Several Courses for Drama, Speech Listed

Public Speaking 1-B will be given next semester for the first time in a year and a half. This course continues and enlarges upon work done in Public Speaking 1-A. There will be Play Production 155-B for advanced students in drama interested in directing and designing and production of plays.

For those who have taken all other courses in speech and who want further work in some phase of drama, Advanced Dramatics 120 is offered. It is a "dhr" course and the content will depend upon the needs of the students.

Dramatic Workshop will be given but it will be strictly limited to those students who proved themselves good workers and really interested in dramatic activities, according to Garf Bell Wilson. This course requires no text books and has no examinations. The work consists in the actual preparation of plays for public performance.

ASSEMBLY PERIOD REALLY TO 'FLOAT'

SYSTEM OF ROTATION PLAN
FOR NEXT SEMESTER;
HOURS ARE SET

Assemblies will really "float" next semester.

Formerly the 10 o'clock period was kept free from class assignments and was used exclusively for assemblies. This fall it was decided to let the assembly hour "float"—that is, be called during class periods—so that three-hour classes could be scheduled on Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 10 a. m.

However, instead of "floating" the assembly hour seemed to remain nearly stationary, because many of them came at 10 o'clock on Fridays this semester, thereby disrupting the same class.

The following communication from President Arthur S. Gist shows the plan for next semester:

"Following a suggestion which came to the President's office, no regular hour was scheduled for assembly this semester. The plan was to use the 'floating' schedule plan. It apparently has not been successful during the pres-

ent semester. The following is suggested for the second semester:

Brizard Executive Suggests
Department Store Training

The day will come when high schools and colleges will give courses preparing students to go to work in department stores, believes Jess I. Lubin, manager for A. Brizard, Inc., of Arcata.

Mr. Lubin spoke last week to students of the Humboldt State Commerce department. After his introduction by Bert F. Wilson of the faculty, Mr. Lubin told of the history of the department store, described its organization and administration, and discussed the training needed to fit a person for this work.

Portions of his address dealing specifically with the employee follow:

"The larger stores do not put people in contact with the public without definite training. Experienced teachers are training these people just the same as students are being trained in college. They are taught the importance of things that have to do with the routine of the particular store, with particular emphasis on courtesy. In the department store, the whole organization may, and is, often judged by one girl. The employees are trained how to win the faith, respect, and confidence of the customers. The hardest problem is to get people to be courteous even when they do not feel well.

In a smaller store it is possible for the owner to extend his courtesy personally to each customer. If it wasn't for this, it is doubtful if there would be any

small type department store.

"I have had a great deal of experience with employing people. One type of test given to the average college men and women who apply for a position, would be to give them a problem such as this: Multiply 17 4/8 by 16 2/3. A very small per cent of them could actually work that simple problem in fractions.

"Dr. Nystrom, who is definitely the authority on mercantile work, has said that 25 per cent of the high school graduates go into the retail stores and less than 1/10 of one per cent of them have any training for retailing. In the average large department store 80 per cent of the employees are women and 20 per cent are men.

"I believe that the day will come, and very quickly, when colleges and high schools will stop giving such courses as Business Administration, which definitely unfits its student to start at the bottom, and offer courses in department-stores training.

"When we see how many have put in years of training to be doctors, lawyers, engineers, knowing that 25 per cent of them will eventually go into a department store, the logical thing is to establish a course in department store training. Business Administration is definitely harmful, except for the son of an owner. It works a peculiar feeling on the average man. It gives him the 'swell head', makes him too proud to sweep floors, or to actually sell anything, because he has spent four years of training in business administration.

"One of the unknown things is the reason for promotion. A great many things have their ef-

fect on it. Ability is one and opportunity another. One can't make opportunity; however, we can be ready for the opportunity."
