PRE-REGISTRATION COMPULSORY NOW

Pre-registration hereafter at Humboldt College is to be compulsory, President Arthur S. Gist has announced. Failure to pre-register will be interpreted as late registration, with the usual penalty of two dollars for late registration.

Practical Course in Business Next Year

"Secretarial Training and Office Practice" is a new course to be offered in the commercial department next fall under the supervision of B. F. Wilson, professor of commerce. It is a thorough study of administrative economics planned to give the students a knowledge of the business executive's most important problems.

A study will be made of the following machines: Dupligrath, Multigrath, Addressograph, Mimeograph, Mimeoscope, Stenotype, Burroughs, Monroe and Sunstrand Calculators, Postage Stamp Machines, Dictaphones and Ediphones.

During the course consideration will be given to such subjects as: The use of the telephone, telegrams, cablegrams, radiograms and wireless services, filing, stencil cutting, and business graphics. It will be a three-unit course.

Jenkins Has Four Articles Accepted

Horace R. Jenkins, associate professor of industrial arts has had four different articles accepted by eastern magazines during the last year. The School Arts Magazine and Design have both accepted one article apiece, and the Industrial Arts Magazine has accepted two.

Mr. Jenkins has been asked to submit three other articles for publication during the year.

Magazines have material for publication over a year ahead; so these articles will not appear in any issue for about a year.

Board in Commons Reduced for March

The College Commons has reduced the board for the month of March from 60 cents to 50 cents per day for both breakfast and dinner. A small reduction was made last fall, and, if possible, the Commons would like to make some reduction for the rest of the semester.

Miss Ellen Johnson, head of the Commons Staff, says: "We hope to make some reduction for April and May, but because of the shortness of school time in these two months, the reductions may not be so great. However, we expect to give the students the full benefit of reduced food prices. If all outstanding board can be collected on schedule, it will be a decided benefit to all students taking regular meals in the Commons as it will make possible this reduction."

Light Opera Will Be Presented on May 17

May 17 is the date set for the three-act light opera, "Chimes of Normandy", to be given by the music department under the direction of Edmund V. Jeffers, associate professor of music, and Mrs. Jeffers.

The choruses, made up of members of the men's and women's glee clubs, have been working for the past few weeks on the songs for the opera and have them almost all learned, according to Mr. Jeffers.

The plot for "Chimes of Normandy" is carried through the opera almost entirely by song.

The complete cast of 35 will be announced later.

NEW HEALTH RULING PASSED BY FACULTY

EXCUSES FOR MISSING TESTS TO DEPEND ON PHYSICAL EXAMINATION

That all health excuses for absence from full period examinations or final examinations must be obtained from the College Physician was the rule passed by the Faculty at its last meeting and is effective on and after Monday, April 3.

Any student who is so ill that he is forced to miss an hour examination or a final examination should consult a physician for his own good, and should welcome the above rule. Very few students have to miss such examinations because of illness, and so only a very small number of students will be affected, according to Miss Craig of the Health Department.

The office of the College Physician are from 11:30 to 12:30 the first four days of the College week, and from 11:30 to 12:00 or Fridays in the Health Office.

College Green-House To Be Constructed

A greenhouse for the purpose of raising living material used by the botany class and for floriculture will be constructed soon between President Arthur S. Gist's home and the gymnasium, according to J. Wendell Howe, assistant professor of biological science.

Materials for the College grounds will be grown in the greenhouse as well as living material for the botany classes. The classes now use many materials in preserved form, according to Mr. Howe, who also says that the proposed course in floriculture will probably start the spring semester next year. It will offer school gardening, landscape gardening for homes and school yards, grafting, budding, and propagating of all kinds of plants.

Humboldt State Teachers College will be one of the few state colleges in the country which can use practically all living materials obtained on its campus, according to Mr. Howe.

Pi Alpha Pi Will Sponsor April Dance

President Wayne Simpson announced Tuesday afternoon that the next student body dance would be sponsored by Pi Alpha Pi, social science fraternity. The fraternity also intends to put on an assembly for the students on March 28.

The organization held a public pledging of its members at the last student body meeting, and from all evidences the Pi Alpha Pi is going strong in carrying out one of its purposes, "to have a definite influence upon college affairs."

Now that football has been reinstated, this institution lacks but one unit of being complete as a modern college. That vital unit is a debating team. Perhaps every other institution of higher learning in the country has a debating society. Such clubs have always formed a part of universities and there is no reason why Humboldt State should be deficient in this respect.

A well trained debating team could keep important issues of the day before the College. It would prove a valuable source of inspiration for school spirit. It would create initiative and public speaking ability on the part of those debating. The mere presentation of written facts is not convincing but to hear and see a debating team at work removes all doubt as to its justification.

Humboldt State is in a good position to enter into debating competition. The college is not lacking in material, for at least four good debaters can be found in a student body of three hundred and seventy students.

Means of transportation have been found for other activities, why not debating? Through the medium of debate, Humboldt State Teachers College would gain prestige and the reputation of a competing, growing college.

Support Football

The student body has definitely shown the desire to keep football as a major activity on its present basis. We who were opposed to its continuation have forgotten that feeling now and are 100 per cent back of a strong football program.

Because football is maintained on its present basis does not mean, however, that we can't make some improvement in our football administration. During the discussions in the Student Investigation Committee meetings, high optimism prevailed regarding the possibilities of increasing gate receipts by getting bigger crowds, especially by increasing the local turnout. Let's not forget any of the good suggestions made during the recent discussion on the football question. Remember that it is to our own advantage if we improve our football situation, because by next year at this time, the 74

dissatisfied ones may have increased to 174.

