SAN JOSE IS ONE OF BEST ON THE COAST

San Jose State is going to be one tough nut for the Humboldt "Thunderbolts" to crack. San Jose is rated as the highest scoring team in the nation today. Previous to the Santa Clara game which San Jose lost 25 to 2 the Spartans had won six games and tied one.

The toughest team that San Jose has played besides Santa Clara is the powerful Willamette team. To show the reserve power of the San Jose team here is an item that appeared in one of their papers.

"Others whose participation in the Willamette fracas is doubtful are Morris Manoogian, first string right halfback—out with a bad shoulder; Jack Hilton, first string left halfback—nursing a leg injury; Bull Lewis, full—limping on a bum knee; Norm Sanders first string quarterback—out with a leg infection; Bob Berry, end—suffering from a cold; and Clyde Voorhees, center—chipped ankle bone."

Yet with all these injuries the Spartans went out and beat Willamette 31 to 7. Incidentally Willamette beat Portland U. by the same score that Santa Clara beat Portland U.

The outstanding player in the line is Captain Du Bose who is slated as a prospect on the West Shrine Team.

Bull Lewis, although in good shape, has been replaced at full by Roy "Zimmer" Zimmerman. You can no doubt remember the first year when Humboldt played San Jose State and Lewis, the Spartan mainstay, led his team to victory. Zimmerman is the passer of the team and some who have seen him play say he is even better than Sammy Baugh at slinging the football.

Coach Dud DeGroot's men have had exceptional luck in the air in their four games they succeeded in completing forty passes for a total gain of 581 yards.

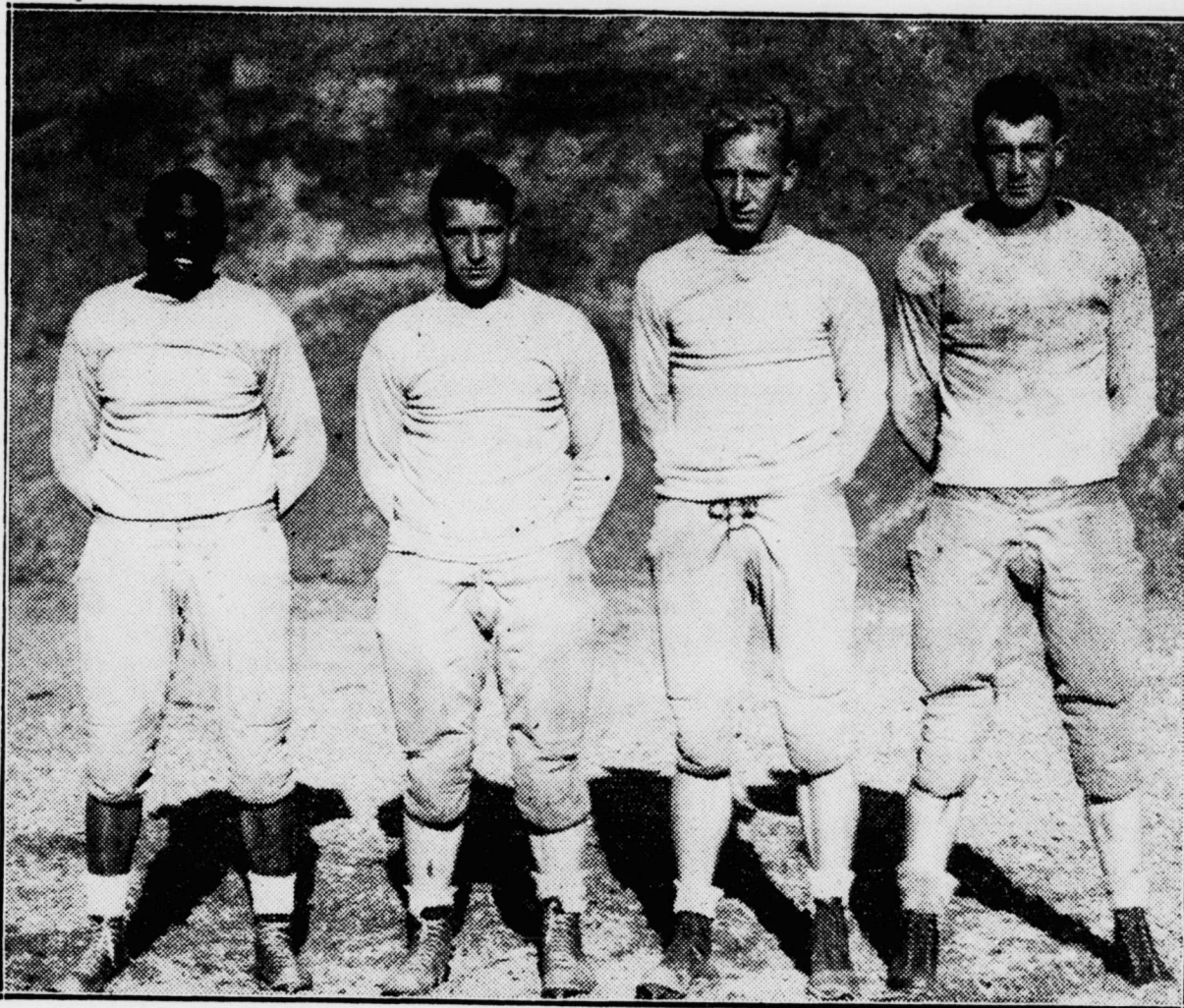
Backs three-deep despite injury and a line that is rapidly developing is the major reason for San Jose's winnings. Four all-around fullbacks, three outstanding right halfbacks, five better than-average left halfbacks, and two seasoned quarterbacks, give DeGroot more than his share of Grade A offensive talents.

