**TURKEY DANCE TO BE GIVEN
IN FIREMEN'S HALL
NOVEMBER 16**

The now-famous rally committee announces the big Turkey dance, to be given at the Arcata Firemen's Hall, November 16, from 9 to 3. This dance is sponsored by the rally committee in conjunction with the Arcata Firemen.

Proceeds from the dance will be used to send the band to San Jose November 21, when Humboldt journeys down there for the final football game of the season. Students are invited to make next Saturday their night in Arcata for a good time.

The "Special Train" Dance at Loleta, formerly announced, has been cancelled, as the Arcata Firemen had previously scheduled their dance for this date, and they indicated their willingness to cooperate with the rally committee on their affair.

Cralle's nine piece orchestra furnishes the music, and special door prizes of turkeys will be awarded throughout the evening. The college is contributing program numbers, among them tap dancing features by college coeds, directed by Mrs. Monica Wright Hadley, vocalists, and other talent.

Tentative plans are for a caravan starting from Arcata Saturday afternoon, led by the band, which will tour Eureka and other county points advertising the dance. Pre-sale of tickets will be managed by Carl Owen, band director, and rally committee members.

The rally committee, John Bau-riedel, chairman, Emy Lou Grove, Carl Owen, Harry Falk, Jr., and Garff B. Wilson, promise that this affair will be one of the biggest and best dances of the season.

TOUGH OPPONENTS IN SAN JOSE TEAM

A first-quarter touchdown gave Redlands University a 7-0 victory over the San Jose football team Monday at San Jose. The game was close, and Coach Charley Erb of Humboldt, who scouted the contest, reported that the San Jose team is all it is cracked up to be and more.

Humboldt is scheduled to wind up its season Friday of next week in a game with the sister college at San Jose. The green and gold team will take the field as the underdog in this game in spite of its undefeated season.

San Jose will be the fourth four-year college met by Humboldt in football this season. Other four-year opponents were San Francisco State, California Aggies and Chico State. San Jose held the college of Pacific to a 0-0 tie and gave the Stanford Indians a real workout in their season's opener. Fans who saw the game said the San Jose linemen outplayed Stanford's All Americans.

The Spartans will be far the toughest opponents met by Humboldt this year and will have the advantage of playing on their home field. Coach Dud DeGroot has an unlimited supply of reserve material compared to Humboldt's reserve strength which is depleted because of injuries.

Two weeks of hard work is the prescription Coach Charley Erb is giving his men in preparation for the San Jose game.

Physical "Ed" Majors Hear State Officers

W. H. Orion, chief of the division of Physical health and Education for California addressed the physical education majors last Friday at the college.

He stated that prior to the World War physical education was purely elective in the schools. When the war showed up the deplorable conditions, laws were passed in some states (including California) which made physical education compulsory. This caused a mushroom growth of physical education, and a search was begun for teachers capable of teaching this subject. He disclosed that California was among the top four states having the best in physical education.

Heralding the coming of basketball season, light workouts have been started this week for candidates for positions on this year's Humboldt State five. Regular practice will not start until the completion of the football schedule, but men who are not out for football are urged to start working by Coach Fred Telonicher.

Coach Telonicher has scheduled tentative games with San Francisco and Chico State, major Humboldt opponents last year and is also seeking games with Marin Junior college and Southern Oregon Normal at Ashland. The San Francisco series will be played in the bay city.

With only three varsity letter men returning Coach Telonicher will be faced with the task of re-building the squad this year.

The returning Humboldt lettermen are Wally Lozensky, center; Franny Moore and Paul Hunter, guards. Hunter and Moore alternated at the same forward berth last year.

Several members of the football squad are top-notch basketball players and will bolster the Green and Gold cage team this season. Humboldt will en-league again this year to meet leading county teams in preparation for college competition.

The Hollander Sparklers, one of the leading independent outfits, has started practice already in the Humboldt Gymn and promise to give the college plenty of opposition.

The train will leave Third and Townsend street San Francisco, at 10:00 a. m. Friday, bound for San Jose. Other trains will leave at 11:00 o'clock and 12:15, it was announced.

Most students are planning to stay for a celebration in San Jose after the game but for those who wish to come North trains will leave the game town at 5:50 p. m., 7:40 p. m. and 10:00 p. m.

**105 PERSONS TO TAKE PART
IN PRODUCTION UNDER
E. V. JEFFERS**

A dramatic tragedy of Old Spain is portrayed in the opera "Carmen" which the music department of the college directed by Edmund V. Jeffers, is presenting Tuesday evening November 26, and Wednesday afternoon, November 27, in the college auditorium in concert form.

The A Cappella Choir, Men's and Women's Glee clubs, and Little Symphony Orchestra, and five soloists will combine for this production. In all, 105 musicians will take part in the opera.

The role of "Carmen," bewitching, treacherous gypsy girl who is the central figure of the story, will be sung by Carla Peterson, winner of the County Federation of Women's club scholarship in voice. The male lead, "Don Jose," will be taken by Lewis Farone, tenor soloist from the College of the Pacific.

The other soloists are: "Micaela," a country maid, Mrs. Kay Garrison of Eureka; "Escamillo," the bullfighter, Bruce Handley of the College of the Pacific; "Morales," a smuggler, George Inskip, former H.S.C. student.

