CAREER COLUMN**NO. 1**

BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION

After a cycle of lean years during which the business world released rather than hired employees, the outlook for employment in the field of business administration has undergone decided improvement. The colleges and universities have reported a marked upswing in the number of requests for promising graduates prepared to enter the business world. Keen competition is reported in the search for young men (and in less numbers, for young women) with pleasing personality, superior scholastic records, outstanding records in extra-curricular activities, and good family background. Much emphasis is placed upon personality, good grooming, intelligence, and thorough training.

These young men don't step at once into executive positions, however. Many of them start at dull or even menial tasks and at low salary rates. Many of them will never rise high in the business world, but because of the depression and consequent absence of new employment over a period of years, the outlook is better now for advancement than it has been for perhaps a decade. Business houses find themselves in need of trained executives but they have no young men trained for these positions within their own organization. Now they are seeking young men qualified to assume responsibilities, to make decisions, to keep pace with the demands of the rapidly changing world. First assignments may be far beneath the ability or training of these young men—but their future depends upon the way they serve their apprenticeships.

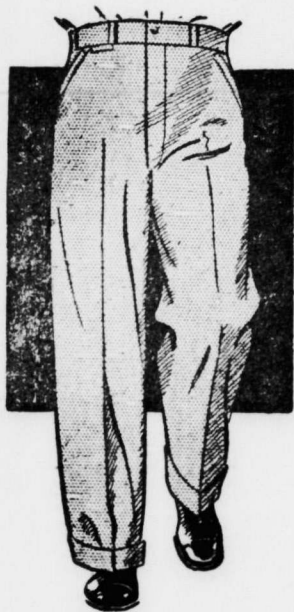

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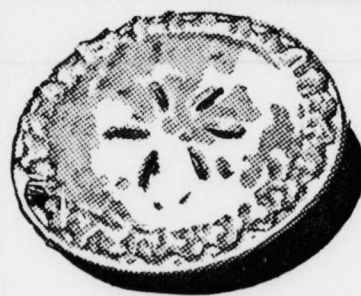
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VARSITY SWEET SHOPPE

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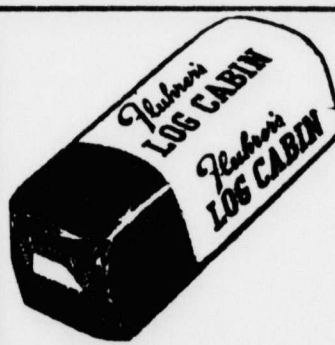

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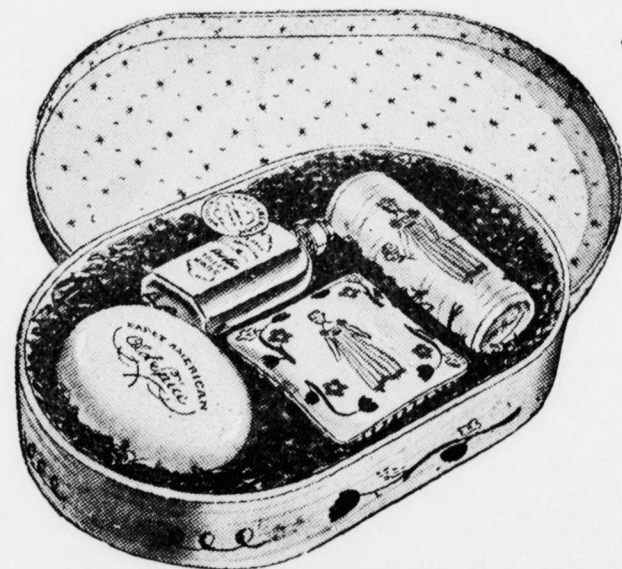
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
