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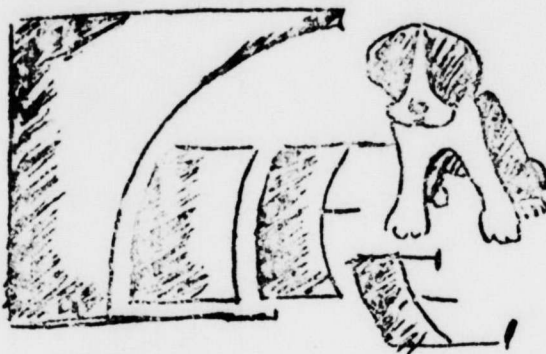

BASEBALL OVER AT COLLEGE.

With the closing of the collegiate baseball season, the athletic program for the male students is about concluded for the semester. The baseball season, although not having such favorable results as last year's, turned out to be fairly successful. The team played seven games, two with Arcata Hi, one each with Eureka Hi, Samoa, and Blue Lake, and two with S.O.N.S. Out of these seven games we lost one to Samoa 4-1, and one to the S.O.N.S. 6-5.

The majority of the players are signed up with county teams and undoubtedly will report next year for practice with a greater knowledge and experience of the game. Brundin, Merriam and Giuntini are playing for the champion Blue Lake nine; Herphill is with the Generals; Brantley and Penn don Arcata uniforms; and Quintrell plays for Fields Landing in the Mid-County League.

LADDER TOURNAMENT OPENS.

The first tournament of its kind in Humboldt State, namely, the tennis ladder tournament, is now open to the students entered in the contest. The tournament, under the direction of Professor Marten, will end May 15, at which time all matches will have been played off. A ladder affair has been placed in the new gym, where the contestants are placed on a ladder scale and the rules of the game being that the contestant may challenge any two above him on the scale, and the challenge must be played off within two days or the match is to be forfeited to the challenger. 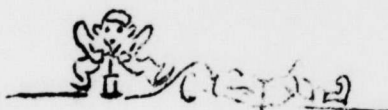

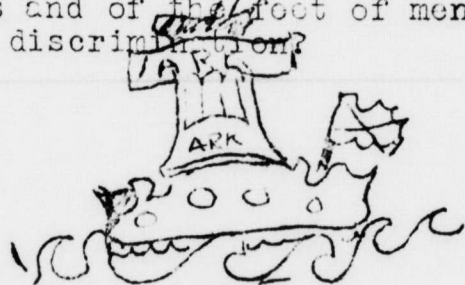
MYSTERY DRAMA TO BE PRESENTED SOON.

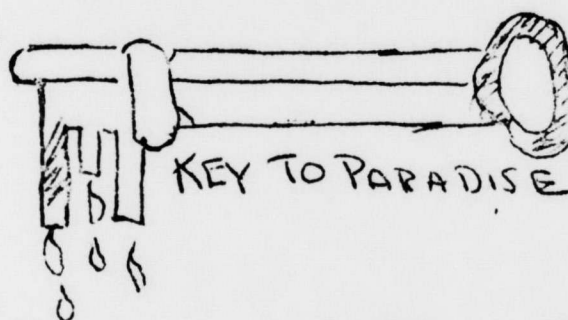
