"LADIES OF THE JURY" TO

"Ladies of the Jury" is an exciting, hilarious farce, according to Garff Bell Wilson, director, who will present the play, May 15 in the college auditorium. Donald Inskip is assistant director.

"Practically the whole school has been regimented for the play, actors have been taken from every walk of school life," said Mr. Wilson. 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Two Courses in Nature Study To Be Given In Summer Term

In accordance with the popular interest in nature study and the emphasis placed upon general science in the public schools, two timely courses in these subjects, one elementary, one advanced, will be given at the coming summer session of Humboldt State Teachers College.

The elementary nature study course will include an introduction to the flowering plants—trees, shrubs and flowers—supplemented by a study of ferns, mushrooms, toadstools, lichens, mosses and liverworts of this region. Frequent short field trips will be taken, and a continuous wild flower exhibit will be maintained. Besides the study of plants there will be the studies of insects, which will include

moths, butterflies, beetles and "bugs", their names, life histories and peculiarities. Interesting habits of mammals and reptiles will complete the studies in wild life.

The Advanced Nature Study course is designed for those who have had elementary courses in science, or who are already acquainted with the the salient facts of the flora and fauna. The economic, medicinal and poisonous aspects of plants, the beneficial and injurious actions of insects, a study of physiography and the weather as it affects the distribution of wild life—these are some of the subjects that will be studied.

Dr. Doris Kildale Gillespie will teach both courses.

Poultney Is at Home After Illness in S. F.

Robert Poultney, Humboldt State faculty member who was taken ill in San Francisco two weeks ago while on his way back to Arcata from Fresno, where he had gone to attend professional conference, has been brought back to Arcata. He is getting along as well as can be expected but must remain quiet for some time yet and is not allowed to receive visitors.

His classes are being conducted by Professors MacGinitie and Howe of the science department and by Miss Jane Cotter of Eureka. Miss Cotter, a former student of Humboldt State and a graduate of the University of California, is a bacteriologist and medical technician, with an office in Eureka.

MacGinitie Speaker Before Two Groups

Harry D. MacGinitie of the science faculty spoke before two different groups last week, speaking before the Astronomy Club on Wednesday and the Arcata Kiwanis Club on Thursday.

The nature of light, the meaning of color and the theory of the spectroscope were discussed by Mr. MacGinitie at the Astronomy Club. He talked about the early history of the Pacific Coast before the Kiwanis Club and explained in full the formation of the Lagoons, the terraces and the erosion surface of the inland.
