## CAMERON BECK ADDRESSES STUDENT BODY.

"Take the road of service for the benefit of mankind" was the challenge to college and high school students by Cameron Beck, personnel director of the New York Stock Exchange in his talk to the students and faculty of Humboldt State Teachers College and seniors of Arcata high school at an assembly in the college auditorium on Monday, January 12.

Mr. Beck, a personal friend of President Arthur Gist, had as his topic, "Yough, the Beginning of Right Relations". In his position in the Stock Exchange he has the opportunity to observe hundreds of youths, and he is intensely interested in them. Twenty-five hundred people representing 62 nations are on the payroll and many of them are youths of high school age. From all his observations, Mr. Beck is able to say that America has never developed a finer, cleaner generation than that which the youth of today represents.

Most people, according to Mr. Beck, think that somewhere in Wall Street grows a mystical tree, and that all one needs to do is to sit under this tree and let the dollars drop into his lap. In his fourteen years in Wall Street the speaker said he had never found this tree. There is no easy way to success. Rockefeller, when asked how success was attained, said, "It seems to me that success comes to the man who does the common things of life uncommonly well." This has been the basis for every promotion with which Mr. Beck has been connected. In fourteen years he has not found the meaning of "drag" or "pull". Leadership down through the ages has always cost. It is out of the struggle and adversity that the souls who have become our greatest leaders have been born.

Mr. Beck lists four qualities which are necessary to anyone who wishes to "come up" through the crowd:

First, the need for a plan of life. It is a peril to go through life without a plan. Second, the need of purpose. "The lack of purpose is killing the youth of today more than any other one thing", said Mr. Beck. Third, the need of perseverance, the "until" spirit. ## UNDEFEATED IN FIVE GAMES!

That is the record of the Humboldt State Teachers College varsity basketball team which bids fair to be in the running for the county independent league championship before the season is over.

Two practice games have been played, one with the Crannell Firemen, which was won by a 44 to 27 score, and the other with the Fortuna High School heavyweights, the score of which was 32 to 20, with the collegians on the long end.

Our regular league season opened on the first Monday after the Christmas holidays and our boys were handicapped by a lack of organized practice. However, we came through with a close win over the Fortuna Eels, 28 to 24. Later in the week, on Wednesday, the strong Ferndale Native Sons outfit invaded our court and in one of the roughest and most thrilling games ever played in the county, our boys walked off the court after the game with a 37 to 35 victory. Eight men were put out of this game with four personal fouls. On Monday of this week we were hosts to the Eureka Y. M. I. Orphans and after a slow start we came from behind to take a 29 to 19 win.

Our starting line-up in most of these games has been unchanged, Toddy Thomas, and Jack Simpson, forwards; Gordon Hadley, center; and Leo Sullivan and Howard Gregersen, guards, being the line-up most favored by Coach Telonicher. Nearly all of the other players have seen service in some of the games; Haven Howatt, freshman eager from Eureka High, led the attack against the Y. M. I. with twelve points.

## LET'S HEAR FROM THIS.

Are we paid for attending school? Some great educators make the statement that every day a student spends in college is worth twenty five dollars to him. Yet we expect more out of college; we expect material dividends; "something for our money" as several students have expressed it. Well here it is; it's something for your money and it's something you will always use and remember. present at all games and to have some sort of unification in yelling. A certain portion of the gym could be reserved for college students only and a well organized, drilled, and equipped bunch of college boys and girls can instill the proper fighting spirit in a team that will enable it to come out victor over even better teams. Of course this is right in the midst of finals but if most of the students take stock they will find that they usually loaf around or otherwise waste an evening of two every week and that it could be spent at a basketball game that only costs 25 cents for admission.

### WHAT IS IT WORTH?

Student Body activities are made possible through the collection of the Student Body Fee. Rumors have drifted about Campus to the effect that this college offers too few activities for the fee charged. However, this is an erroneous viewpoint; the student body under the leadership of its student council have witnessed a varied program of activities through the past semester which has drained its treasury. This discord among the students, however, should not exist, and the only way to remedy this, is to increase the value of the Student Body Card. This may be accomplished by printing a special SB card which the student should carry with him at all times. The card should have incorporated in it, a list of all athletic games of the season which may be punched on receipt at the gate. A strict discrimination of the participants of contests, activities, athletics and dances should be enacted.

The privilege of "laying a hand on" any Student Body owned equipment should be forcefully taken away from the non-citizen. He should be deprived of any political or social rights which are enjoyed by the college citizen. A definite checking system should be worked out to insure the value of the card to the students and as a result H.S.T.C. will experience for the first time in its history, a sense of true college spirit; The SB card will be worth something.

## ORGANIZE YOUR CLASS.

Humboldt State Teachers College lacks all things necessary to start the ball of College life rolling in spirit, pep, rivalry, and fight! Fight! What does it mean to you? In college it spells ambition, bumper, the true college spirit. College spirit isn't a form of spontaneous generation but on the contrary, is in direct need of an organizer, an originator. The Geology Lab and LB classes taught by J. H. McCall H. Mc, made a trip to Centerville Beach Saturday to study the Bunker Hill fault.

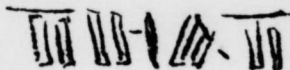
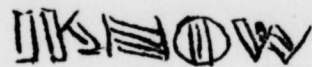
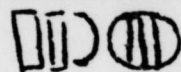
