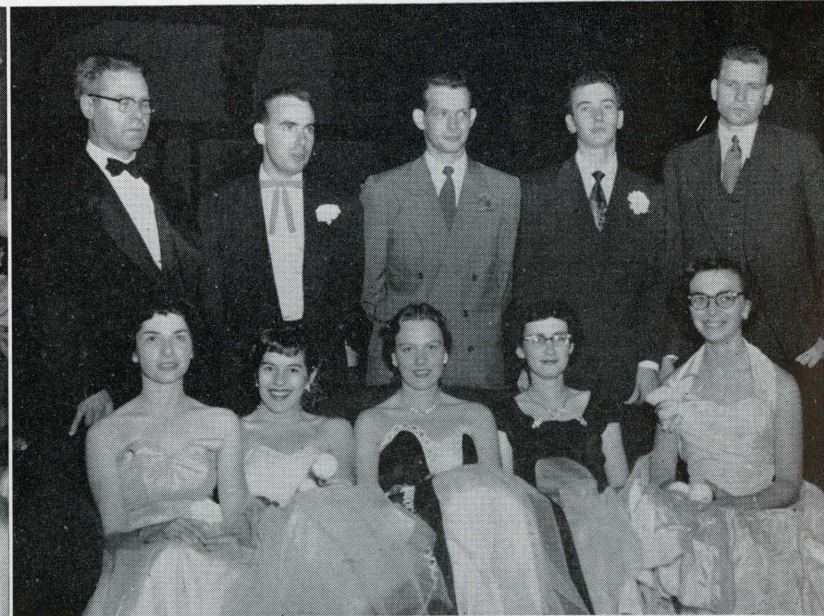

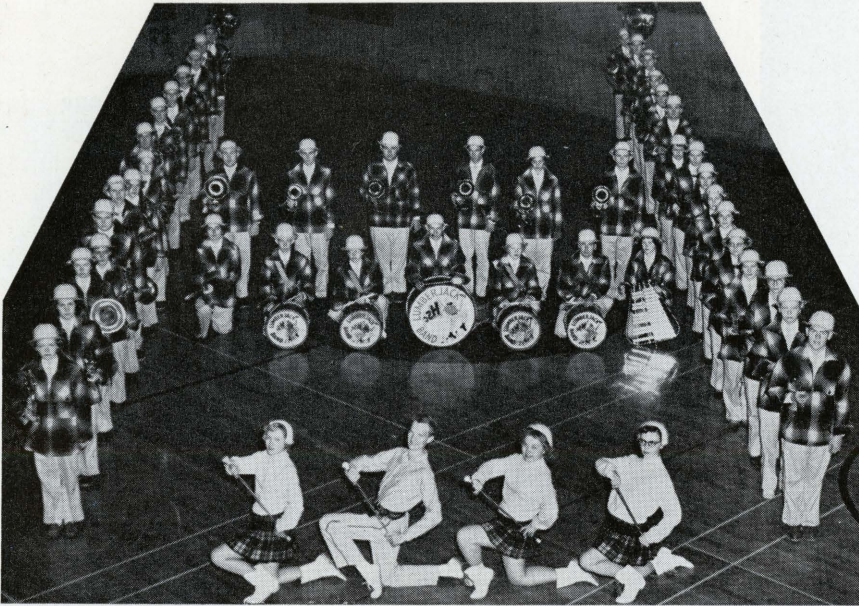

Outstanding event and a historic one in the schedule was the dedication of three new HSC buildings occupied for the first time in the fall — library, biological science buildings, and corporation house.

