## COLLEGE QUINTETS TO FACE CHICO FRIDAY NIGHT

### "Elijah" To Be Presented On February 21, 22

"Elijah" by Felix Mendelssohn will be presented by the Humboldt State music department under the direction of G. Dana Kinsman.

The performances will be on the nights of February 21, 22. The first night's performance will be student night and the second night will be the public performance. They will be held in the college auditorium.

The soloists for the Oratoria will be: soprano, Mrs. J. V. Garrison, Eureka; Alto soprano, Marthabel Scott, Humboldt State; Tenor, Mr. Paul Johnson, San Jose State; title role, Mr. Joel Carter, Stanford. Mr. Carter is now studying for his masters degree at Stanford. He has sung the title role in the Elijah four time previous to his coming up here.

The chorus will be composed of about sixty persons and the orchestra will number around thirty-five.

### Students Must Fix Course Now

"Don't change your course without taking serious thought. But if you must change, make the change at once."

That, probably, would be the admonition faculty advisors would give if they were questioned by students, because a new faculty ruling made recently goes into effect this semester.

During the first two weeks students will be allowed to make changes after they have consulted with advisors without charge. After that for several weeks twenty-five cents must be paid for each change; and the fee is raised to fifty cents later for each change. Since both the adding of a course and the dropping of a course are considered "changes" there is twenty-five cent fee for each.

## Waves and Wave Motion Described In Radio Talk by Dr. MacGinitie

The Pacific Ocean is rightly named, being, in spite of its size, the least stormy of the great oceans, according to Dr. Harry D. MacGinitie of Humboldt State who spoke over the radio station KIEM Monday night on "Waves and Wave Motion" in the first of a series of talks on natural science by the college faculty. The southern ocean around the borders of the Antarctic is the roughest and stormiest ocean on earth, and the tales of difficulties experienced by old sailing vessels in going around the Horn were not exaggerated.

Ordinary waves on the surface of the sea derive their energy from the wind, Dr. MacGinitie said. Water is elastic and tends to return to its original position when disturbed, this producing a wave motion. The wind builds up larger waves from smaller by pushing on the crests and pushing down in the troughs. The large waves seen in stormy weather are the final result.

The ocean is usually in a complex state of unrest because of the varying passage of storms over widely separated areas. In any particular time the waves seen along the coast may be due to two or more disturbances at sea.

There are other sources of wave motion besides the wind. The so-called "tidal waves," Dr. MacGinitie said, really have nothing whatever to do with tides but are usually caused by submarine earthquakes or volcanic explosions. These "tidal waves" are really complex sets of great waves which travel with enormous velocities outward from the point of disturbance. On approaching the coast, these waves increase in height and finally break from twenty-five to eighty feet above the average tide level, creating terrific havoc on

low-lying coasts. Several "tidal waves" have been experienced on the coast of Peru which carried vessels a half mile or more inland.

The shore marks the battleground between the ocean and the land, and the ocean always wins in the long run, Dr. MacGinitie said. The effects of wave action are mainly due to the breakers or surf. As the waves of the open sea approach the shore and run into shallow water, the wave energy is distributed through a smaller volume of water, and thus the heights of the waves increase. Average storm waves in the open sea may agitate the water appreciably to a depth of six hundred feet. If this energy is concentrated in thirty feet of water, it produces a considerable increase in the height of the wave. As the front of the wave moves into shallow water, there is not enough water to complete the original motion of the particles. The wave finally breaks, the crest is thrown forward and down, and the wave-form is destroyed.

On a wide, sloping beach, such as Clam Beach the waves in stormy weather break at some distance from the shore, and there may be two or more subsequent recoveries and breaks before the last wave washes upon the beach. On a steep beach, like that at Big Lagoon, all the energy of the wave is expended in one huge breaker.

The dynamic force of breakers may reach astonishing heights. There are many authentic records of heights of over one thousand tons being moved by storm waves, said Dr. MacGinitie. At Trinidad, water has washed over Pilot Rock, 103 feet high. The panes of glass in the tower of Tillamook Lighthouse, 132 feet high, have been broken by the surf.

The combined action of storm waves and high tides bring surf to unusual heights. During the storm and high tides which occurred near the first of January, waves broke along the highway north of Little River bridge, and the beach at the mouth of Eel River suffered notable changes.

Dr. MacGinitie will speak over KIEM at 8:30 next Monday evening on "The Geologic History of Big Lagoon and Humboldt Bay."

