This applies especially to students who registered late for such classes as ballroom dancing or archery only to find that the classes were full and that they could not be admitted.

The same procedure must be followed for dropping these courses as for any other. The same regulations apply also to students who may wish to change their status in a given class from regular to auditor, or vice versa.

Over a hundred questions were submitted by the students to Mr. Baldry and he complied by answering many of these and also giving a practical demonstration on the art of using the fists and swords as done by the stars in the filming of their pictures.

Casting of pictures giving both the methods and sources was also covered. The talk brought out incidents behind the scenes of motion pictures known only by those closely related with the industry.

THE SOCIAL UNIT

As the editor of the official Student Body organ I have been asked to list the regulations by which the Social Unit is governed.

There shall be no rowdyism. By this it is meant that students shall conduct themselves as ladies and gentlemen. The place for a person's feet are on the floor and this applies to all. The chairs are regarded as furniture to sit in and not to cross your legs on as a resting place for your feet.

There shall be no smoking, excepting after 6 p. m.

There shall be no mugging, nor any form of relationships that would cause outsiders to wonder or report.

THE PENALTIES

The first offense will cause the defendant to receive a letter from the Board of Control and he shall appear before the Board.

The second offense will cause the expulsion of the defendant from the Unit and a letter will be mailed to the defendant's parents stating his conduct at school.

The third offense will result in the defendant being expelled from school.

That these penalties are harsh is true but the time to act has come and the Board of Control has acted on your recommendation. It is our sincere hope that a better and more cordial relationship may be obtained in regards to the Social Unit in the future as a result of this action.

Tuberculin Tests Given To Students

Tuberculin tests were conducted last week by the College Health Office for the second and last time of the school year. First strength was given Monday noon, February 27, for those students turning out who had never had a positive reaction. Second strength was given Wednesday noon for those who had a negative reaction to the first strength.

The college Health Department desires that every student who has not taken the test, or who had a negative reaction two or more years ago, take them. All teaching credential candidates are required to take the tuberculin tests and follow-up. All workers in the College Commons are required to follow the same procedure.

Givins High Man In Points Scored

Statistics as released by Coach Herbert Hart of Humboldt State on the last basketball season show Francis Givins as the leading scorer both in collegiate and independent games. Givins' total points for the college series were 93; he was followed by Lozensky with 66. Against Independent teams Givins scored 82 points and this time was followed by Biondini with 68.

Total points as made by Humboldt during the college games showed them to lead their opponents by a total of 321 to 279. In the Independent games Humboldt also lead their opponents, this time by 358 to 253. This total for Independent games is up to and



including the round Robin tournament between the college, Colored Clowns and House of Davids.

Individual point totals for the combined collegiate and Independent season are as follows: Givins 175, Biondini 115, Lozensky 109, Saunderson 62, Thornton 60, Seidell 38, Lee 37, Falk 35, Cook 16, and Glenn 13.

Total fouls as committed by members of the team were as follows:

Thornton 38, Biondini 36, Saunderson 19, Givins 18, Seidell 15, Lozensky 13, Lee 11, Falk 9, Cook 2, and Glenn 2.

These totals do not include the points made or fouls committed during the San Jose tournament.

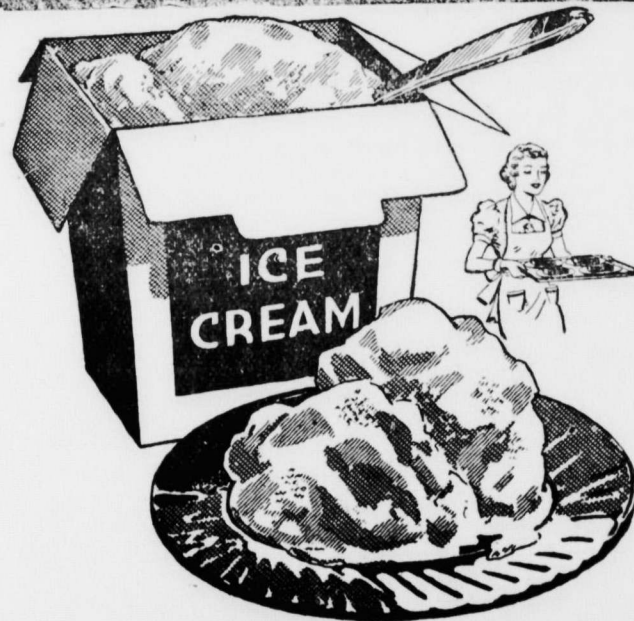

Much Clerical Work Must Be Done Before Grade Cards Are Given Out

"Heigh-ho! A "B" in Econ!" "Aw, heck! He gave me a "D" in..."

Thus it went on last week when joy and sorrow in large doses were freely dispensed from the Recorder's office.

To anxious students, the grades were long in being released.

But the weeks between examinations and the final issuance of the grades have been busy ones for the clerical staff. After faculty members have corrected examinations and made up their grade sheets, the report cards and a set of office duplicates must be typed from these lists and checked against the student's registration card.

All discrepancies must then be eliminated, past records must be recorded and brought up to date, new indices computed and finally, both sets of cards carefully checked to avoid all errors in computations or copying.

The keeping of students records demands a high degree of accuracy which can only be achieved by constant checking and rechecking. If there were no incompletes, no changes in programs, no variation in units, the recorder's work would be comparatively simple. But it is in changes from the regular procedure that discrepancies occur and errors may result.

After the report cards are issued the permanent record cards and the advisor's cards must be brought