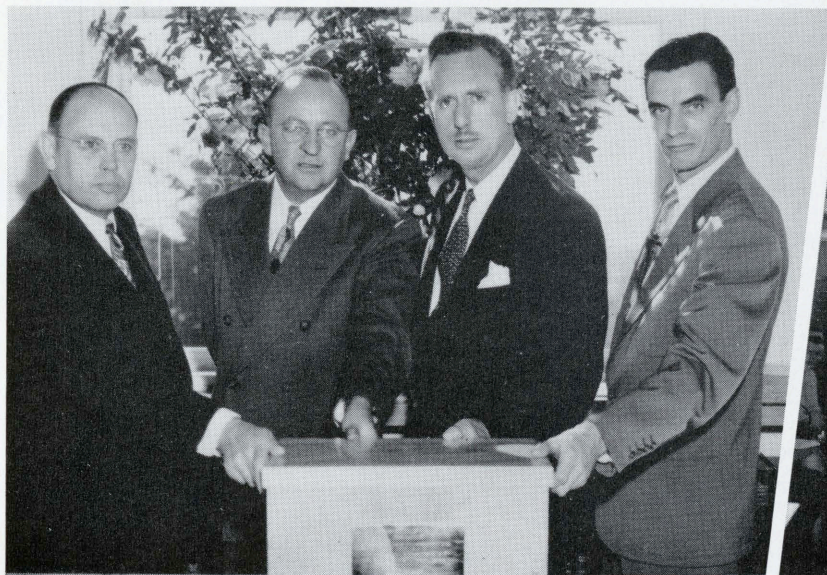

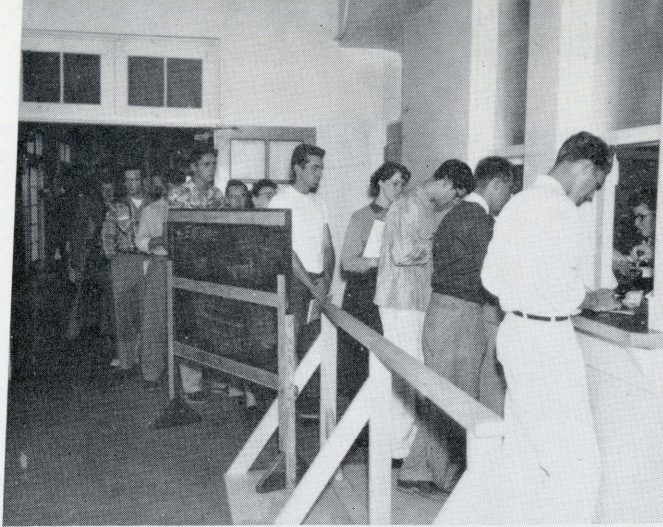

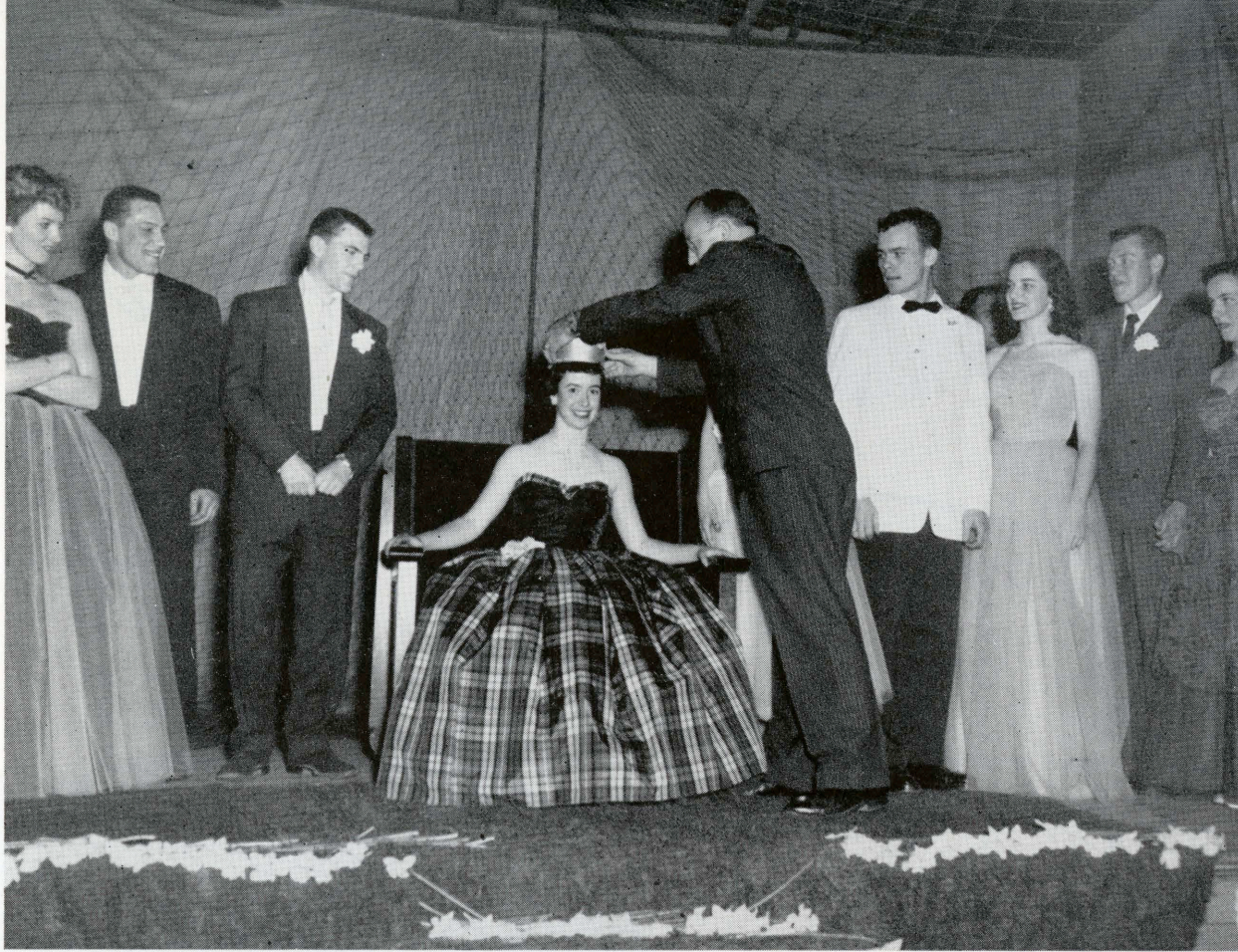

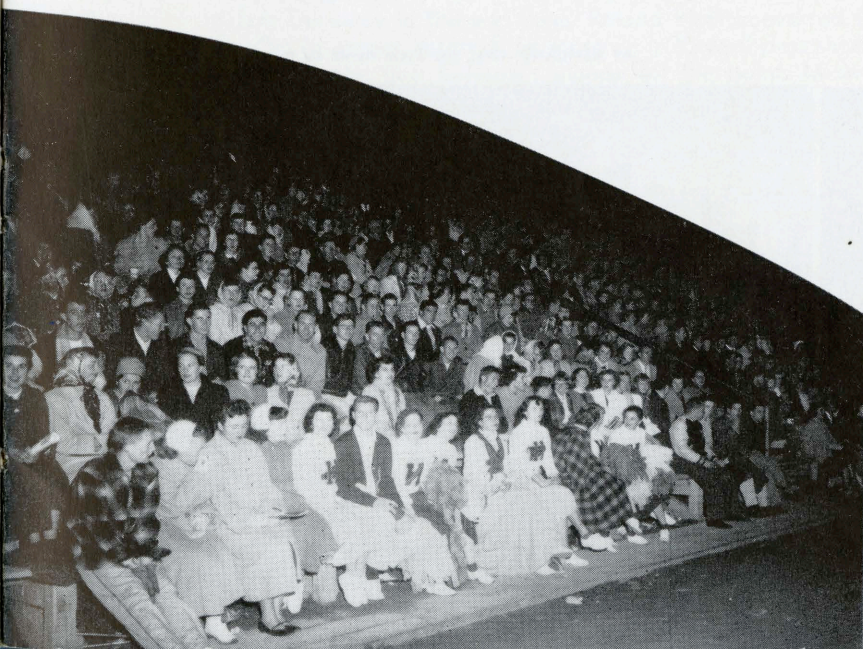
WITH SIX WINS on the record for 1953, Humboldt State Lumberjacks had a successful season after a slate of eight games.

