TENNIS LADDER PLANNED

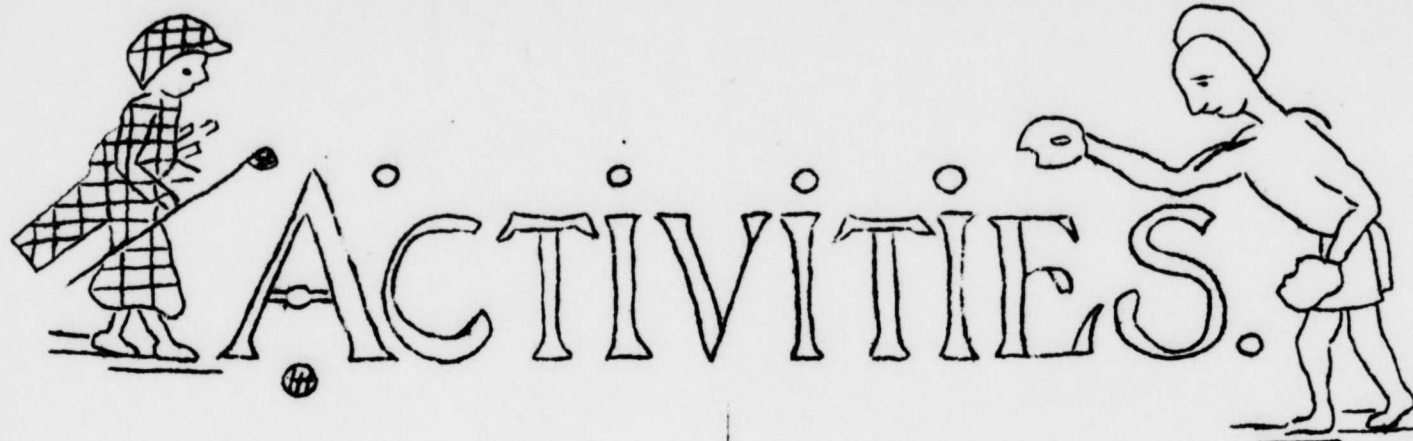
Plans for a mixed doubles ladder for the advanced tennis class have been started by Miss Monica Wright, College tennis instructor.

The Associated Men Students of Humboldt State Teachers College is the name of the most recent organization of men here. The men were requested to remain for a few moments after a recent student body meeting and the proposition of such a club was set forth by Athletic Coach Fred Telonicher. This met with favorable comment from the men and was soon a reality. Friday morning another meeting was held and a constitution was accepted. Ellis MacMillan and Clyde Patenaude, president and secretary pro-tem for the first meeting, were elected to hold their offices during the rest of the year. Leo Sullivan was selected as vice-president while Elrid Hogan and Harlan Still were both nominated for yell leader, no vote having been taken for that office as yet.

The Associated Men Students decided to hold the bonfire rally, which is an annual affair, just before the San Francisco State game here the 17th of next month.

WALDNER APPOINTED MANAGER

Glenn Waldner was appointed equipment-athletic manager for the football season at a meeting of the Executive Council Wednesday noon.

The manager, who is a paid officer, will have charge of the football equipment, towels, and other miscellaneous odds and ends which are associated with the game.

At first it was thought that the manager would receive a letter for his work, but, after careful consideration, it was decided to have a paid officer in order to better safeguard our equipment. Inasmuch as the manager is held responsible for towels used by gym classes as well as by the teams, it is hoped that those using them will be careful to return same.

At the same meeting a budget committee was appointed by president George Gregory. Those serving on the committee are Ugo Giuntini, chairman, Glenn Waldner, and Ione Russell. It was found that a greater number of the students purchased Student Body tickets than in the two previous semesters, a fact which is very gratifying to the administrative officers.

ARCHERY NEWS

A movement is on foot to organize an Archery Association among the colleges of Washington, Oregon, California, Arizona, and Utah.

Weekly tournaments will be held during the late fall and winter, the team representing each college shooting on its own range and sending a report of its scores to the office of the Association's secretary who will then report the results to each club. A suitable trophy will be awarded the college finishing with the best record. It is also hoped that a real tournament can be held at some centrally located college in May or June.

Such mail matches, or telegraphic matches, are comparatively new to college archery although a similar organization known as "The Olympic Bowmens' League" consisting of about twenty clubs in the western states has been flourishing for several seasons. Telegraphic contests in other sports, such as small bore rifle shooting, are quite common. Such contests lack the thrill of shoulder-to-shoulder competition, but are the best substitute that has yet been devised to enable devotees of these sports to compare their skill with that of others of their own class in distant parts of the country.

Archery has been recognized as a regular college sport by the Arizona State Teachers Colleges and Junior Colleges--the Athletic Associations' letters being awarded for this just as for other sports. Miss Bettse Marten, formerly of H. S. T. C. is coaching the womens' archery team at Tempe State Teachers College.

Brigham Young University holds an annual inter-scholastic archery tournament to which the high schools of the State are invited to send teams. Payson Union High School won the State Championship for 1931.
