INDIAN ARROW TREES

Indian Arrow Trees, as the name implies, are certain trees, that the Indians of Humboldt and Del Norte Counties or the Hoopa and the Klamath tribes, used as a ceremonial tree. The different tribes of Indians would select a tree between two tribes. As they came down the trail in passing from their own territory into another tribes territory, they would have to pass one of these trees. When they came to one of these trees, it was a religious ceremony to shoot an arrow or if they carried no weapons, it was customary to sharpen a small stick into the bark. If they carried weapons and were just going to visit the next village, they usually left their bow and quiver lying under the tree. If they were passing through the territory, they were allowed to carry their weapons.

By shooting an arrow or throwing a sharpened stick into the trunk of the tree, it showed that they were on a peaceful journey. In case they would ever get into trouble while they were in that territory and they could prove that they had performed the religious ceremony at one of these trees, they are often allowed to carry their weapons and pass on their way or the punishment would not be so severe depending upon the crime.

In selecting these Indian Arrow Trees, they usually chose a Redwood tree. This was a live tree and there would be no branches or limbs low down. The trees were selected half way between two villages. If one village was in one valley and the other was in another valley across the mountain they would select their tree up on the mountain side depending where the half way distance was.

There are three known Indian Arrow Trees to me. One is on the road leading from Korbelt going up Big Bend of Mad river. It is only about two miles from Korbelt. It has been named and a plate put on the tree by some Ladies Society of Blue Lake. The other two are situated back of Crannel and one on the top of the ridge separating Orleans from the Klamath river. These latter two are very inaccessible places to get at.