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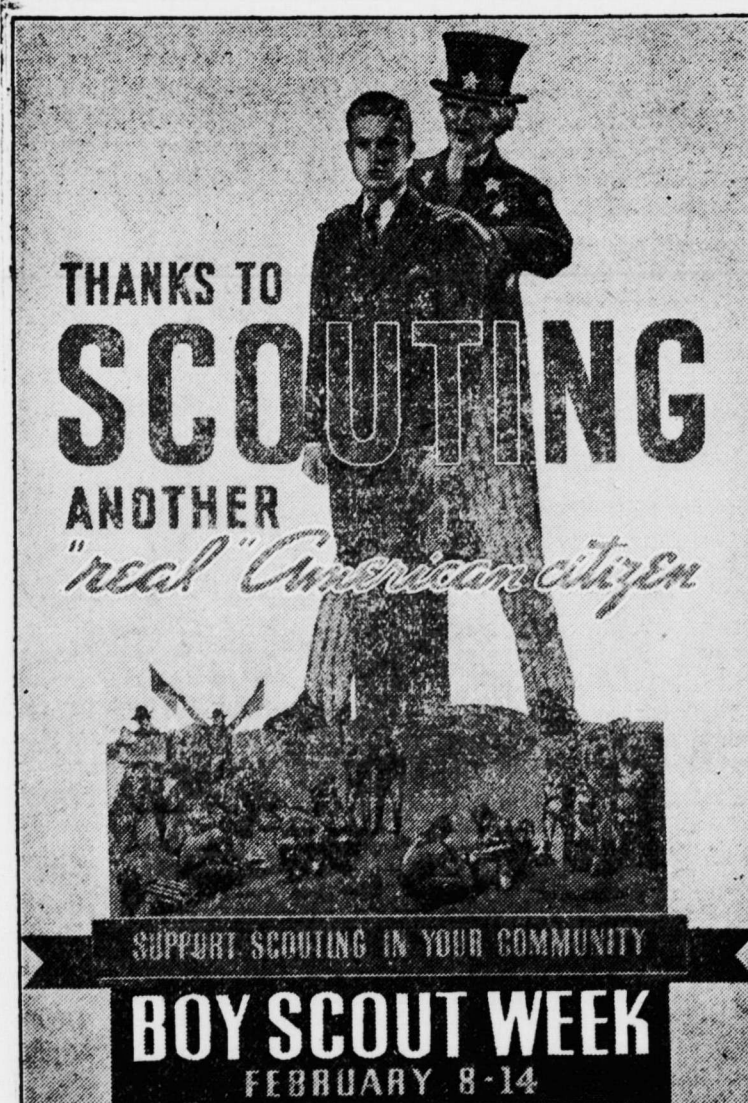
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All America Marks 29th

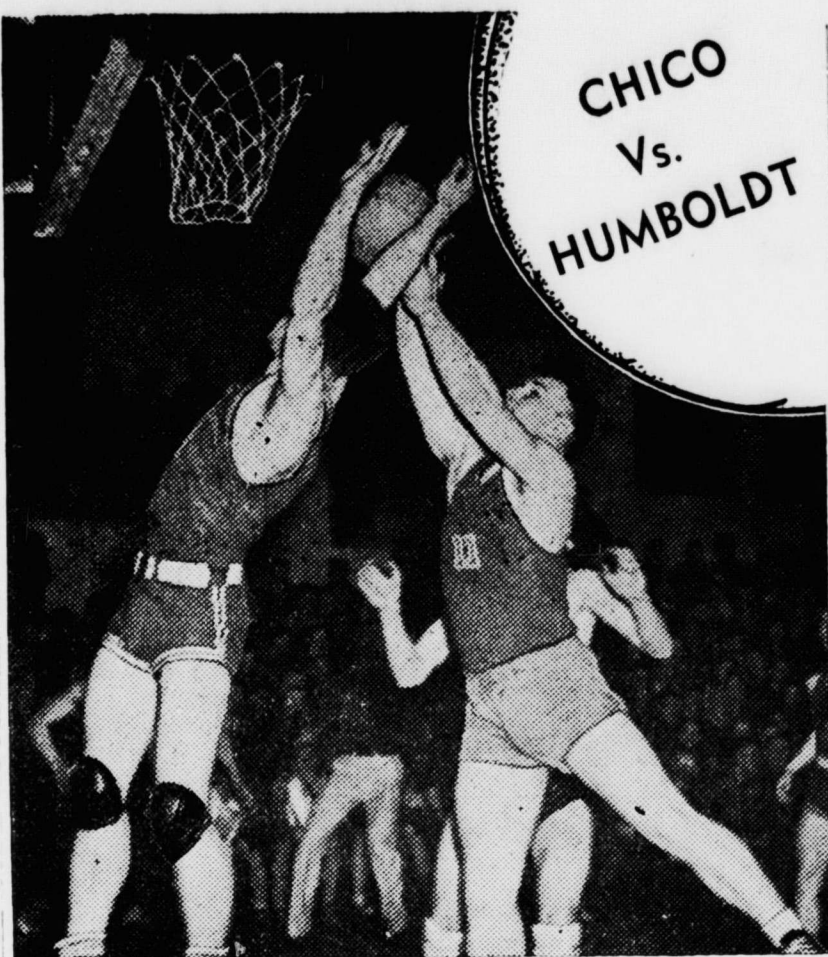