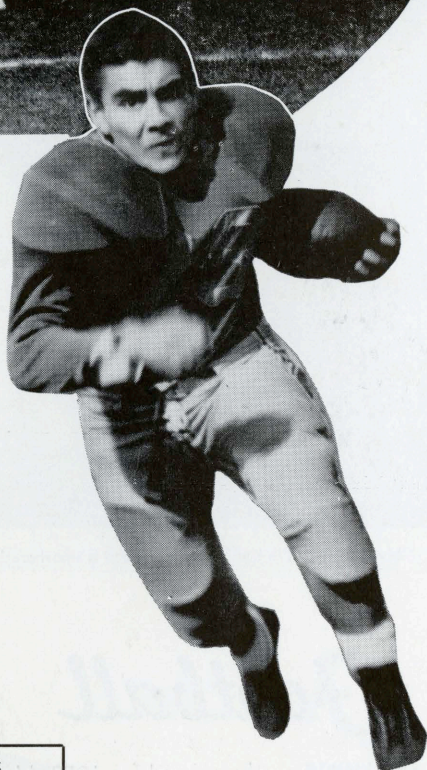

Jacks Win Six Straight; Lose Two—By J.D., Point

THE FIGHTING LUMBERJACKS of Humboldt started out the 1953 campaign in the form of two previous years under Coach Phil Sarboe.

After a short 10-day pre-season practice, which included only one scrimmage game, the Jacks had to face a seasoned Air Force team from Hamilton Base in Redwood Bowl, on Sept 13. The Flyers had been working out for six weeks; this fact plus the presence of college and professional stars in their ranks added to the six-point dent in the strong defensive ranks of the Hilltoppers. Flyer Coach Bryon Gillory, former Texas star, sailed over from one yard out in the second period for the margin, 6-0.

ANOTHER WIN OVER LUTES

Traveling to Tacoma, Wash., stomping ground of Coach Sarboe in his playing days, the Bunyan Boys again showed a strong defense, holding the Gladiators of Pacific Lutheran College without a score. In the third period QB Ray Mechals tossed a 15-yard pass to halfback Rudy Diaz, who stepped over from the one for the only score. End Happy Haft added the point with a kick from placement. Outstanding factor in the 7-0 win was Mechals' booming punts, one of which traveled 61 yards.

REVENGE AGAINST OWLS

Against the invading Owls of Oregon Tech back in HSC's bowl, the locals faced their only conquerors of the '52 season (7-6). But the stout defense, allowing only 74 net yards from passing and running, proved a fortress again as the Jacks won out 22-0.

HSC tallied a safety in the opening quarter, followed shortly by a Mechals-to-Diaz 5-yard pass and Haft's P.A.T. to make the score 9-0. Sub quarter Jerry Smith hoisted a long aerial to halfback Jug Davis in the end zone just as the half gun sounded. 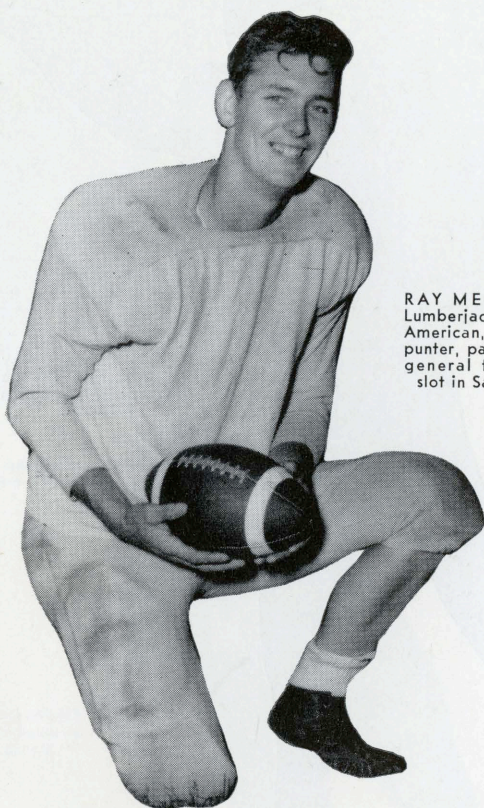
SUCCESSFUL HOMECOMING GAME

The Sixth Annual Homecoming was a howling success for the returning alumni and fans as the HSC boys slammed out a 33-13 victory over the California Aggies after being behind 13-7 at the half. Some fine running by the subs fresh off the bench proved the difference.

The Sarboemen tallied first on a 15-yard pass from Mechals to Bob Dunaway in the end zone. Roland Haft converted via toe. The Mustangs knotted the score on a 30-yard pass shortly afterwards plus Bob Chilcott's plunge for the point. Midway in the second period the Aggies' end Don Donsing came back to block Mechals' punt on the one, and the lead score came a play later as QB Bizzini sneaked over the half-time advantage.

After the intermission the subs went to work for the worried Jack supporters. Halfback Girsback roared for 31 yards to set up the tying score as George Psaros punched over. Haft's kick put the locals ahead to stay. Haft, Mechals, and Girsback cooperated to give Psaros another score. When the Mustangs couldn't gain after the kickoff, guard Bob Hanson broke through to block the attempted punt and Happy Haft fell on the bouncing ball in the end zone for the score; then he converted again. Late in the final frame Jerry Smith passed from the 19 to end Bill Fulwider for the last touchdown.

VICTORY IN POOLS

Wind and rain swept the field at Ashland, Ore., where the Staters traveled to play the Southern Oregon College eleven, but the Jacks came out on top with the help of muddy lady luck, as two Red Raider T.D.'s were called back on penalties. In the first quarter the Jacks started the scoring with a 26-yard pass, Mechals to Hank Yamagata and Haft converted. In the second quarter HSC recovered a SOCE fumble on their 28. Jug Davis lugged to the 13, where Rudy Diaz moved the ball into the end zone for the score. Haft converted again, making the score 14-0 at the half.

