DOLLY SCHEDULED FOR EUREKA
FRIDAY.

The Humboldt players offered the play to a fair-siz crowd at Crannell Wednesday night. A dance was held immediately after the performance, at which a twenty-five cent admission was charged.

HUMBOLDT VARSITY HAS SUCCESSFUL SEASON.

Making a clean sweep of the evening's games the H.S.T.C. Varsity downed a fighting Fireman quintet by one lone point, 17-26, after the College co-eds had soundly trounced the S.F. A. C. in the first game.

The latter had little trouble in coming out on the long end of a 19-9 score, while the outcome of the men's game was in doubt until the very last whistle.

The game started out rather slow, with both teams unable to score, but once Humboldt found the range they kept ringing up point after point. At half time the score was 17-9 in favor of Humboldt, but our boys didn't seem to have the same pop and dash in the second period, with the result that the Firemen

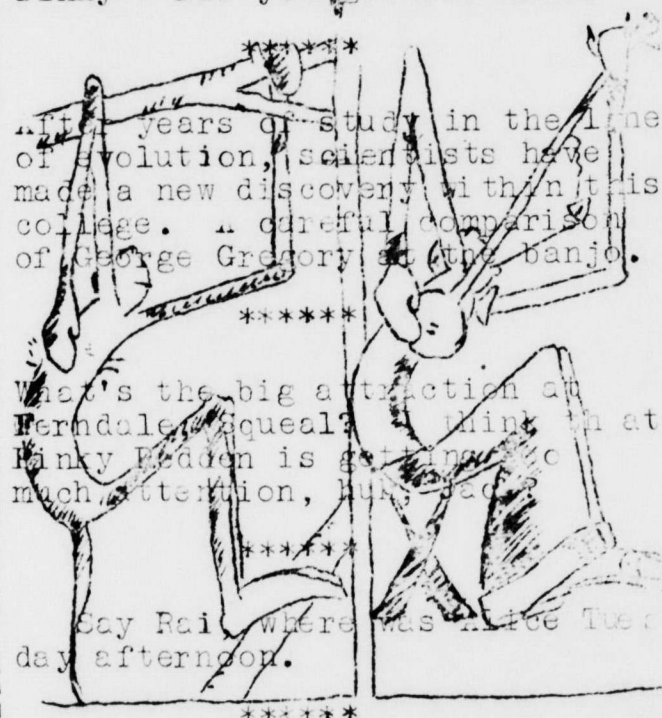

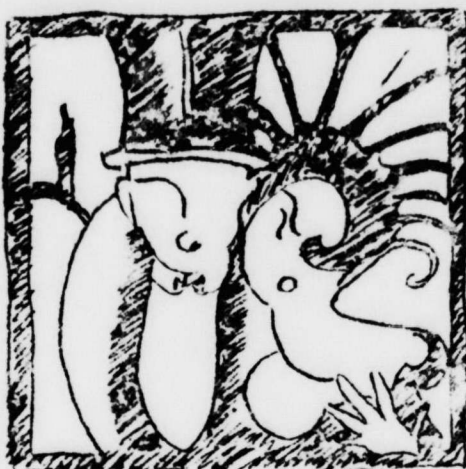

During the rest of the game, Coach Laura Herron used much reserve material which fought on even terms with S. F. for the rest of the encounter.

Alice Renfroe of Humboldt took high scoring honors with 9 points, with Christensen of H.S.T.C. and Luchessi of S.F.G.A.C. with 8 apiece. The guarding of Dee Henders for Humboldt was a feature of the evening. Her assignment was to guard Gen. Walters, star forward, and scoring ace of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Champion team in the S.F. Industrial League this season. Gen made but one point on a free throw, which certainly is complete triumph for Dolores.

Cameron also did a fine job of guarding, and we mustn't forget Kate Delaney and Marge Kaussen. "Kater" duplicated her performance of last season and completely baffled the S.F. side center with her dazzling speed. It certainly was a fine sight to see Marge Kaussen out-jumping the giant S.F. jump center. It was Marge's jumping in the early part of the game that gave Humboldt such a great margin at half time.

Humboldt's reserve material performed like veterans. In the course of the evening Laura used Ivancich, Winter, and Carroll at forward; Feilding and Huber at guard; and Cochrane, Carson, Cannon, and Cottrell at center.
