S. F. Gators Will Oppose Lumberjacks In Tough Series

The Humboldt State Lumberjacks will entertain the fast stepping, high scoring San Francisco State Gators this Friday and Saturday nights in the college gym.

The Lumberjacks have to date won the majority of their college games. They handed the highly touted Southern Oregon Normal quintet a two game lacing and then took their share of honors in the San Jose tournament. Two weeks ago they split their series with the Chico quintet, which was regarded as one of the best in smaller colleges.

In this coming series with the S. F. Gators, the Lumberjacks will meet a great offensive team. In 20 games the Gators have amassed 1,086 points for an average of 54 points a game. Dave Kirwin, guard is top scorer with 192 points followed by Joe Sanz, forward, with 180 and Ernie Loustalot, forward, 175. They have won 14 of their twenty games thus far and have been defeated only once on their home court this year.

Humboldt will probably line-up as follows, Biandini, Givins, forwards; Thornton, center. Seidell, Saunderson, guards. Reserves certain to see action are Don Falk and Wally Lozensky. The Gator line-up will probably be Sanz, Loustalot, forwards; Russell, center; Kirwin, Rubin, guards.

**Japanese Current Does Not Bring
Heat To Humboldt, Scientist Says**

The Japanese Current affects only the climate of Alaska and British Columbia and does not exist along the western coast of the United States, Dr. Harry MacGinitie said Monday evening over Radio Station KIEM in his talk on oceanic circulation and its effect on the climate of Northern California.

"The cold current along our coast is usually known as the California Current," Dr. MacGinitie said. "It is more noticeable in summer than in winter and is truly a cold current rather than a warm one. The combined effects of this cold current in the summer and the northward drift of the warmer air in winter in front of the storms combine to give our part of California a genuinely temperate climate, one of the most equable in the world."

Dr. MacGinitie explained the flow of ocean currents in general and of the Japanese Current in particular as follows:

"The general circulation of waters of the ocean, like that of the air above it, is caused by unequal heating of different regions by the sun. The circulation in effect tries to equalize the unequal heating between the equatorial and polar regions by a flow of warm water above, and a return creep of cold, denser water in the depths of the ocean below.

"Although the ocean circulation is fundamentally thermal, surface currents are greatly affected by the wind. Because of the great expanse of easterly trade winds over the equatorial regions of the Pacific, there is a current of water driven westward. Part of this equatorial current continues westward through the East Indies, but a part is driven against the Asiatic coasts and turns northward southeast of the Japanese Island. This current of warm water is called the 'Kurosiwo,' the

Those who are expected to try-out for the team are: Don Mahan, Henry Trione, Len Longholm, sprints; Al Biondini, Rod Belcher, hurdles; Fred Hibler, Snooky Edsall, Robert Humphries, Bob Madsen, middle distances; Dick Baldry, Vernon Thornton, Nick Barbieri, Francis Givins, Chuck Glenn, Len Longholm, field events.

Much is expected from Vernon Thornton and Dick Baldry as these two are or have been capable of winning track meets by themselves. Vernon practically defeated Santa Rosa J. C. by himself two years ago. Dick Baldry was one of the outstanding track and field men in the U.S.A. not so many years ago. He was the third best decathlon man in the U.S. during the 1932 Olympics held in Los Angeles. At Humboldt Dick will compete in the pole vault and weights. He has pole vaulted 14 feet in competition. Henry Trione and Don Mahan should give Humboldt several points in the dashes as they are both capable of stepping off 10: flat hundreds almost any time in practice. Also Len Longholm, who went so well in football, may surprise people with his performances in the dashes and pole vault.