Big Grid Tilt Theme of Air Program Wed.

It will also include an accordion solo by Roland Oliver, a vocal solo by Eugene Oak, an interview with one of the oldest football players in Humboldt County, the song hit of the week, chosen by the football squad and the regular features by Hope Dondero and Sherman Washburn.

Big Game Ball To Be Awarded Ticket Holder

The Humboldt-San Jose kickoff football, autographed by both teams and coaches, will be awarded by the Humboldt State Men's Association after the Erbmen battle the Spartans on November 13. Tickets are now on sale by members of the association for ten cents apiece.

The funds obtained will provide and athletic scholarship at Humboldt for one year to some outstanding and worthy graduate of a Humboldt County High school; this athlete to be chosen by a committee from the Men's Association and a representative of the college administration.

For the first time in ten years, Humboldt State will publish an annual, it was decided by a student body vote last Thursday. By a vote of 198 affirmative and 23 negative, it was resolved to collect a \$2.50 tax at spring registration to cover the cost of the yearbook.

The Metropolitan Engraving Company of Los Angeles will probably receive the publication contract, which stipulates that Mr. Hill, the company representative and his photographer will be on the campus while the book is being made. This company last year published the Whittier College Annual which won top honors in a national competition.

The book will be printed on trench fold leaves—a new and different arrangement insuring more accurate printing and a beautiful page, according to Ray Pedritto, chairman of the investigating committee. The annual will cost about \$1200 with \$600 estimated from sales of the books and the balance to come from advertising.

In its past history, Humboldt has published only one year book. The Cabrillo which appeared in 1927.

The editorial and business staffs for the newly-authorized annual will be chosen in the near future by the executive council and negotiations are now progressing to sign a contract with the engravers.

Long passes from Barbieri to Cady were the real features of the game.

Coach Charley Erb discovered a new find in the form of John McGrath who intercepted two passes and caught another which he lateraled for a touchdown. John also completed the conversions for the final score.

Franny Moore completed three more conversions for a grand total of eleven completed kicks out of thirteen tries.

Collier ran wild in the first quarter scoring two touchdowns and passing another. The line showed great power in the way that they opened holes for Collier to gallop through.

The Cardinals puts up a game fight but just didn't have the strength to resist the powerful Thunderbolts.
