26 MEN REPORT FOR FOOTBALL

MUCH PEP AND ENTHUSIASM
SHOWN AFTER THE ORDER
BY BOARD OF CONTROL

Rallying to the cause of the great college sport, 26 men turned out for football Tuesday afternoon at the Athletic field. For the first time since the opening of the present season there were two full teams out for the practice session.

Following the announcement of the ultimatum issued by the Board of Control which stated that there must be at least 25 men down on the field for every practice session between the dates of September 13, 1933, and September 27, 1933, a number of players were persuaded to go out for football. Included in the list of men who turned out for the first time Tuesday afternoon are Gene Lytel, former Eureka High player who won the "Most Valuable Player" award in 1931; Charlie Timmons, husky back, who bore the brunt of Humboldt's offense last season, and Harold Merriam, big lineman from Blue Lake.

At present neither Coach Fred Telonicher nor Captain Earl Tattman can make conjectures as to the strength of the squad because practices have been to spasmodic. Telonicher reported to the Board of Control that the average number of players at a practice session was about fifteen and that never did the same fifteen report for two consecutive afternoons for practice. The resolution made Monday night by the Board of Control is expected to eliminate this problem.

The loss of last year's stellar line players will be keenly felt, according to Coach Telonicher.

DR. PURYEAR WILL GIVE NEW COURSE

An extension course of unusual interest is being offered by Dr. Vernon J. Puryear, new instructor in history at Humboldt State Teachers College. He is to give a course on "Major Problems in Present-Day International Relations" which may be taken for credit, or audited as the student desires. It will be given at the Eureka high school on Tuesday evenings from 7:15 to 9. Dr. Puryear gave his first lecture last Tuesday.

Twelve lectures will be given with the following titles: Lecture 1—The Racial Foundations of World Politics.

Lecture 2—The Strategic Foundations of World Politics.

Lecture 3—The Economic Foundations of World Politics.

Lecture 4—The Russian Revolution, 1917-33.

Lecture 5—British Imperialism in India.

Lecture 6—The Foreign Policy of the United States.

Lecture 7—New Europe Under the Peace Treaties.

Lecture 8—Post War Germany.

Lecture 9—France and the Post-War Alliances.

Lecture 10—Central Europe, Crux of World Politics.

Lecture 11—The Far East, 1895-1933.

Lecture 12—Sea Power and the Pacific (subject to revision).

Those interested in taking the course should report on Tuesday evening, September 12. The fees will be \$9.50 for those desiring to take the course for credit, and \$6 for those who merely wish to audit the lectures. The course will carry two units of college credit.

BOARD OF CONTROL ISSUES ULTIMATUM

Student opinion with regard to the football situation at Humboldt came to a head Monday when the Board of Control and the executive council held a joint meeting to discuss ways and means of meeting the football problems at our college.

The meeting was the culmination of a wave of public sentiment demanding that something drastic be done to get a decent number of men out for the coming football season. The board decided that unless at least 25 men report to the athletic field for practice every night between Wednesday, September 13, and Wednesday, September 27, the football game with San Francisco State Teachers College on September 30 will be automatically cancelled.

Coach Fred Telonicher and other college officials went on record as definitely favoring the action of the student board.

The following resolution was passed by the student board of control:

"Whereas it is the opinion of the board of control that a minimum of 25 men is necessary for a satisfactory football competition at Humboldt State Teachers College; and

"Whereas the student body is working under a limited budget, "Be it hereby resolved that if 25 men are not out every practice session between the dates of Wednesday afternoon, September 13 and Wednesday afternoon, September 27, the regularly scheduled game with San Francisco State Teachers College will automatically be cancelled."

Changing of Courses Must Be Approved

Students making changes in their courses should be sure they are making them with official approval, Miss Imogene Platt, registrar, has announced.

Students desiring to change courses must consult their faculty advisor. The petition for changes must be signed by the instructor whose course is being dropped, by the instructor whose course is being added, by the faculty advisor, and by the registrar. No changes will be permitted after the third week of the semester. Failure to secure official permission to drop or add a course may jeopardize a student's credit.

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Official Withdrawal Necessary at H. S. T. C.

Students who for any reason find it necessary to leave Humboldt before the end of the semester are advised to withdraw officially, Miss Imogene Platt, registrar, said today.

Upon petition, an honorable dismissal or an indefinite leave of absence may be granted to any student in good standing, with the approval of his faculty advisor and of the registrar.

