BOOKSTORE WILL BUY OLD BOOKS

MRS. JESSIE T. WOODCOCK'S
PLAN TO BE STARTED
THIS SEMESTER

A new plan for conducting the sale of used books through the Humboldt College bookstore is being used this semester. The plan was adopted to help students by affording prospective buyers and sellers one convenient place where all sales can be conducted instead of making each rely upon hearsay and personal solicitation. Incidentally, the plan will probably improve the appearance of the bulletin boards.

The new arrangement will not prevent personal sales between students, as formerly conducted, but will, its sponsors believe, afford a market for used books that might not otherwise be sold. A list of used books wanted at the bookstore, has been posted for several days.

The plan, as announced by a mimeographed bulletin from Mrs. Jessie T. Woodcock, financial secretary, is as follows:

"Faculty members will turn in requests for books on regular order blanks to Financial Secretary on or before date specified.

"The Financial Secretary will place list of books needed on bulletin board one week before the end of the semester.

"Students wishing to sell their used books will secure one slip for each book from the bookstore, fill out and place in book and turn in at bookstore on or before date specified.

"The bookstore will charge 5 cents for each book sold and pay the student the difference after the book is sold.

"Students will receive cash for their books as soon as they are sold. To avoid a rush at the bookstore and unnecessary requests for money before books are sold, we will post the names of students whose money is ready at the close of each day."

Fellows Sign Up for Gym, Not Athletics

Men enrolling for athletics are expected to take athletics for the whole semester. Any men who intend to come out for one sport only must sign up for a physical activity class for men and report to that class when the athletic season is over for the one sport for which they have signed up.

BOOKS DISAPPEAR OFF RENTAL SHELF

There has been increasing difficulty since the beginning of this school year, according to C. E. Graves, Humboldt College librarian, with losses from the rental bookshelf in the library. This rental collection was established some four or five years ago as a means of providing students, faculty members, and friends of the college with up-to-date books that could not otherwise be bought.

"The collection has never paid for itself," Mr. Graves said yesterday, "and is conducted as a favor to the college community. Until this year the losses have been very few, and the library has absorbed them without complaint.

"At present, however, there are four books missing from the collection, and the situation seems to be growing worse. Unless all students are willing to assume their fair responsibility in this matter, it may be necessary to discontinue the collection.

"To place it under lock and key would make its administration too difficult. It is the hope of the library that this appeal may bring the desired results."

Noon Period to Be An Hour Hereafter

Beginning this semester, the noon period will be a full hour, to provide more time for certain student activities. Upon the recommendation of the Student Affairs Committee, President Arthur S. Gist has lengthened the noon period seven minutes and fifth period classes will begin promptly at 1 o'clock, instead of at seven minutes to one as formerly.

As a result of the addition of seven minutes at noon, all afternoon periods will commence on the hour and will end seven minutes before the following hour.

Student Body, Clubs To Make Calendar

In the near future Wayne Simpson, president of the Associated Students of H. S. T. C., will call a meeting of the heads of all school organizations to determine the dates and hours of all meetings for the entire semester. In this manner it will enable the administration to compose a schedule of events in calendar form.

Conflicts of activities will be avoided as Miss Sarah Davies, secretary to the president, will have in her office a chart in the form of a calendar relating the activities of every day in every month.

TECHNOCRACY IS "PSEUDO-SCIENCE"

Homer P. Balabanis, head of the Social Science Department, attended the meeting of the Pacific Coast Economics Association during the Christmas holidays, at San Francisco. The meeting which was held on December 28 and 29 was an eventful one in which all economics problems were discussed by the members.

One of the most interesting discussions was the one on Technocracy, according to Balabanis. "We term the Technocrats as Pseudo-scientist," said the vice president on his return. "The term Technocracy is merely one the newspapers have taken up as something new; the word is new, but the Utopian theories propounded are thousands of years old."

To show how the daily papers have taken up the term, Balabanis said that during the convention they discussed hundreds of topics, unemployment, labor organization, money and banking,

Wilma Bean to Conduct Class in Crafts

A Handcraft class for leaders of Camp Fire Girls groups and for those interested in crafts will be conducted at Lincoln's stationery store in Eureka Saturday afternoons from 2 to 4 o'clock, beginning January 14th. Projects to be taken up will be book binding, leather tooling, Indian symbol designing, and the making of marble paper, blue prints of flowers and of snap shots, splatter prints, lineoleum blocks, potato prints, stencils, ink prints, plaster casts, pottery. In addition there will be talks on other crafts.

