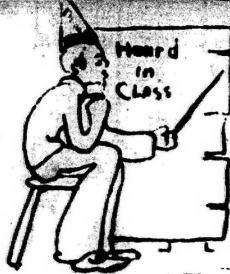


Now that spring is here many coeds and flashy college chicks will be seen dominating the campus in bright spring clothes.
