Basketball Team To Play Opener Against Marin J. C.

Humboldt State College will launch their inter-collegiate basketball season when they meet the strong, barnstorming cagers from Marin Junior College at the Eureka Civic auditorium tomorrow night at 8 o'clock.

The Marin team holds victories over the P. A. A. champion New Domestic Washboys, the Standard Oil of San Francisco, the San Francisco Olympic Club, the San Rafael Eagles, and Stroms Clothiers, who reached the quarter finals in the national tournament last year.

Coach L. H. Carlson of Marin J. C. believes that this is the greatest Marin team in history. Marin J. C. was coast division champion for 1938 and Coach Carlson has four veterans around which he has built his "wonder" basketball team.

This will be the final college game for the Lumberjacks before they meet each of the six state colleges in the annual tournament at San Jose State on December 28-29. They will play San Diego, Fresno, Santa Barbara, San Jose, Chico and San Francisco State in a round robin tournament. San Diego State already holds one victory over U.C.L.A., Coach Harry Griffith's alma mater.

RULING TO AFFECT COLLEGE ACTIVITIES

A faculty committee has passed the ruling that no student who is on probation may represent the college in a public appearance of any organized activity. The committee feels that students engaged in competitive athletics as well as participants in dramatic and music performances should come under this ruling. They have not yet made a final decision as to how many other activities will also be affected by this regulation. This problem is to be discussed at today's faculty meeting.

This ruling is not expected to take effect until the fall of 1940, although the probation system discussed in column five of page one will go into effect the spring semester of 1940. Attention of the students is called to the fact that the regulations will operate automatically.

Humboldt College Faculty Adopts Probation System

Last week the faculty at Humboldt State adopted a plan of probation and disqualification. This marks the first step in a program designed to promote a higher standard of scholarship on the campus. This plan was adopted after careful study of probationary systems in use at other colleges. The system was then considered carefully as to its application to the situation at Humboldt. The plan as adopted includes the following points:

PROBATION

1. Any student who drops below a cumulative average of "C" (i.e. an index of "1") shall be given a warning notice, a copy of which will be sent to his parents.

2. If a student's scholarship index for a semester falls below .50 (midway between a "C" and a "D") he shall be placed upon probation for the ensuing semester.

3. A student shall not be permitted to enroll for more than 13½ units. To get off probation he must:

- Complete at least eight units of work during the semester.
- Achieve an index for the semester of .50 or better.

DISQUALIFICATION

1. A student on probation shall be automatically disqualified if his index for the semester drops below (a grade average of "D"). Should his semester index be between 0 and .50 he may remain upon probation for a second semester. At the close of the second probationary semester, if he has failed to achieve the required standard of .50, he shall be disqualified.

2. A student who has been disqualified for unsatisfactory scholarship may apply through the registrar for re-entrance upon probation after the lapse of one semester. A student who has been disqualified by another institution of college rank may apply for admission upon a basis of probation.

Warnings and probation notices will be issued at the end of the present semester.

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CAREER COLUMN

Pass Bar Examinations

There are many who earn \$25,000 to \$100,000 annually as heads of great corporations and industries. But of the 65,000 students now enrolled in business administration courses in the colleges and universities of America, few ever will reach these high salary levels. A study made by the United States Office of Education throws interesting light on the earnings of well-trained young men in this field. College graduates of 1928 went to work at average salaries of \$1,200. In 1935, they were earning on the average \$2,400 per year. A few of them may rise eventually to the highest salary brackets, but the majority will continue to earn less than \$5,000 per year.

To prepare for work in the field of business administration a student should acquire a broad, cultural education, with intensive emphasis upon business economics, and the social sciences. For the young man who aims high a bachelor's degree is not enough. He should plan to intensify his training by graduate study if possible, in one of the many institutions in the United States now offering masters and doctors degrees in business administration. There are, of course, exceptional cases of executives who have not had specialized training in this field. But what was once the rule is becoming the increasingly rare exception.

Humboldt offers courses that provide an excellent foundation for a career in the field of business. There is a wide range of cultural subjects that provide background and general knowledge, there are courses in commerce
