SPECIAL STUDENT BODY ASSEMBLY CALLED TO DISCUSS SOCIAL UNIT; PROFS GIVE PLAN FOR SANE OPERATION BY STUDENTS

Are Humboldt State Students mature enough to accept the responsibilities of maintaining the Social Unit in a proper way, to observe all regulations and to keep in check all violaters of these regulations? This was the question which was discussed in a special student body assembly called by the administration.

Garff Bell Wilson, men's adviser, presided and led the discussion with a short talk in which the issue facing the college was set forth in clear terms. He did not lecture or plead with the assembled students; he merely put it up to them as a whole to see that the minority toes the mark by the majority who otherwise have to suffer with them in their punishment.

Miss Zula Z. Ballew, dean of the women, gave a short talk in which she brought the violations to light by stating specific instances where there had been infringements of the rules.

After open discussion from the group, Mr. Wilson outlined a tentative plan by which a set of rules should be drawn up and everyone who signed them would be responsible for upholding them and seeing that others upheld them. This petition would be posted on the door of the Social Unit and only these people who have signed will be allowed the use of the room.

In spite of indifference on the part of the majority, a sufficient number of votes was cast to enable this plan to operate. So the Social Unit will be opened in the near future and the students' sense of responsibility will once more be put to the test.

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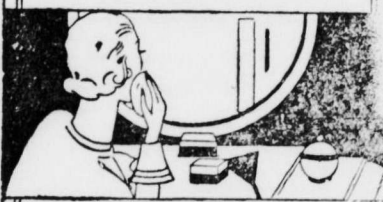

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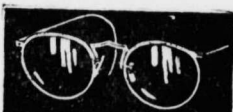
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
