OPENING GRID CLASH SET FOR SATURDAY NIGHT AT ALBEE STADIUM IN EUREKA

With his squad whipping into shape in splendid fashion, Coach Charley Erb today announced that Humboldt State would present one of the finest teams in its history against Southern Oregon Normal School next Saturday night at the Albee Stadium in Eureka.

Thirty men have been working long hours, learning fundamentals, running plays, and getting into shape during the past few weeks. Every man on the squad is pointing toward the opening game. Last year Humboldt smothered the northern boys with a deluge of touchdowns.

Erb hasn't as yet released his starting line-up. The game is slated to start promptly at eight. Tickets are on sale for \$1.00. Season tickets are selling for \$5.00, and entitle the holders to all home games of the Thunderbolts.

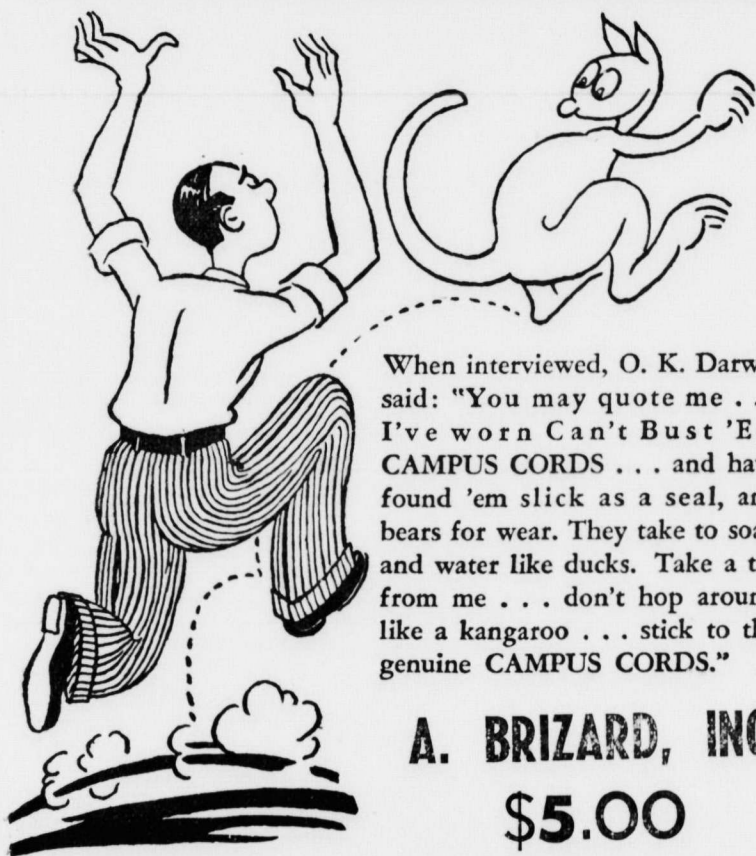

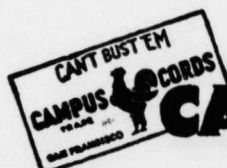

Many Enroll In New Balabanis Economic Course

Dr. Homer Balabanis, professor of economics, reports a wide enrollment in his extension class, "Programs in Economic Security." Teachers of many districts members of the County Welfare Department, lawyers, and Credit Association employees, have expressed a desire to learn more of Economic Security by enrolling in the course offered by Dr. Balabanis.

The course is given on Tuesday evenings at the Eureka Senior High school from 7 to 9 p. m. Fifteen lectures are to be included in the class, and two units of credit will be given.

In addition to his extension course in "Programs in Economic Security," Dr. Balabanis is conducting a class in Banking Law for Humboldt County Bankers. Principles of Economics, Money and Banking, the Negotiable Instrument Law, and Analysis of Financial Statements are the subjects included in the course.

These classes in Banking Law which are conducted throughout the entire United States, are under the auspices of the American Institute of Banking. This is the eighth year that the course has been offered in Eureka by Dr. Balabanis.

A certificate of Recognition is given after the completion of a four year course. The courses are taught from 7:30 to 9 p. m. on Wednesday evenings. Twenty-eight meetings are scheduled.

ART EXHIBITS AVAILABLE AT VERY LOW COST

Mrs. Stella Little of the Art department has received information from the San Francisco Museum of Art regarding a series of art exhibits which is available for the sum of ten dollars.

Although the cost is not large due to a grant of \$7,500 to the San Francisco Museum of Art by the Carnegie Corporation of New York, there are no funds available in the Art department to cover the cost of such an exhibit. The cost of all last year's exhibits were covered by Mrs. Little, but she feels that if people are interested in obtaining the exhibits this year that they will be willing to help defray the expenses.

The exhibits include not only six groups of exhibits with twenty masterpieces to a group, but also exhibitions showing the technical points of art.
