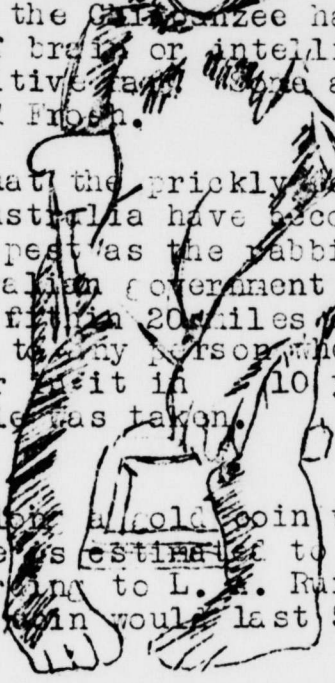

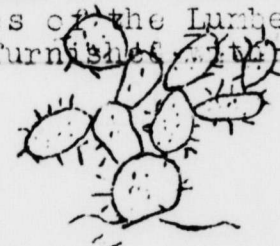
That the prickly pear cacti in Australia have become as much of a pest as the rabbits? The Australian government offered land free to any person who would clear it in 10 years. Very little was taken.
