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Field Trips Taken In Studying Birds

Courses

Students who have dropped courses without official approval are reminded that they may be recorded as failures if they do not comply with faculty regulations as laid down on page 20 of the college bulletin.

Incidentally students will see that the status changes during the second and third six weeks periods of the semester as follows:

"A student dropping a course with official approval during the first six weeks of any semester will not have that course reported or charged against his record for that semester.

"During the second six weeks of any semester, a student may be permitted to drop a course without prejudice to his record in case this is done with the approval of the advisory committee, such approval to be based presumably upon the consideration of health, outside work, or other matters for which the student is not held culpable. Otherwise, the dropping of the course during this interval will be recorded as a failure.

"During the final six weeks of any semester, the dropping of a course will result in a record of failure or incomplete, depending upon whether the work had been of passing grade up to the time of withdrawal."

Chi Sigma Epsilon Plan for Assembly

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Think You Are Old? Then Read of These

The next time that some of the Humboldt students think that they are getting old and perhaps are discouraged, they should take a trip up to Clam Beach or Trinidad and look over the fossil beds in those localities.

The paleontology class of the college recently made a field trip to these localities, and upon returning were asked by Harry D. MacGinitie, assistant professor of physical science, to try to determine the age of the deposits.

The reports on the Clam Beach area were varied, ranging from the early pliocene to the late pliocene, or from about 17 million years ago to five million years ago. At Trinidad the verdict was mostly for the late pleistocene period, a mere half-million years old. It will be noted that the Trinidad deposits existed at about the time of the glacial age.

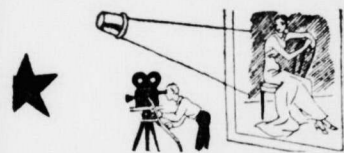
The "feed" was followed by games and folk dancing in the gymnasium, after which the group attended the play.