Humboldt's drive in the third muddy quarter carried down the field to the one, with Dick Hooper, sub fullback, punching over. This time Dale Thomas came in to kick the point. The Red Raider tally came in the final three minutes of the game on a 54-yard march with QB Ken Kimura going over from the 9-yard line. Final score: HSC 21, SOCE 6.

DUCKS CAN'T SWIM

For the second Saturday in a row the Jacks had mud to contend with, this time in Redwood Bowl with the webfeet Oregon Ducklings as the opposition. Alertness in a driving rain the first half and the punting skill of QB Mechals spelled out a 13-0 victory for the Jacks over a highly-rated University of Oregon Frosh team. Each team fumbled six times, but the Jacks recovered 11 of the total 12.

The first Humboldt score came in the opening period as a short Oregon punt was taken on their 28. Darling and Psaros took turns ball-carrying before Davis plunged over from the one for the score. Thomas converted. Not long following, the Jacks took another Duckling fumble on their 15 and made a score out of it with an aerial, Mechals to Darling. The P.A.T. was wide.

JACKS SLAY WOLVES

A small fiery Oregon College of Education squad came to the Bowl to renew a rivalry of the years and the Jacks added another to the local win column. This time it was the sure arm of passer Ray Mechals and the sure fingers of two HSC receivers who accounted for the sixth consecutive win, by the same score of 13-0.

First play of the second quarter Mechals hoisted a long (30-yard) aerial to Jug Davis in the south end zone, but the halfback dropped it. The succeeding play, an identical pass, was caught for the score, and end Happy Haft made it seven via placement. Later in the same quarter Mechals threw a 39-yard pass to halfback Keith Darling in the striped zone, to end the scoring against the Wolves.

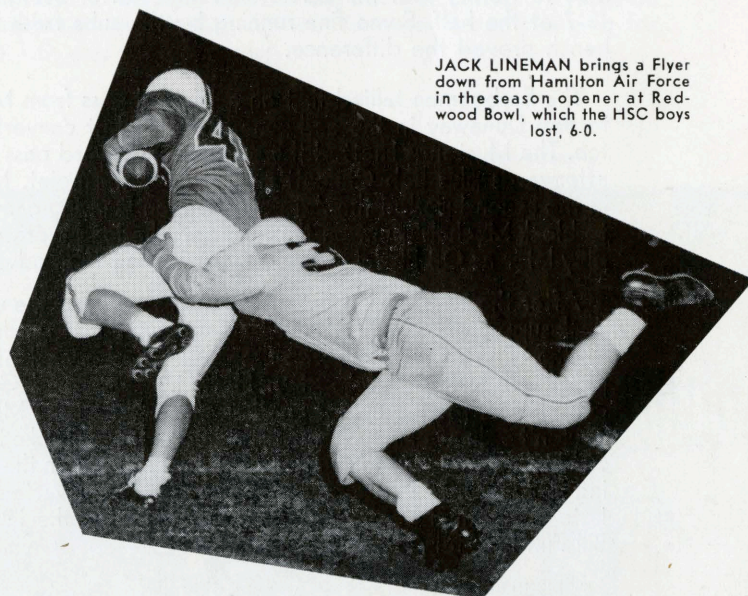
CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

The Far Western Conference championship game was played in Chico with the Wildcats hosting the Jacks, on a fast, dry field and fine football weather. More than 4100 fans witnessed Chico's homecoming game.

The Jacks started the scoring in the first period as Rudy Diaz scampered for a score on a 23-yard run following a march. Haft's attempt for the point was wide to the right of the up-rights, leaving the half-time score 6-0. In the third quarter the Jacks came out to fight for the end zone on a good drive, and fullback Keith Darling went over from the five. Dale Thomas' kick split the bars for the 13th point.

On the kickoff to follow, Chico's MacKenzie crossed the field on a nice return to make the HSC 24, and two plays later the Wildcats had their first score on a 22-yard run by Bob Gloyd. Hal Higgins' boot was good. In the final five minutes of the game Chico State set out on a march from their own 23 which carried to the Jack 31 on the ground before QB Higgins elected to pass to end George Maderos, who ran for the tying points. Higgins' point after touchdown score was good again and the Wildcats kept the nine-foot axe, symbolic of the intercollegiate rivalry.

The Wildcats took the three-team Far Western Conference championship, by merely tying Cal Aggies, 0-0, two weeks later.

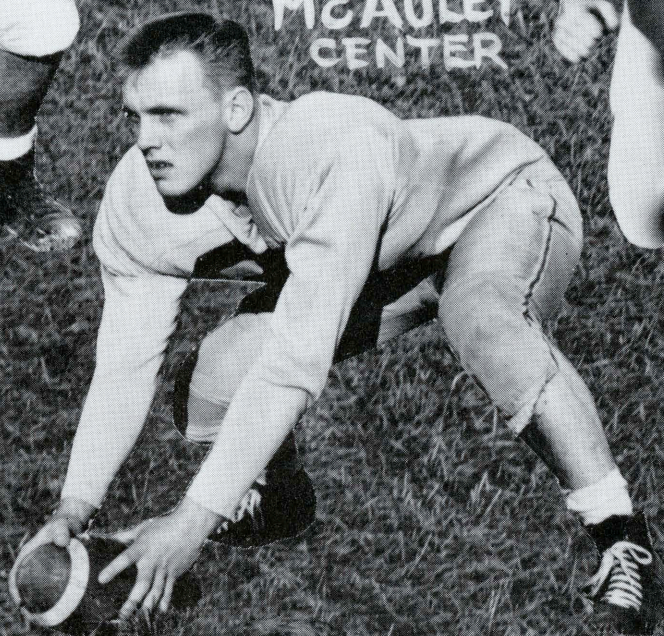


JACK LINEMAN brings a Flyer down from Hamilton Air Force in the season opener at Redwood Bowl, which the HSC boys lost, 6-0.

