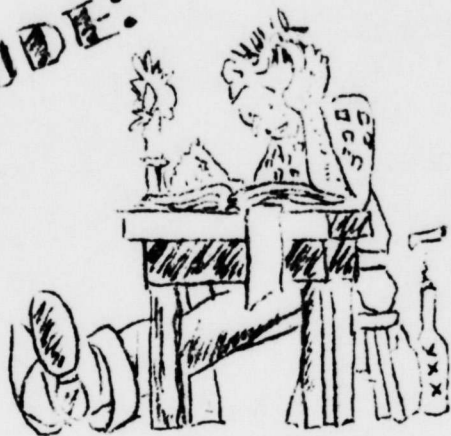
SOCIAL SCIENCE

Guard & Gackle **HSTC NEARS COUNTY** **CHAMPIONSHIP**

**DOWNS SAMOA IN A
SENSATIONAL FIGHT.**

Proving to basket-ball fans that they're determined to win the silver cup and the championship, the H.S.T.C. quintet eliminated the Samoa Blue Devils from race for supremacy of the court last Tuesday night in a fast and well-played contest. The game, which was played before a record-breaking crowd, was not decided until the last few minutes of play when the college team scored six points and held their opponents scoreless.

The Collegians started out as if they were going to run up a large score, and had a lead of six points before Samoa broke into the scoring column with a free toss by Wheeler. The two teams then played on almost even terms until half-time, which found the score at 12-7 in favor of Humboldt State. So far the two high-scoring Samoa forwards, Fleishman and Murphy, had been throttled up pretty well and were not allowed to chalk up the number of points which they rolled up in previous contests.

During the first 10 minutes of the second half the Samoans threw a big score into Humboldt's supporting ranks, when they came up from behind to tie the score at 14-14, the nearest they came to taking the lead throughout the whole game. The knot was soon broken, however, with a field goal by a Humboldt man. Then began some minutes of fast and furious basketball, with both teams trying so hard that fumbles were not infrequent. Another field goal and 2 free shots were added to Humboldt's score and when the final whistle blew the score was 20-14 in Humboldt's favor.

Ken Brantley and Leo Sullivan our two outstanding guards covered their men so closely that they were forced to resort to long shots to get the ball to the basket. They played as good a defensive game as is ever played by any two guards, although Sullivan seemed to be "right there" when it came to the offen-
