William H. Smith, Eureka photographer, recently gave the last of a series of three lectures to members of the Humboldt State College photography class.

Smith illustrated his lectures with many of his own pictures, both original prints and reproductions, which have been widely published, including a number of full pages of his feature pictures appearing in large metropolitan center newspaper Sunday rotogravure sections appearing both in ages of the day in his work for The National Geographic Society, The Saturday Evening Post, Vogue and Harper's Bazaar magazines and as photographic correspondent pictures intended for publication use, how photographs are reproduced in publications, the usual fees paid for publication rights, and the covering of news picture assignments.

R. O. T. C. Bill Is Explained By San Jose Professor

Dr. W. T. MacQuarrie of San Jose State College urges students to investigate thoroughly the proposed R. O. T. C. Legislation before raising protest in Sacramento.

He stated, "the R. O. T. C. Windmill is again being raised on the campus and the Don Quixotes are having a grand try at it. This in one time when you can get the facts. You don't have to take the word of the agitators, misinformed or vicious, but you can go to the library and look up the bill for yourself. I had not heard about any move to establish R. O. T. C.'s in the colleges until I read in the Daily some time ago that a bill with that intent had been presented to the Legislature I went to the library and looked it up.

If I can understand simple English, it does not require the State Board of Education to put R. O. T. C. units into the colleges, nor does it make the training compulsory. In fact, it gives to the Board no authority which it does not have already. Under its general provisions, the State Board of Education upon the recommendation of the Director of Education now has the authority to put R. O. T. C. training into the state colleges, and it can, if it wishes, make it compulsory.