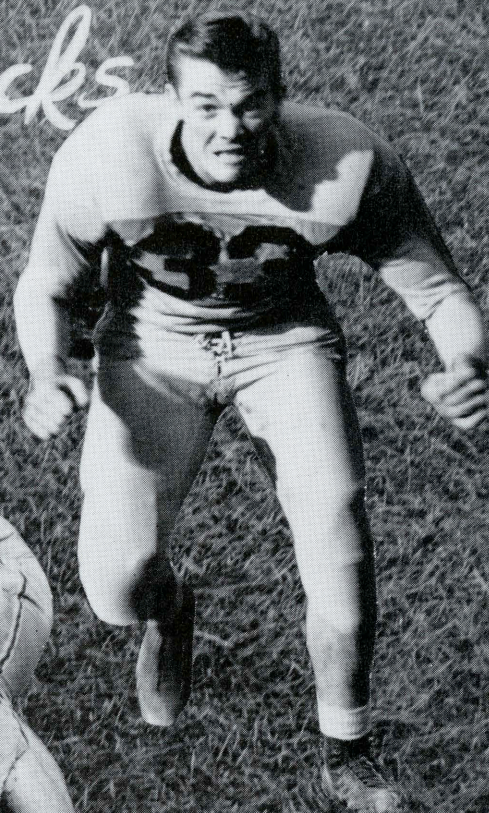

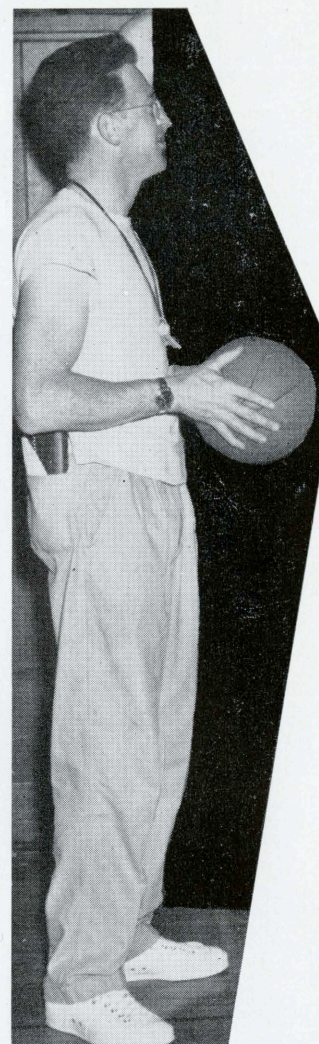


The Jacks scrambled with co-title winners San Francisco State but lost to the Gators in two games on the home floor.

