A novel means of identification of its students has been adopted by Santa Rosa Junior College. This system will be by the means of photographs.

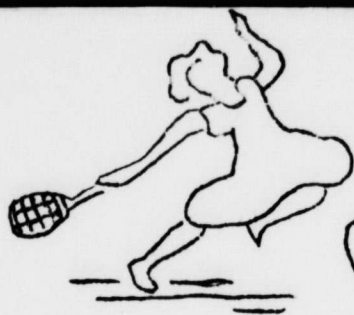

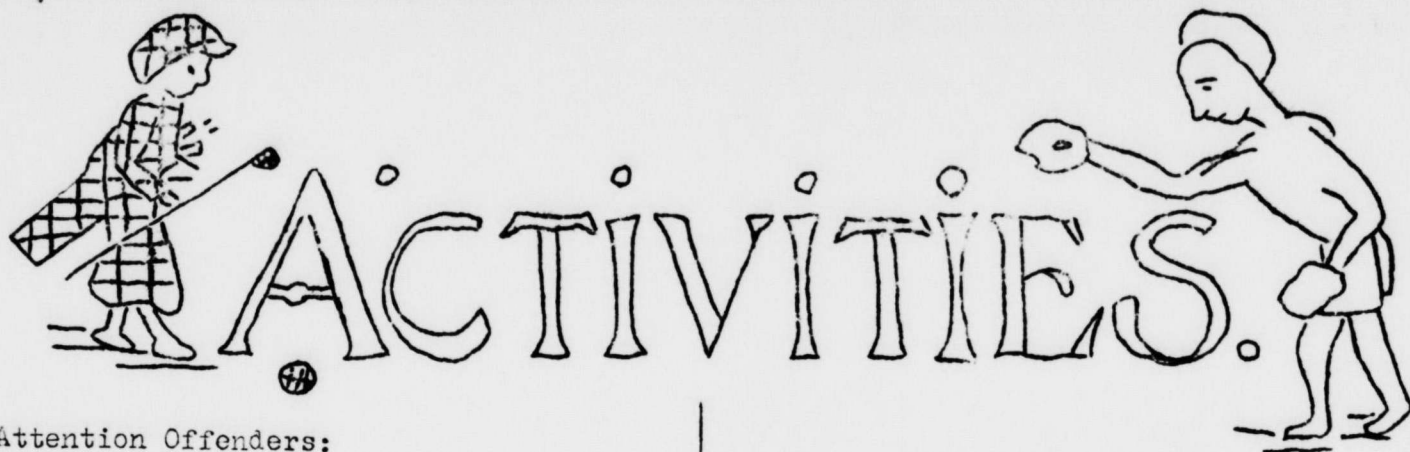
Student body officers, tennis coaches, and EVERYBODY: Let's think this thing through and give our netsters a chance to Fight and Win for Humboldt!

Attention Offenders:

The Board of Control wishes to bring several matters to the attention of the students. There are several activities being carried on in the College that are distinctly in poor taste, a breach of the ethics of good citizenship, and a violation of the trust that has been granted to the Student Body in the Student Self-Government program.

The first of these is the matter of visiting and general "whoopie" in the Library and in the Commons. These places are intended to be used as study rooms, and the Board is prepared to see that they are so used. No visiting is allowed in the Library, and only talking in subdued tones is permissible in the Commons. The use of the Commons as a study room was granted on the condition that it be left in good order, and that the spirit of study be preserved. If a word of warning is not sufficient, the Board is prepared to take future steps.

Another practice that is frowned upon is that of systematically searching lockers for tennis rackets, balls, or any desirable article. We realize that those who do so only borrow such materials, but at the same time they may cause considerable inconvenience to the owners. It is often reported that the borrowers have forgotten to return the borrowed articles. A word to the wise is sufficient, and the unwise can be handled otherwise.

There have been two instances recently where articles, which could be used for no other purpose by the thieves, have been taken down to decorate the walls of their room. One was the California Bear Flag which was torn from its standard in the Auditorium. The other was a poster on the bulletin board in the Library. Stealing a flag is an expression of a low form of depravity, and should it ever be found that a college student was responsible for the disappearance of the "California Bear" Flag, the Board will not hesitate in asking that person to withdraw from Humboldt. There is no room for that sort of person at Humboldt.

There is another offense, which is perhaps even more serious than those mentioned before. The College furnishes magazines for the benefit of the entire student body, not for one student or a group of students alone. These magazines are placed on the racks for reading purposes and are not to be

HOW TEAMS ARE CHOSEN IN WOMEN'S ATHLETICS

 5. Should refrain from smoking during month before games.
- (4) No condition or E from previous semester.
- (5) Ability.
