Lumberjack Buys New Press; Leases Private Wire

The well known news distributors, Steam Press, Inc., has installed at Humboldt State the farthest link of their two-way speeder wire circuit, providing the Humboldt Lumberjack with national college news direct from New York headquarters. This new feature is but one incorporated after the shake-up of their former news service, and the establishment of an entirely new department at this college.

ROTARY PRESSES

Two new rotary presses were purchased through the John Merrill Iron Works of San Francisco, and they will be installed as soon as the new news room is constructed beneath the inner court. An engraving department, where all the news and annual cuts will be made, will be in conjunction with the Humboldt News Service. The printing presses and engraving department will make it unnecessary to send the work outside the college, and the resulting decline in overhead will be placed in a circulating fund (some fun, eh kid?). New courses will be mapped out by the registrar, and tentatively these will provide training in copy reading, printing, type-setting, engraving and linotyping. C A A Course To Be Resumed At Humboldt State

"The Civilian Pilot training course will be resumed on February 1, 1942," was the report made to the Eureka Chamber of Commerce Monday by Harry Bell, district ground school superintendent of the civilian pilot training service.

It would have been possible for the course to have been resumed at once, but Humboldt is not in a position to start the ground training course which is held in conjunction with the pilot training. Bell suggests that applicants for the C. A. A. course apply to the college, or to Lester Pierce, who conducts the course at the county airport.

The Chamber of Commerce was instrumental in getting the C. A. A. course returned to Humboldt by applying to Congressman Clarence F. Lea. The explanation for the closing of the school this fall was that the reduced appropriation compelled such action.

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
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Probation Society Elects New Officer At Recent Meet
