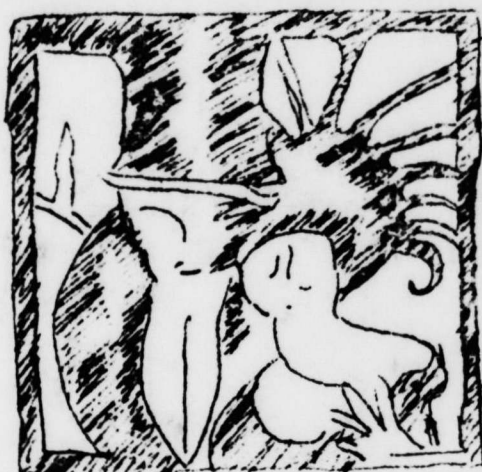
As for "Jo Jo", the tiger. Equal seems to have that on the brain lately---Finky must be getting rough.