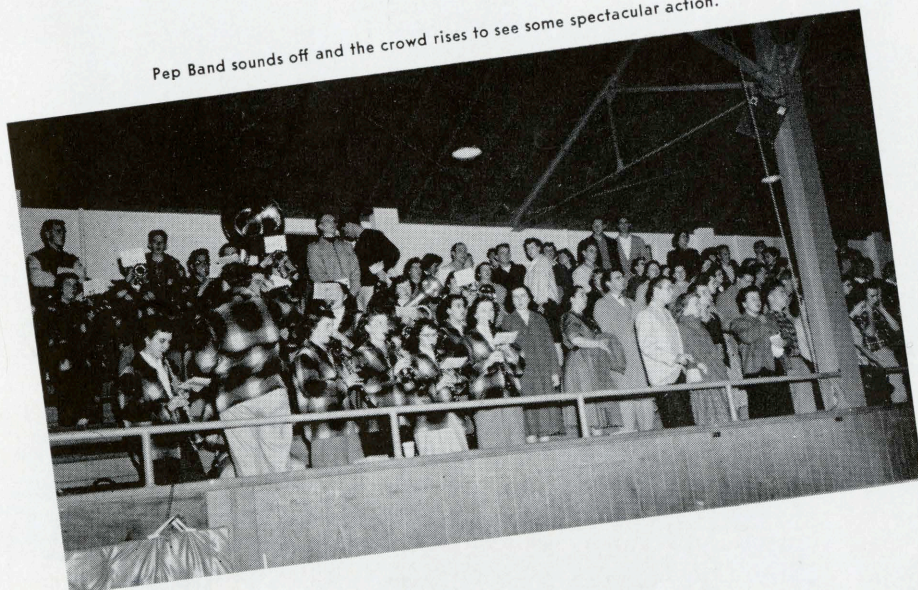

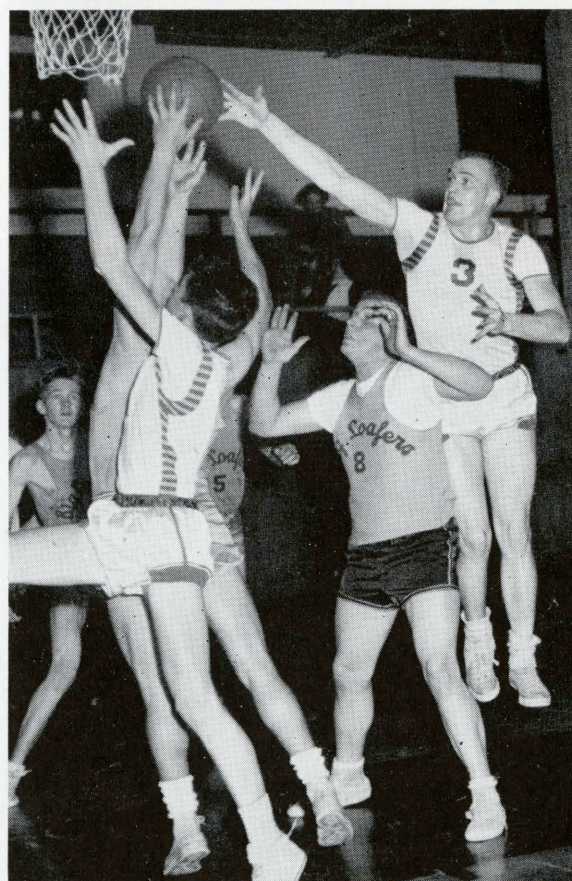
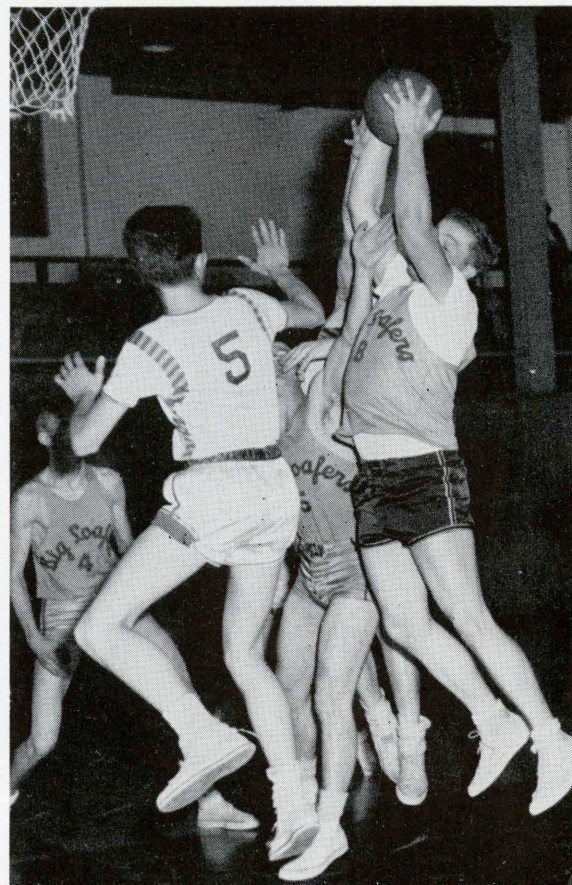
SEASON'S RECORD

Results of the current baseball season are not known at this writing, but the 1954 Jacks should improve the percentage in the HSC record book which is 92 games won and 62 lost.

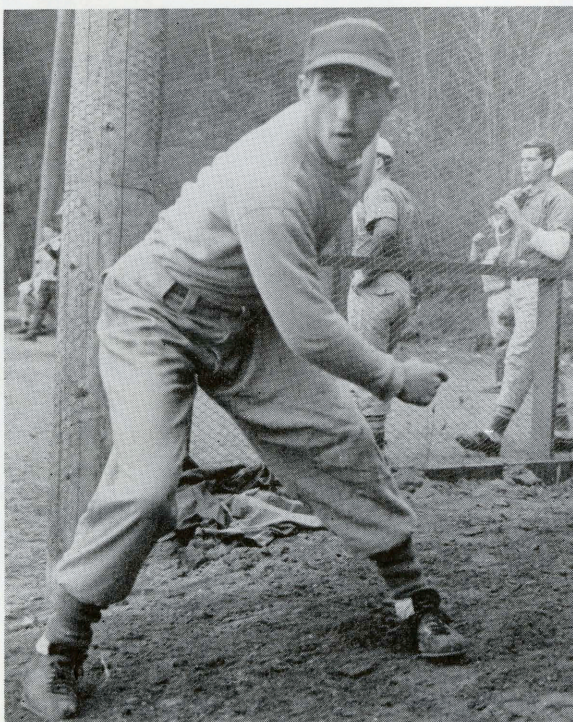


In front of the dugout at the City of Arcata field the Lumberjack nine gets ready to go to bat. Manager Will Geardts (lower right) returns this year.

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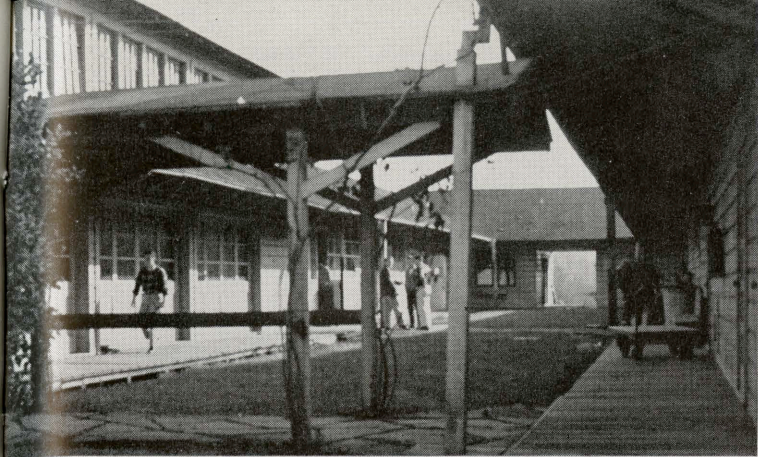

