COLLEGE PLAYERS TO GO TO CHICO FOR FIFTH ANNUAL PLAY FESTIVAL

A week-end of entertainment awaits the Humboldt College players when they go to Chico this coming Friday to participate in the fifth annual play festival of Chico State College.

Leaving nothing un-done, the Chico group has arranged a lively program for the visiting Humboldt-ers.

The players will leave here by bus at 6:00 a. m. Friday. The Cardinal and Blue Keys Society, Chico State service group will meet the players and furnish entertainment and sightseeing for them.

On Friday evening the visitors will witness the Chico production of "Death Takes a Holiday". Following the play a reception will be held for the Humboldt Players

at the college.

Saturday noon the Chico chapter of Alpha Psi Omega, national dramatic society, will entertain the visitors at a luncheon at the home of Anna Louise Barney, Dean of Women and former Chico drama director.

Saturday evening a buffet supper will be served at Bidwell Hall. That evening the Humboldt players will give their second production of "Petrified Forest", which pleased a large audience here.

An inter-sorority formal will be held at Richardson Springs Saturday evening. Dates will be arranged for all visiting Humboldt men, it was announced.

New Equipment For Elementary School Will Be Installed

Youngsters at the Humboldt State College Elementary School will soon have a completely equipped playground according to President Arthur S. Gist.

Several new pieces of playground equipment have been purchased and will be installed at an early date to furnish recreation for the smaller children, the college president announced.

Opportunity Knocks Twice

The last issue of the State College Bulletin, recently published by Bert F. Wilson, contains information on the new "Bachelor of Education" degree. Following is a quotation from the bulletin:

The new degree, "Bachelor of Education," offered by the State Colleges, is being heralded by a considerable portion of the teachers of the state as a new educational opportunity. Successful experience and educational activities are now to be evaluated as a substitute for certain academic and professional courses.

The action of the State Board of Education last January in giving to the state colleges and power to award the Bachelor of Education degree has already caused considerable comment. Inquiries seem to indicate that a large number of the teachers will accept the challenge to improve their rating and future outlook.

"This recent action of the Board of Education will make it possible to secure a baccalaureate degree without meeting the traditional technical academic requirements involving academic majors and minors and other detailed prescriptions of the Bachelor of Arts degree. It should prove to be a boon to the State Colleges as well as to approximately three-fourths of the elementary teachers in the state. The State Department of Education has been requested to place an order for 7,000 Application Blanks for Candidates."

Class Attendance

There has been much confusion shown lately regarding the rules of attendance to classes. This was brought about by the fact that a new system was inaugurated this semester instead of the method used last semester, which allowed students twice the number of cuts as the course had units. This proved somewhat unsatisfactory as many students believed that because so many absences were allowed that it was necessary to take them. This semester regulation of attendance in each class has been left to the instructors of that class.

Regular attendance to classes is highly important and the administration and the faculty are experimenting by putting each student on his own responsibility and providing no severe penalty for absences. All Freshmen should secure health excuses from the health office for absence due to illness and should become acquainted with the facilities of health department.

Students securing approval of the President's office for absences are still responsible to instructors of each class missed. This new experiment in attendance regulations will be studied carefully by the administration and faculty.

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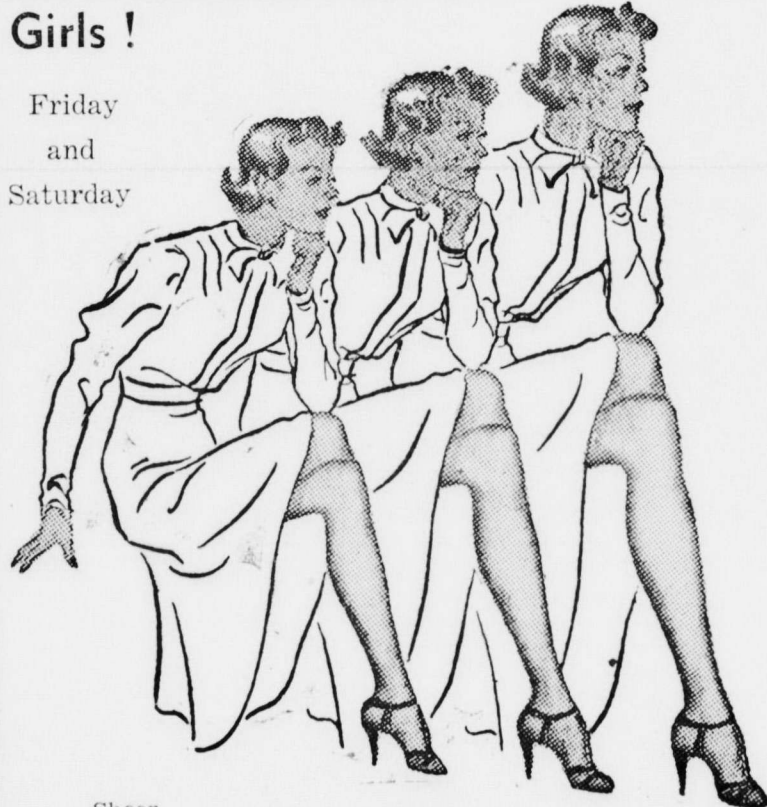

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Student Officers Invited to Meet At Fresno State

Fresno, Cal., April 6—Student body leaders of Humboldt State College and ninety three western colleges and universities have been invited to attend the fourteenth annual congress of the Pacific Student Presidents Association at Fresno State College May 19-22. James Mayer, Fresno State president and convention host, announced today.

"The convention seeks to promote friendly relations among meber colleges and universities, and to afford the student leaders on their respective campi the opportunity of learning why, what, and how things are being done by other student governments", declared Mayer, who is also national treasurer of the student presidents' group.

With an overnight trip to Yosemite Valley the feature of the program, plans for the four-day conclave have been completed by Norman Johnson of the University of Southern California president of the Pacific Association. Prominent statesmen and other figures of national importance have been secured as speakers, and the delegates will hear a report of the national convention which was held in New York city last December. A radio broadcast over a national hookup, sports and dances are also on the program.

Miss Craig Tells Findings of the P. E. Conference

Highlights of the annual Conference of the California Association of Health, Physical Education and Recreation held in Fresno March 19-20, described by Miss Anne Craig, who recently returned from the meeting, were as follows:

1. "Held in the beautiful new auditorium building used for the first time for a convention."
2. "Enthusiastic personality, skillfulness and an ability to grow in the job, are necessary qualifications for a recreational leader", Glenn Grant, director of the Western Section of the National Recreation Association, said.
3. "Students who are physical education majors find difficulty in transferring to other colleges. This is especially true in changing from the smaller college or junior college, to a larger university."
4. "There is no use in taking a P.E. course just so you can get your secondary credential in four years. Without any doubt, we are telling you that it is going to take five years in the future."
