HUMBOLDT "FROSH" GET HIGH RATING

STUDENTS HERE SEVENTH OF FORTY SCHOOLS IN APTITUDE TEST

Humboldt State College freshmen who entered in September, 1934, stand seventh highest on a list of 40 colleges in intellectual rating, according to results of the test recently released by Leo Schussmann, professor of education and psychology at Humboldt State.

The test, "The Teachers College Psychological Examination," known here amongst students as the "aptitude test," was given entering freshmen last fall by Professor Schussmann. The same test was given in a number of other teachers colleges all over the United States.

Of the colleges given the test, 40 reported results and Humboldt's standing was made known in the tabulation.

No comparison of the intellectual rating of students in California's seven teachers colleges is possible because only Humboldt and San Jose gave this test and San Jose did not report its results.

The total number of students participating from the 40 teachers colleges was 8792; the number from Humboldt was 85.

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Timmons Gets Praise From Sports Editor

Charlie Timmons, captain of the Humboldt State five and student body president, was mentioned recently in "Long Shots and Setups," a sports column conducted by Gordon Hadley, Humboldt Times sports editor, as "pulling a neat bit of psychology against the Scotia Lumberjacks."

"With three minutes to go and four behind," the article continues, "Timmons took time out and asked the timer how much time was left. When he returned to his team he told his men they had five minutes to play, and at the same time said to take things easy and work their plays."

"As a result, Humboldt overtook Scotia and came out the winner, 27-33. Many a team has lost a game by trying to put on a wild spree in the last few minutes while the cooler and smoother team usually comes out the victors."

A list of "Don'ts" was discussed. 1. Don't apply for a position unless you are sure a vacancy exists. 2. Don't belittle other candidates. 3. Don't underbid for a position. 4. Don't over-sell yourself. 5. Don't underrate your ability. 6. Don't overlook local conditions in applying. 7. Don't use "pressure" and unethical methods in securing positions. 8. Don't use references without consent. 9. Don't use references who know nothing about your personal or professional qualifications.

The average reported from the college which made the best score (which incidentally, is not named in the report sent out from headquarters) was 88; Humboldt's average was 71; the average of all the colleges was 59; the average made by the lowest college (which, again, was not named in the published results) was 35.

The rating shows that Humboldt was not only seventh highest on the list, but was 12 points above the average of all colleges taken together.