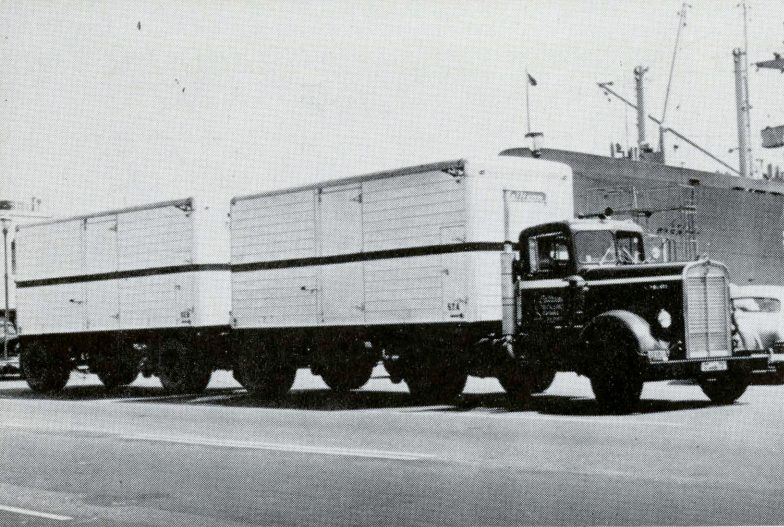

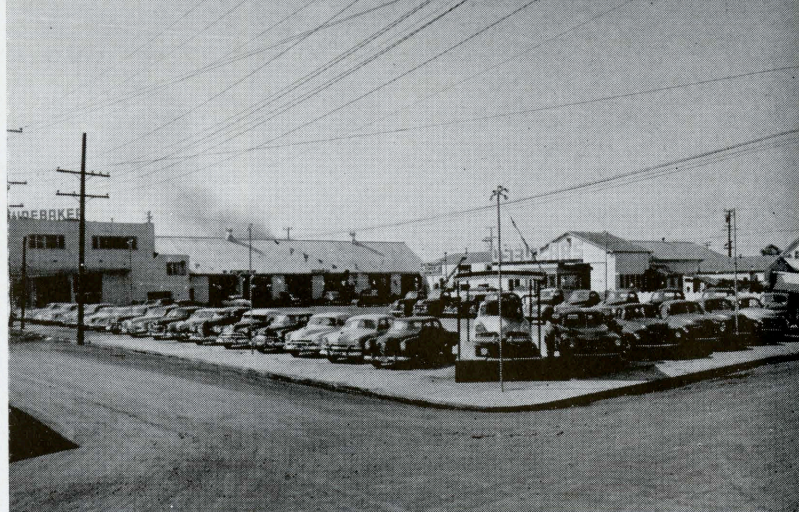
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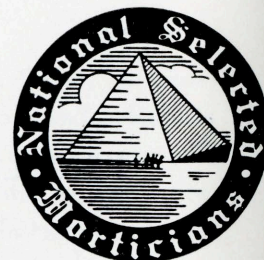
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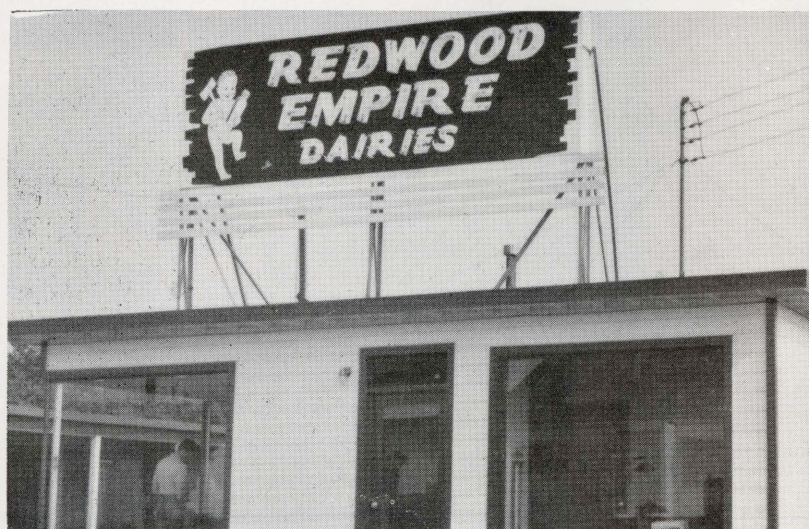
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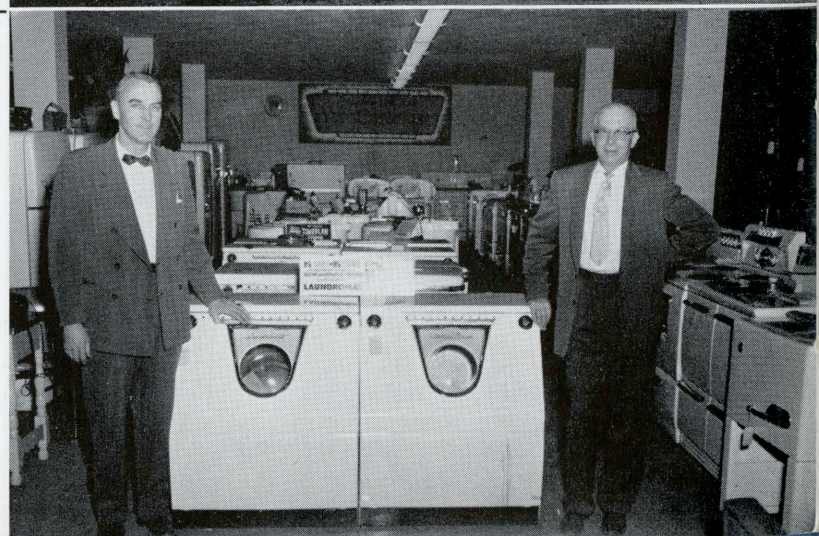
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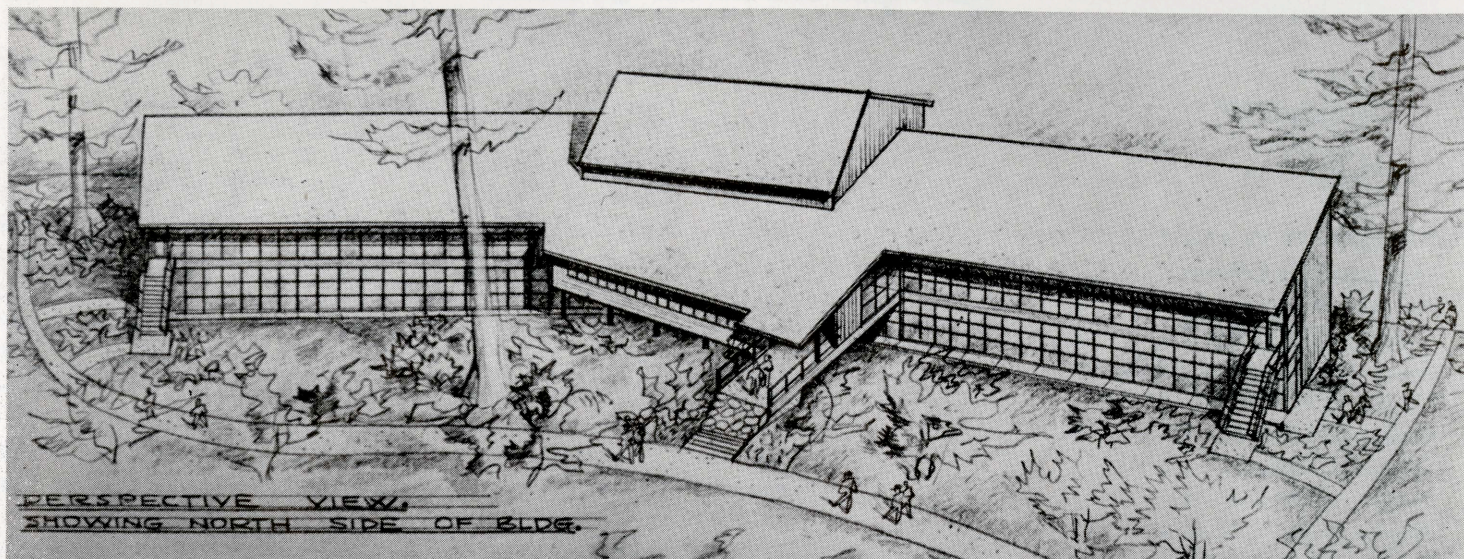
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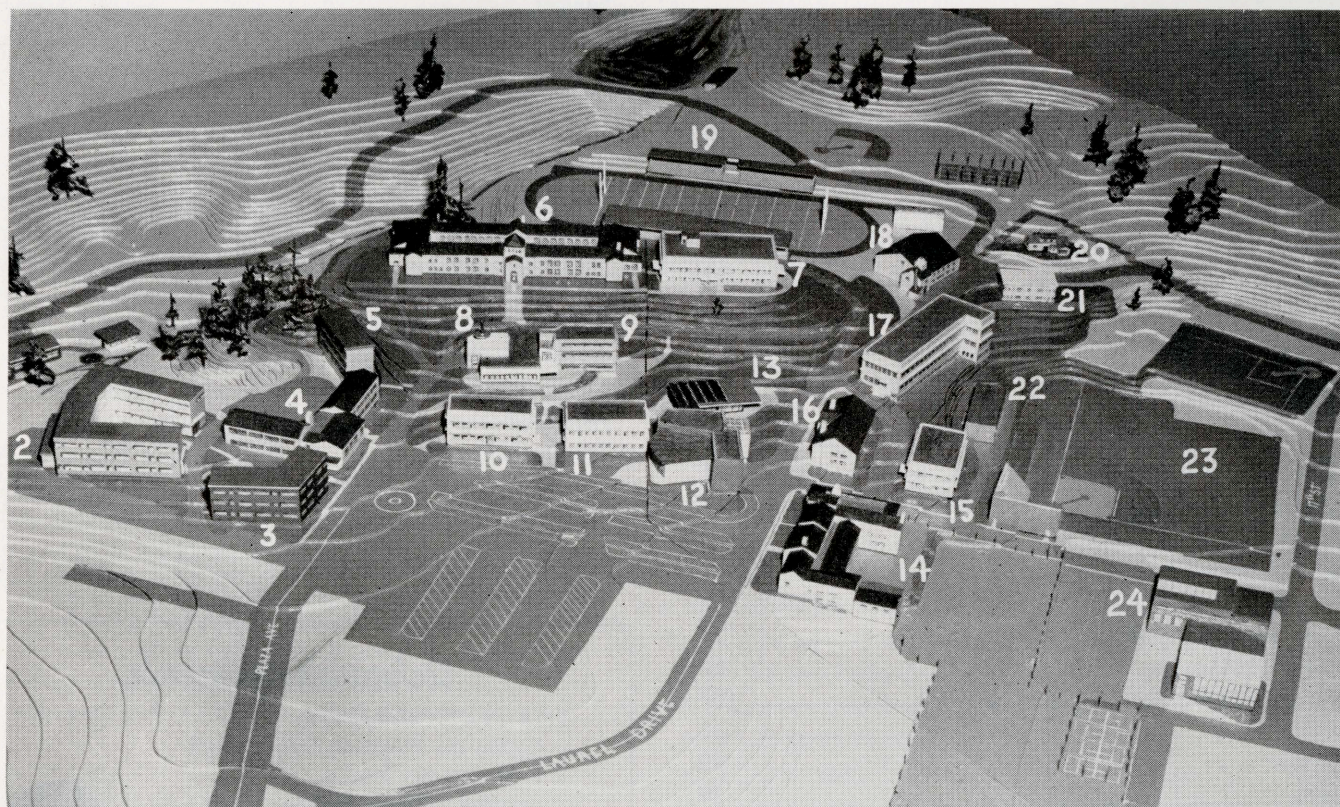


The Future for the College



THE FIRST WILDLIFE BUILDING in the nation will soon be constructed on the College campus with the breaking of ground about August 1. The architect's sketch shows the main building to be located to the south of the gymnasium on the new

cutoff road. Other facilities for the study of fisheries and wildlife management will include bird pens, brooders, fish hatchery and ponds, fur shed and parking facilities. There will be facilities for 300 students in the building which will cost \$636,118.



SCALE MODEL of the proposed Humboldt State College new campus shows the present eight buildings and facilities, and indicates the location of 15 new additions by 1965. The State Department of Public Works inaugurated this

projected expansion when it approved the Master Development Plan for the College in 1950. The plan provides for 1600 student enrollment by 1965, compared to this year's total of slightly more than 800.
