FRANNY MOORE OUT OF GAME SATURDAY

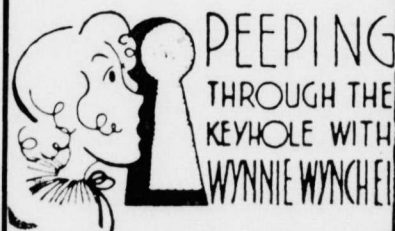

take the 'Frisco Gaters into the camp."

Led by Captain Earl Tatman, who boots them high far and where they ain't, the backfield is perhaps the scrappiest and most balanced quartet of any of Humboldt's former ball toters. This is Earl's fourth year as member of the team and he wants to win badly. In the other half-back position will be Earl Hemenway, fastest man on the squad. Although this is his first year of football competition, "Hem-stitch" has distinguished himself enough to draw the starting assignment. Timmons the hard hitting fullback, will probably start at that position with Wayne Simpson, veteran quarterback, barking out the signals.

Backfield men who will undoubtedly see action will be Len Hartman, a plenty tricky half-back, Joe Paul, who will be ready to play either fullback or tackle, Mel Christopher and Tommy Tinker, two dependable halfbacks. "Dynamite" Everett Watkins, the grittiest and surest tackler and blocker on the squad, in the writer's opinion, and many others will be ready to relieve Simpson at quarter.

The line will present a formidable array of former high school and college stars. As ends we can depend upon Bill Henders, Joe Walsh, Jim Hemphill and Leo Sullivan. With a quartet of receivers such as these we can be certain that the pay-off end of a pass will find a green and gold jersey player hugging the pigskin. Joe and Bill will probably start, with Sullivan shifting over to a tackle position which he covers like the proverbial blanket and Jimmy ready to relieve any one of the three. George Burwell, giant 215-pounder, Bob Caviness, Harold Merriam, and Ernie Brownlow will see that few opposing backs crash through tackle. With Sullivan, these husky lads are all veterans at the game. The center of the line will be guarded by Gene Lytle, Clyde Brownlow, Louis Canepa, Gene Thompson and Frank Look as guard, and Charles Schmeder and George Inskip as center. Lytle and Brownlow will probably start at guard, with Schmeder snapping them back.

All in all, things don't look so gloomy for the Highlanders.

Indian Stories Theme Of Jeffers Research

Delbert Jeffers, of the college English department, is doing research in the field of Indian folk lore and old pioneer stories of Northern California.

The Southwestern Literary Society of San Antonio, Texas, has been collecting legends of the Southern Indians, but few have ever tried to find out about the Indians of Northern California, it is said.
