Although the move was to the present site, it was not made into the present main building but into wooden buildings, supposedly temporary. These "temporary" buildings are still in use, housing the college commons, the industrial arts department, and even furnishing living quarters, as "Sunset Hall" was one of these "temporary" structures.

In 1917 the legislature appropriated \$245,000 for permanent Fielding, physical education inbuildings; actual construction, however, did not begin until 1920 and the building was not occupied until February, 1922. This is now the main college building.

In 1921 control of the school was transferred from the local board which originally administered its Department of Education and of the W. A. A. honor sweaters in affairs into the hands of the State placed directly under supervision of the State Director of Education and the State Board of Education. These officials however administer not only Humboldt but all the seven state colleges. In this year, also, all the California Normal Schools were changed to State Teachers Colleges.

In 1936 Arthur S. Gist succeeded Ralph W. Swetman as president, and under him a number of important developments have taken place.
