### State Allocated Funds For Dorm And Elem. School

Humboldt College faculty and students are elated over the announcement of President Arthur S. Gist of Humboldt that funds have been allocated for a new dormitory here.

The money is from the unused part of a fund appropriated by the 1937 California legislature for construction work at state institutions Governor Culbert L. Olson, California's new executive, allocated the balance from the original fund among the various institutions. Because of the demand on this fund, Humboldt is fortunate, President Gist said, in the amount it received.

The sum of \$195,000 has been appropriated for the new building which will consist of two dormitory wings—one for men and one for women—with the commons in between. There will be accommodations for from seventy-five to eighty students. The money appropriated, incidentally, provides

### Tournament Tales

Most improved player on the team proved to be Jack Cook who took Biondini's place at forward and played fine games.

Incidentally, Humboldt assumed a new role in this tournament—that of being a villain. The team most in favor of the spectators was San Jose, of course, and Humboldt seemed to be the most disliked. 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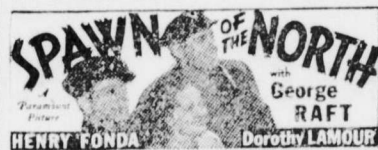