The class will be taught by Miss Wilma Bean, student at Humboldt State Teachers College, who has been Camp Fire Girls executive in South Pasadena for three years. She has written handcraft articles for "Every-girls," the national publication of the Camp Fire Girls organization, and has illustrated a book. When attending Chouinard School of Art in Los Angeles, she majored in Crafts and Design.

BULLETIN SYSTEM IS ANNOUNCED

NO ADVERTISEMENTS FOR
PUBLIC DANCES TO BE
ALLOWED

Beginning this semester, space on college bulletin boards will be reserved for announcements from various faculty and student sources and it is requested that the allotment of space be observed. Miss Sarah Davies, secretary to President Arthur S. Gist, said today.

The new regulation adopted is that proposed by the Student Affairs Committee, which is composed of both faculty and students. Under the new scheme, no advertisements of public dances will be posted. Outside school, church and educational posters, if neat in appearance, and if approved by the president's office, will be allowed space on the board reserved for such notices. All posters to appear in the halls are to be stamped by Miss Davies before being posted.

Space on the boards has been allotted as follows:

Glass-enclosed bulletin board to the south (i.e. towards the Registrar's office): Sections One, two and Three for the Physical Education Department; Section Four for the Student Body.

Glass-enclosed bulletin board to the north (i.e. towards the bookstore): Section Five, College Business office; Section Six, Registrar's office; Sections Seven and Eight, faculty notices to students.

The south bulletin board (not enclosed) on the east wall of the hall is reserved for outside notices.

The north bulletin board (not enclosed) on the east wall is reserved for student notices and for phone-call slips.

Questionnaires Will Go to State Office

The questionnaires which students filled out as part of their registration procedure was for the state department of education. They go directly to the state office for tabulation, and hence there is to be no local check on the answers. Students were asked to sign the questionnaires merely so that a check could be made as to whether every student had been reached.

The object of the questionnaire was to determine rather definitely the value of the college here to students of this vicinity and to ascertain what would be the effect of a substantial increase in fees, which has been advocated in some quarters.

New Board Members To Be Nominated

At the student body meeting Friday, nominations will be open for the vacancies in the personnel of the Board of Control. Sophomores, Juniors and Seniors are eligible for membership on the board. Two members must be selected to replace Lucille Winter and Paul Ely whose terms have expired.

The Board of Control consists of six members and the vice president of the student body as chairman.

Welcome

It's the beginning of the new semester today! Welcome Frosh and new students! The Lumberjack hopes that you will like the institution and that you will participate in the extra-curricular activities as much as possible. Remember that you are at Humboldt to get an education and that daily preparation of your school work is an important procedure in that education. Activities outside the school room give opportunity for a well-balanced development and should be participated in just as much as one can. If you have a normal load and are not pressed by financial difficulties, you can easily have time for both scholastic endeavor and extra curricular work, if you carefully plan what you intend to do.

We do not want to seem preachy, but by budgeting your time for the five days per week you are in college, it will be found that there is lots of time left for wholesome outside activities. We believe that neither scholarship nor activities should be sacrificed for the other; we think you have time for both.

A Suggestion

At the beginning of the new year merchants take stock, and make some effort to improve upon the methods of conducting business the previous year. So, too, should the Associated Students. We know the things which we have done well, and we know the things we have done not so well. It is not our purpose to list those things here for the entire world to know. But there are several matters which we think will have an universal interest.