Students who discontinue their work without formal petition for leave of absence do so at the risk of incurring failing marks in their subjects and at the risk of having their registration privileges curtailed or entirely withdrawn.

Former Humboldt Faculty Member Dies

Mrs. Harry Nixon of Arcata, whose death occurred last week, was formerly a member of the faculty at Humboldt State Teachers College. Mrs. Nixon, who before her marriage, was Miss Fern Jackson, came to the college in the fall of 1917 and taught English here for two years.

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NEW EQUIPMENT FOR STUDENTS

Much new equipment and several innovations have been made possible this year by the Health and Physical Education Department, under the leadership of Miss Ann V. Craig.

The department is responsible for the renovated women's Rest Rooms. At present in the suite of rooms near the telephone booth, there are three new cots, several new upholstered chairs, a day bed, and all the walls in the rooms have been retinted. These rooms are for the use of all women students. Miss Craig urges that the suite be used for rest purposes only.

An emergency cot has been placed outside the health office for the men students. Football men will have the services of a first aid assistant in the employment of the health department. A purchase of interest to athletes is the new sun lamp which can be used by appointment in the health office.

The new equipment in the Physical education division is as follows: New soap containers in men's and women's showers at the Gymnasium, new mats for the Men's Tumbling Class, two badminton courts marked out on the gymnasium floor, a paddle tennis court marked out, and a new scales in the men's locker rooms. In addition, the department has purchased a Ping-Pong set, and has had the tennis courts resurfaced.

For the first time since the completion of the new gym, towels may be exchanged during the noon period. An assistant in the P. E. department in charge of towels will be available from 12:25 to 1:55 o'clock daily. Towels may be exchanged then by both men and women. Also, equipment for some games will be available at the noon period and may be borrowed for use.

Bonfire Rally Date Set for September 29

September 29 was the time set for the annual bonfire rally. Carl Owens was appointed chairman of the bonfire committee with Barney Bland and Bob Caviness as assistants. Charles Schmeder, Sophomore, was appointed Custodian of the Paddle. Gene Lytle, Ernest Brownlow, Bob Caviness and Charlie Timmons will be Schmeder's body guard and assistant paddle wielders.

William Ott, Wayne Simpson and Frank Look are to serve as judges of the court. Freshmen breaking any of the "Ten Commandments" or Rules will be given a fair trial with the three judges deciding their fate.

Last spring a proposal was made to increase fees for every one, but this proposal was not put into effect as far as a student living in the state is concerned. It did, however, go into effect for out-of-state students who pay \$75 tuition for the year.

U. C. Features Work Of History Professor

The discoveries that Dr. Vernon Puryear of Humboldt College has made on the causes of the Crimean War of the last century were featured recently in one of the weekly broadcasts of the University of California. Dr. Puryear obtained his Ph. D. degree from that university.

Dr. Puryear was credited with having shed considerable new light on the Crimean War period, the results of his research being embodied in a book, "England, Russia and the Straits Question, 1844-56," material for which he obtained while working in European archives.

NEW DANCE RULES AT HUMBOLDT STATE

The new dance rules at Humboldt State Teachers College went into effect last Friday night at the Freshman Reception Dance.

The following amendment was added to the constitution:

Amendment—Article—Section VII.

COLLEGE DANCES

1.—Those who are entitled to attend Student Body and class dances shall be:

- Student Body members.
- All faculty members and families.
- Holders of Alumni cards and one guest per card holder.

2.—Dance Bids.
a. Each Student Body member is entitled to one bid for a Student Body or class dance. The bid must be presented at the door and must bear the name of the guest and the name of the person giving the bid.

b. If the holder of the bid accompanies the person who's name appears on the bid as the bidder, he shall be admitted free, if not, he shall pay fifty cents (\$.50) admission at the gate.

c. Requests for dance bids shall be in not later than 4:00 p. m. of the day preceding the dance.

d. Bids shall not be issued to anyone attending college who is not a member of the Student Body. Such persons may be admitted only by special permission of the Board of Control.

3.—There shall be a Student Body member at the door at all times to enforce all rules governing dances and to collect any admission. He shall be paid by the Board of Control who shall determine his wages.

4.—Alumni cards shall be issued by the Board of Control to those who have attended college and fulfilled fitting requirements.

a. These cards shall entitle the bearer to attend dances and bring one guest.
