VESPER CONCERTS WILL START SOON

WOMEN'S GLEE CLUB AND STRING QUARTET TO GIVE FIRST CONCERT

The Women's Glee Club and the string quartet will co-operate Sunday, February 26th, to present the first of a series of Vesper Musicales here at Humboldt State College. As has already been announced, every musical organization at Humboldt will appear on one of three successive Sunday afternoon programs, beginning at 3 o'clock, February 26.

The Women's Glee Club has grown in both numbers and talent. Starting with the small number of 19 members at the beginning of this year, the organization now has 43 members who sing works of Mendelssohn and Schubert, the difficulty of those compositions is well known.

The girls will offer nine selections, three of which are of the folk song type.

The 1933 string quartet is a comparatively unknown musical unit here at Humboldt. E. V. Jeffers, conductor and member of the quartet, believes that the organization will make a fine

This magazine, the official publication of the department of education, lists the principles adopted at the state meeting of the California congress in January, and officials at the local college were pleased to note the endorsement given to the teachers colleges by that body.

Mr. Graves has announced the following books on the rental shelf: "Ann Vickers is the first novel that Sinclair Lewis has published since he won the Nobel Prize for literature. It is also his first book about woman. The heroine is a man and social worker; and the book is much milder and less exaggerated in characterization than some of Mr. Lewis' previous books.

"The Bulpington of Blup" is the somewhat fantastic title of H. G. Wells' latest novel. It is the story of the life of an average English boy who is companioned by an imaginary self that greatly outshines his real personality.

"I'll Tell You Everything" is the joint production of J. B. Priestley, one of the foremost of present-day English novelists, and Gerald Bullett. It is a combination of humor and mystery, somewhat of an experiment in literature.

College Librarian Believes that High Type Literature is Effective

C. Edward Graves, college librarian, is more than ever a believer in the power of good literature. A few days ago he received a letter in which was enclosed a dollar bill, together with the statement, "Please accept this money as payment on a back fine". The letter was signed "Former student". Mr. Graves says that it is the first time in his library experience that such a thing has ever happened, and he is inclined to attribute it to the influence of Lloyd C. Douglas' books, "The Magnificent Obsession" and "Forgive Us Our Trespases".

In these books, which are among the leading best sellers of the country, and which are available in the library rental collection, the author expresses the opinion, through his characters, that the doing of unselfish deeds, if carried out in secrecy and with safeguards against subsequent publicity, will add greatly to the power of one's personality. In fact, he goes so far as to compare this newly acquired power to dynamite, which must be handled carefully. The "former student" who wrote this letter was certainly influenced, either consciously or unconsciously, by this philosophy of life, Mr. Graves believes.

On the same day, two books that had been missing from the library rental collection for about two months suddenly appeared on the library shelves. Mr. Graves feels that Mr. Douglas' philosophy of life is beginning to work throughout the college community. He thinks that this money should be used for some special purpose, perhaps to increase in some way the interest in these books, and would be glad to receive suggestions along this line.