The present administration of the student body has done a pretty good job of carrying on the monthly dances, but today we should like to suggest several improvements. In the first place, at present the women who attend the dances must throw wraps up over the gym railing to get dirty and possibly torn. They must let their hats take care of themselves. Men must toss their overcoats in a heap on some bench. This situation may easily be remedied if the student body takes it upon itself to build a couple of clothes racks. A movable rack which could be used in the rest room upstairs in the gym and which could be brought up to the social unit when banquets are scheduled for the College Commons would be a real asset. A shelf with pegs on it for hats could be built on top of the rack. Wire coat hangers can be brought at wholesale for a little or nothing. Wouldn't it be wonderful if we had two of these racks, one upstairs for the women and one downstairs for the men? In all the project would entail but a very small expense and would facilitate matters exceedingly. With coats lying around everywhere, some sticky fingered individual will be grabbing some co-ed's sealskin coat, and where will the student body get off? Let's lock the barn door before the horse gets out!

Then, about the matter of patrons and patronesses for our dances, did you know that it's getting hard to find townspeople to come up to our Alma Mater's dances? This fact is true for the main and simple reason that the reception they receive when they arrive is so cold and the time they have is so dreary that they have no desire to return. They

must find their way to an empty seat somewhere in the gym, and after finding the seat there they must sit, having the monotony of sitting interrupted occasionally by a dance with some of the other patrons or patronesses. Perhaps a faculty member notices them and smiles, or possibly he may go over and ask a patroness for the next dance. But the latter is quite rare also! Nary a student approaches them. Maybe the general chairman thanks them for coming or maybe he doesn't. Isn't this a sad state of affairs?

We need not be so elaborate as larger colleges, nor do we have to have a long receiving line or the like. But we can be considerate of the men and women who take enough interest in us to act as patrons and patronesses for our dances. We might fix up a corner in the gym with chesterfield set and make them comfortable. Some of the fellows could save one dance for one of the patronesses. The general chairman could fill out half of their program, if the dance is a program dance. At least, most of the students could go over and say a few words to them during the course of the evening.

Anyway, students, let's try to make the patrons and patronesses enjoy coming to our dances.

Left Out

Everybody knows at some time in his life what it feels like to be left out.

The Lumberjack had about the same feeling when it was discovered that nowhere in the long list of extra curricular activities, clubs, organizations, sororities, or fraternities, in the Humboldt State Teacher's College catalog was mentioned the Humboldt Lumberjack. We hope that the omission was accidental, because we would certainly hate to think we either are a very small activity or that we are in reality a class room project. We suggest that the matter be looked into by the ones in charge of the catalog.

Sharpener Needed

We wonder if it would be possible to provide another pencil sharpener in the north end of the main lower hall. It seems a waste of time and energy for the students who have classes in the north end to march, walk or run down to the south end to sharpen a pencil. We have heard several complaints from both students and faculty members. Possibly some organization in the college can do something about the matter.

Atoning for their disadvantage in stature with a surprising fighting spirit and a near-impenetrable defense, the Humboldt State Teachers College basketball team threw a scare into the Santa Rosa Junior College quintet for a while, but were eventually defeated by a 31-19 score, Friday night, January 13.

Neither team was able to do much during the first half in the way of scoring with the local team leading, 13-3, after the first 20 minutes of play. The second half found each team hitting the bucket more often, although the advantage piled up by the Santa Rosans during the first part of the game was sufficient to give them the game.

The Humboldt team was 6 points behind with 8 minutes to play and seemed to be in the midst of a rally, but with the score 24-18, a determined Santa Rosa rally put the game on ice. Jack Simpson, who has been playing with the Humboldters for many years, looked good for the losers and dumped in 10 points to lead his team in scoring. Brooks, Santa Rosa center, copied high point honors for the tilt with 11.

The Junior College team had a decided height advantage over the invaders and were able to recover effectively at both ends of the court.

Every member of the Arcata squad who got in the game played well and fought hard, although the stage carrying the team did not arrive at Santa Rosa until 3:30 Friday morning.

Homer's "Odyssey", translated by T. E. Shaw. The translator is better known as Lawrence of Arabia, author of "Revolt in the Desert," and the translation is considered as one of the major literary events of the year.

"The Drift Fence" by Zane Grey is one of the author's typical Arizona westerns.

"The Egyptian Cross Mystery" is the latest of a series by an author whose identity is unknown. "Ellery Queen" is the pseudonym under which he writes and he has become famous for his use of the analytic-deductive method of writing.

"The Enchanted Canyon Fairy Story" by Homer H. Mitten has been presented to the college library by the author through Harriet Finne, whose family are personal friends of the author.