The Wednesday afternoon performance of the opera will be for high school and college students. It will start promptly at 2:00 p. m. in the college auditorium. College students will not be admitted Tuesday evening because of limited seating facilities.

According to Mr. Jeffers, Carmen is a very popular opera now, evidenced by the fact that the W. Tams Music Library, from which the orchestra scores are rented, requested return of the scores as soon as possible, as the demand far exceeds the supply of parts. Selections from "Carmen" have been featured often recently on the stage, screen, and over the radio.

The stage setting and lighting effects will be directed by John Van Duzer, technical director of the dramatics department, assisted by Harold Jenkins.

"Thumb-Nail" Biographies Of Humboldt Players, Concluded

Bernard "Barney" Hutsiniller, guard, born in Anaconda, Montana, attended Del Norte high school where he played two years of football at center. "Barney" also went to Stanford University for two quarters and while there won the University heavyweight wrestling championship. Last year he held down a guard berth on Humboldt eleven. Weight 173 pounds and stands 5 ft. 10 inches.

Gene Lytle guard: has lived all his life in Eureka. At Eureka high he played three years at football at guard; in his senior year won a silver football trophy as the most valuable player. This is Gene's fourth year at guard for Humboldt State. Weight 170 pounds and stands 5 ft. 8½ inches.

Wendell "Windy" Moore, fullback, was born in Crescent City. Attended Del Norte High school and upon graduation had his name placed on the Fraser Cup as the best athlete of his class. "Windy" has four years of football at fullback, two years of basketball at guard, three years of baseball as an outfielder and two years of track as a weight man to his high school credit. Last year he played fullback for the University of San Francisco, frosh, but didn't return this year because in April he took unto himself a wife, an ex-school mate, the former Midge Miller. Weight 186 pounds and stands 6 ft.

Robert "Bob" Madsen, center: born in Eureka. At Eureka high "Bob" played one year of football at center and ran the mile and half mile for three years in track. Weight 180 pounds and stands 6 ft.

Anders "Andy" Nielsen, end has lived most of his life in and about Arcata. At Arcata high he played three years of football at half, three years of basketball at forward, and three years of baseball in practically every position on the diamond. Last year "Andy" played halfback on the California Poly football team. Weight 160 pounds and stands 5 ft. 10½ inches.

Jack Ellis, end born in Sac-

ramento. Attended Fortuna high where he played on year of basketball at shortstop and did three years of pole vaulting in track. Weight 162 pounds and stands 5 ft. 7 inches.

Raymon "Ray" Carroll, end is another Arcata boy. At Arcata high he played but one game of football and in that broke his leg. However, "Ray" has played two years of basketball at forward and guard, the later position on Arcata's championship team of 1934. In baseball he played the outfield for two years and in track ran the 440 and put the shot for a like period. At the Northern California meet held in Ukiah last spring he placed first in the football throw with a heave of sixty-three yds. Weighs 160 pounds and stands 5 ft. 8 inches.

Wesley Hunter, guard: was born in his present home town of Petrolia. He spent his first three years of high school there, transferring to Ferndale high in his senior year. At Ferndale Wesley made his letter in track, running the quarter and half miles. Weight 155 pounds and stands 5 ft. 8½ inches.

Frank "Kanzie" Simas, tackle, has spent all his life in Arcata. At Arcata High he played four years of football at fullback, four years of basketball at guard, and four years of track, running the hundred and two-hundred yard dashes. For three years Frank was named on the all-county football team, a record which speaks for itself.

Weight 175 pounds and stands 5 ft. 10 inches.

H. MOORE VISITOR

Herbert Moore, former Humboldt State student and basketball star, brother of Franny and Jimmy Moore, present State students, was a visitor at the college last week-end. Moore is now attending the University of California medical school.

BONFIRE POSTPONED

The bonfire rally scheduled for the night before the Santa Rosa game was postponed until Tuesday, November 19, when it will be used as a semi-off rally for the San Jose trip.

HALFBACK IS CROONER

Status Of Dropped Courses Changes With The Calendar

"If I drop that course, will I get an 'F' or a 'W'?"

The answer to this question, asked recently by more than one student varies with the calendar; that is, the status of a student who drops a course depends on whether the dropping of the course was done in the first, second, or third six-weeks period of the semester, a member of the college administrative staff said yesterday. This is the eleventh week of the semester.

A student dropping a course with official approval during the first six weeks of any semester will not have that course reported or charged against his record for that semester.

During the second six weeks of any semester, a student may be permitted to drop a course without prejudice to his record in case this is done with the approval of an advisory committee, such approval to be based presumably upon considerations of health, outside work, or other matters for which the student is not held culpable. Otherwise, the dropping of the course during this interval will be recorded as a failure.

During the final six weeks of any semester, the dropping of a course will result in a record of failure or incomplete, depending upon whether the work had been of passing grade up to the time of withdrawal.

Or, to use the vernacular: O. K. during the first six weeks; O. K., probably, during the second six weeks, provided "the student is not help culpable"; just

too bad if done in the third six weeks, for one will get an "F" or an "Inc."

The foregoing regulations apply to students who have followed the prescribed routine which is, first to obtain the proper form of petition; second, to consult with his advisor; third, if the advisor's approval is obtained to confer with the instructor of the class concerned.
