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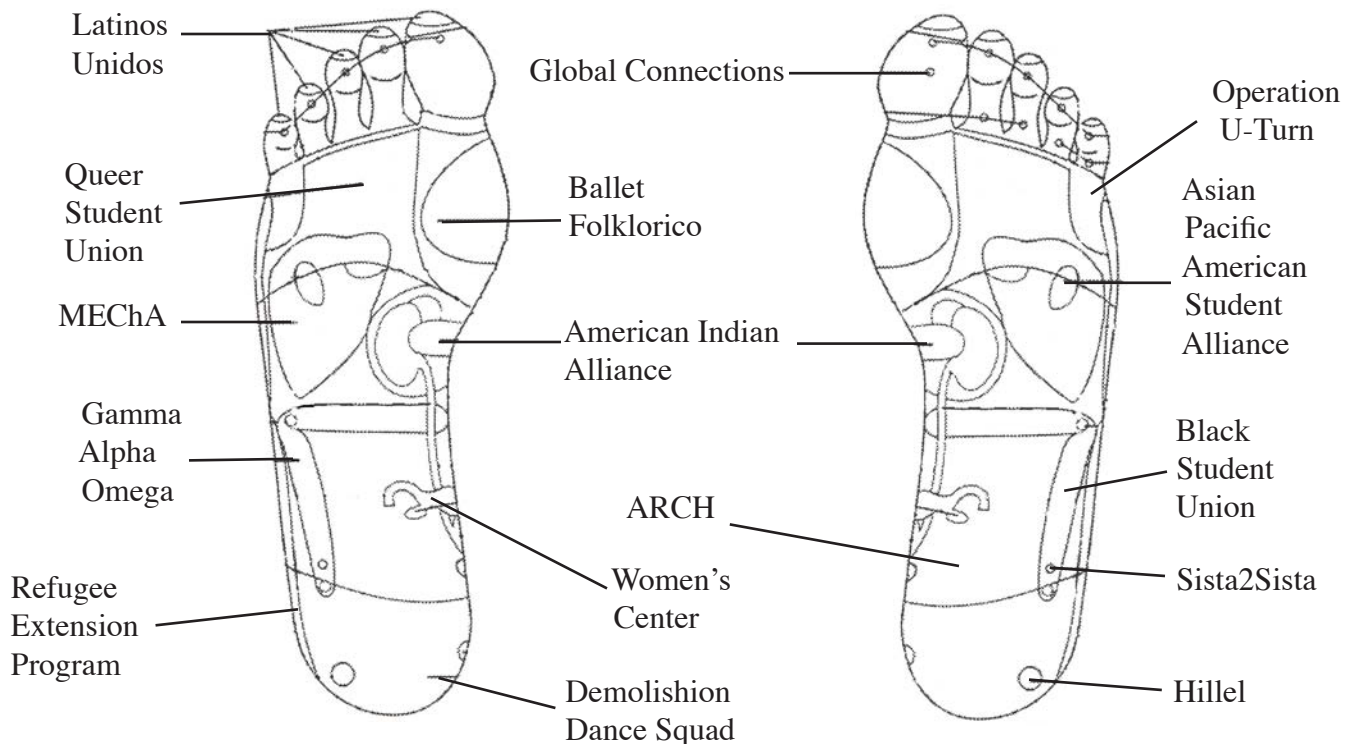

The Global Connections Club organized the 3rd Annual International Literature Festival, featuring: "Revolutionary Literature," a space where the main revolutions of a country meets the intellectuals that influenced them, and the writers who were influenced by them. This year's event took place on November 15, 2003 from 12PM to 3PM in Goodwin Forum. As usual, the event was free.

In the past we have featured renowned authors from Asia. Last year we had the pleasure of sharing our event with Ruth Behar a Cuban American woman with many Jewish stories to share and an incredible documentary about her return to Cuba and the search for her identity.

This event was started by the members of the club three years ago as a way to provide an outlet for our constant quest for ideas and knowledge. The inspiration was to provide an environment for the community to experience first hand the diversity of influences and interests that the members of the club wanted to explore. This unparalleled occasion developed into a yearly event offered to discover literature and diversity in a festive and accessible atmosphere.



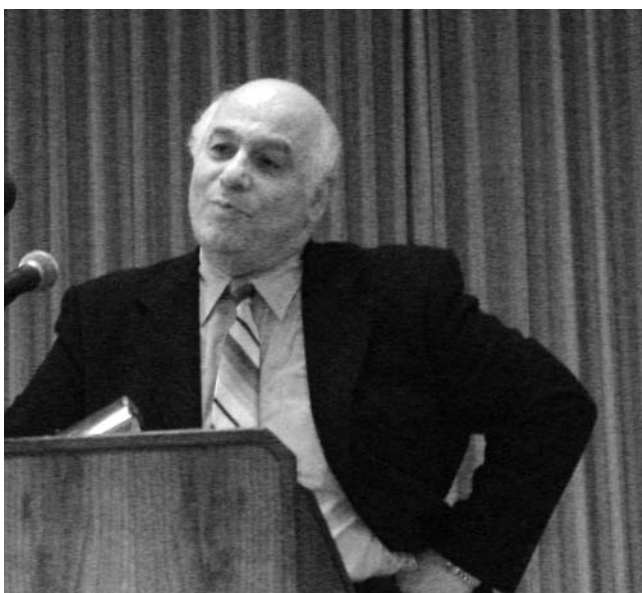


This year's festival began at noon with a presentation by HSU professor, Dr. Manuel Callahan. He talked about the revolution in Chiapas-Mexico and focused on the influence of Sub-Comandante Marcos, as well as a recent collection of communiqués.

Representing Colombia, we had Hector M. Hoyos. Currently working on his PhD. in Latin American Literature at Cornell University, he also won the Otto de Greiff National Prize for his research on Bogota's urban literature. His presentation was about the influence that the Bogotá political revolution has had and how several authors reflect it. He focused mainly on the literary works of Gabriel Garcia Marquez.

For our grand finale, we had Dr. Bahman Sholevar. An Iranian novelist, poet, psychiatrist, and an author of several books, Dr. Sholevar was going to talk about the creative process, but at the event decided to enlighten us with some of his poetry and his insight in revolutionary thinking. The dinner featured dishes from nine different Asian countries as well as performers from Humboldt and Del Norte Counties. The entire event was organized by the Asian Pacific American Student Alliance (APASA), who not only cooked the food, but served it to their many guests. Personally, the food was great, but it was all of the performances that made this event wonderful.

The performances started around 7PM and were hosted by Daeng Koupradit and Ker Thao. Marylyn gave a brief history of the event, and the purpose of the dinner is to share the diversity of Asian cultures. Daeng added, "It's as diverse as diverse gets!" The Crescent City girls performed a traditional dance from the Hmong culture, using graceful hands and steady rhythmic steps. Next The Humboldt State University Middle Eastern Dance Club performed an amazing dance that incited the crowd to cheer and tap their feet. There was a small demonstration of Korean Martial Arts, stealthy, flowing, and obviously powerful.

Ralph (HSU alumni) and Yoshi (HSU student), performed a rap about world peace that included counting in Japanese and a lot of laughing coming from the audience. There was a brief presentation of Dil Se, a Bollywood film from India, that inspired many to start watching more foreign films.