Let's get in practice boosting teams, because next year's football team will need all we can offer. We have a baseball team and a track team this spring. They, too, are student body activities, so let's get behind and push! If there are tickets to be sold, sell them (or at least try to). It's a known fact that it's harder to sell tickets now than ever before—all the more reason why we should have a large, strong force of boosters and ticket sellers.

Come on, fellows and girls, let's begin to show our spirit NOW! There's no time like the present.

Now that the basketball season is over, this question arises: Who would you put on an all county basketball team? In order to answer this question the Lumberjack has asked two men who know basketball inside and out to pick a team that they would consider an all county team. The two men are none other than "Bert" Munther and Frank Mendes. These men have been officials for the Independent Basketball League for the past three years in which time they have proven themselves capable referees.

First Team Strong
"For one forward position, we put G. Hadley. He is a good recovery man under the basket, and consistent on short shots. We make him captain because we consider him the most valuable player in the league. He plays a consistent team game, and his

passing is equal to that of any man in the league.

"For the other forward we pick Fleishman. He is adept in both short and long shots, can recover well and is a fine dribbler. This year he has played a great team game with all the best traits of sportsmanship.

"In due honor to O'Brien, we have selected him as center on the first team. Because of his height advantage he was able to recover from all opponents under both baskets. He was a good short shot man and played for the interest of the team.

"E. Hadley of the Sparklers, gets the assignment for one guard position. He is fast and a good defensive man. He covers his men well at all times. He is a good shot and handles the ball well.

"At the other guard position we put Jones of Ferndale. Although new to most fans, he is one of the best recovery men in the league. His height and ruggedness he used to his full advantage. His coolness while playing should benefit the work of any team.

Fast Second Squad
"On the second team we select Dunn as on forward. He is a good shot and a good recovery man and has done excellent work in some games. His defense work is about average.

"Howatt, Dunn's running mate on the Sparklers gets the call for the other forward. He is probably the best short shot man in the league and is also a good long shot. His weakness is his defensive work.

"Hash is one of the most consistent players in the loop. He knows basketball and is very cool, therefore we select him as captain of this team. He is a good shot and guard, and is one of the cleanest playing men in the league.

"Hemenway is a fast guard and good shot. His eagerness causes him to make numerous fouls. He has showed up very well even if it is his first year of Independent League basketball.

"We feel that the run between Jones and Kovacovich was a tossup until the latter's injury. Kovacovich is a good recovery man and an excellent long shot who has won many games by long distance shooting.

"Murphy, W. Simpson, Waldner and Brazil deserve honorable mention because of their speed and consistent fighting for the ball."

THREE NEW GAMES TO BE INTRODUCED

On Monday, April 3, at 12:15 p. m., students majoring in Physical Education will give exhibition matches of Badminton, Quoitennis and Paddle Tennis.

Badminton is an English game, being very popular in Canada. Exhibition matches by Canadian players throughout the U. S. has done much toward creating enthusiasm for the game. At present most of the large cities in the United States have organized Badminton clubs.

The game is played with racket similar to that of a tennis racket, only much lighter, and a shuttlecock made of cork and feathers. The shuttlecock is often referred to as the "bird". The court and net used, are also similar to that of tennis.

Alice Renfro and Carl Penn will be matched against Ruth Carson and Leo Sullivan in the mixed doubles match to demonstrate this game.

Quoitennis will be demonstrated by Dolores Henders, Donna Ivancich, Wayne Simpson and Jack Simpson. Quoitennis, sometimes known as Deck Tennis is fast and exciting. It is one of the newer games, adapted to either the playground or gymnasium, and also being particularly adapted to the decks of ocean liners.

Paddle Tennis is a miniature tennis game, using paddles instead of rackets. The regulation tennis ball is used and also the tennis net. This game will be demonstrated by Lucile Winter and Amy Vance.

RULES GOVERNING ARCHERY PRIZES

Rules governing the winning of archery prizes in the archery tournament which has started and will last until Friday, May 12, are:

1. PRIZES FOR NOVICES (Those archers who have begun shooting since school started last fall.)

(a) A Yew bow to the champion woman novice.

(b) A Yew bow to the champion man novice.

Prize (a) is to be given to novice woman making the highest score in a final match of 48 arrows at 30 yards. In order to compete in the final shoot, girl novices must qualify by shooting a score of 100 or over 30 arrows from a distance of 30 yards. The qualifying score must be shot before May 12, and must be filed with Mr. Telonicher. At least one person must witness the shooting of a qualifying score.

Prize (b) is to be given to novice man making the highest score in a final match of 60 arrows at 40 yards. In order to compete in the final shoot, men must shoot a qualifying score of 125 or better for 30 arrows from a distance of 40 yards. This qualifying score must be witnessed by at least one person and must be filed with Mr. Telonicher before May 12.

2. Prizes for Open Championship of H. S. T. C. (This competition is open to all students and faculty members of H. S. T. C. with the exception of Mr. Frost and Mr. Telonicher.)

(a) Choice of a yew bow or a set of footed arrows to the Women's Open Champion.

(b) Choice of a yew bow or a set of footed arrows to the Men's Open Champion.

Prize (a) is to be given to woman archer making the best score in a final match which will consist of a Columbia Round. In order to compete in the final shoot, women must qualify by shooting a score of 150 or better in a Columbia Round prior to May 12. This qualifying score must be witnessed by at least one person and must be filed with
