LUMBERJACKS LEAVE TODAY FOR SERIES AT SAN JOSE

Lumberjacks Take Close Series With Gators

The Humboldt Lumberjacks swept both games from San Francisco State College last week by the score of 33 to 23, and 51 to 33 in the basketball series held in the college gym. The Lumberjacks had never won both games previous to this series.

The local boys played stellar ball on both nights and although the visitors were without the services of three of their players credit cannot be taken away from the Lumberjacks who combined dead eye shooting and close guarding to take the series.

The Gators showed one of the fastest offensive attacks ever put on in Humboldt. Loustalot, Sanz and Madigan took the high scoring honors for San Francisco.

For Humboldt the entire squad played excellent ball with Givins, Lozensky, Thornton, Saunderson and Falk standing out.

Hank Givins led the scoring with 26 points followed by Lozensky with 23 points.

Loustalot for San Francisco lead with 21 points followed by Sanz with 19 points.

Misconceptions About Mushrooms Are Widespread, Says Dr. Lanphere

"It seems to me that there are more misconceptions concerning mushrooms than almost any other type of plant life," Dr. William Lanphere of the Humboldt State College science department said Monday night in a talk over radio station KIEM on "Mushrooms, Edible and Poisonous".

One of these misconceptions is that there is some radical difference between what are known as mushrooms and those that are called toadstools. Yet there is no difference between the two, according to Dr. Lanphere.

"Sometimes we call the edible forms of mushrooms and those that are not edible, toadstools," said Dr. Lanphere. "Yet within a single genus we find forms that are poisonous and those that are not. There are many forms too small or too woody for food material, which are not poisonous. It is much better to make no distinction between mushrooms and toadstools."

Another common idea is that mushrooms spring up overnight, Dr. Lanphere said. However, what is commonly called the "mushroom" which appears above ground is not the whole plant anymore than a flower is the whole plant. Down in the ground, or embedded in the wood (if the fungus is a form that grows on wood,) is a mass of thready material which has been growing for weeks, perhaps for months, or even years.

Another misconception is that if the cap peels, the mushroom is good. It is just as sensible to say that is a person sunburns and peels he is a bank robber, according to Dr. P. Lanphere.

"If the fungus has roots, it is poisonous." No mushroom has roots. If one pulls up a plant growing in loose material, some of the thready mycelium from the vegetative part of the plant may adhere to the fruit body. Naturally

it is the same, as far as poison is concerned, as the fruit body, Dr. Lanphere said.

Another misconception is that if a silver coin cooked with the mushrooms does not turn black, the mushroom are good. However, the blackening is due to the presence of sulphur and is not connected with the poisonous alkaloids that are dangerous.

Many believe there are no poisonous forms under the redwoods. Yet this fall Dr. Lanphere's classes have collected species of the Amanita, the most deadly group, under the redwoods back of the college. Also, some of those with a pleasant taste and smell are poisonous.

"There are no general rules to be applied to separate the poisonous from the edible," Dr. Lanphere said. "If you desire to collect these tasty plants, by all means learn the characters of the more common poisonous forms in your locality. Also, collect only a few outstanding species that you know are edible.

"Above all, be sure that your source of information is accurate. Do not accept information from some one because he happened to be born in France, or Italy, or Japan, where people eat many many mushrooms. It is estimated that over one hundred French people die annually from mushroom poisoning, and 481 persons died in Japan over a period of eight years from eating poisoned mushrooms. Think of the numbers that were poisoned but recovered.

"I hope you will learn to collect and enjoy mushrooms, but let me urge you to approach the matter sanely and be sure that your source of information concerning the edible and poisonous kinds is accurate."

Dr. Lanphere's topic over KIEM next Monday evening will be "Soilless Plant Culture."

State College sent a total of 38 students to the University whose records during their first year of residence there have been subjected to a close scrutiny by University officials in comparison with the records of transfers from 167 colleges and universities, both inside and outside of California.

Based upon a grade-point average of 1:00 for a grade of "C" and 2:00 for a grade of "B", Humboldt students transferring to the University achieved a record during their first year there of 1.67, which presents an average grade of "B minus." Among 167 colleges included in the survey, Humboldt's record was surpassed by six and equalled by one. However the six institutions sent a combined total of only 39 students, whereas Humboldt alone sent 38 transfers.

Among the seven state colleges of California, Humboldt's students had the highest average, the range being from 1.13 to 1.67. The average for all seven of the state colleges was 1.35.

Reports were also issued for those students regularly enrolled for the spring semester of 1938 at the University of California. Two Humboldt transfers made a straight "A" record for the semester; three more received nothing below a "B", and several received reports with three or more "A's" and not more than one "C".

"On the whole, these records indicate that students who take their lower division work at Humboldt State College are able to compete upon better than even terms with transfers from other institutions. Such reports are a flattering commentary upon the caliber of work offered at Humboldt State College, and are a source of gratification to the administration, the faculty and all friends of the institution," President Arthur S. Gist said today.

In tennis Baldry has had the benefit of the knowledge of such notables as Junior Cohen, who was responsible for the beginning of his game; Jack and Wilber Hess, the latter a National Intercollegiate champion; George Lott of the Davis Cup Team; and the present champion, Don Budge, with whom he had the pleasure of working out with many times in Oakland at the beginning of Budge's rise to fame.

The movies were responsible for Baldry's art in fencing. He received many lessons from the best fencers acquired by the movie colony. Of these, the most prominent was Fred Cavers who is recognized as one of the foremost fencing masters of the United States.
