Lumberjacks Defeat Chico State Wildcats In Final Quarter

The Humboldt State College Lumberjacks passed and smashed eighty-five yards down the field in the final minutes of play to defeat the Chico State Wildcats 6 to 0 before 3,000 fans at Albee Stadium last Friday night.

The drive began with Longholm carrying the ball for a fifteen-yard gain from the thirteen-yard line. Edsall lashed out a pass to Cady for another gain good for twenty-yards. Longholm completed a pass to Cady for another first down. After a line play failed to gain, Longholm passed nine yards to Edsall. Edsall then smashed over center for a first down. A pass from Edsall to Crichton added six more yards, and on the next play, Edsall passed to Givins, who broke away and ran ten yards to the Chico one-yard line. Longholm went through his own right tackle for a touchdown on the next play.

The first three quarters of the game resolved into more of a punting duel with the ball seeing-sawing back and forth. Although Humboldt was charged with three fumbles, all recovered by Chico, none of them proved costly.

Early in the fourth quarter Humboldt was put in scoring position by a 15-yard penalty against Chico. The Humboldt attack did not click, however, and the Lumberjacks were shoved back.

Chico made a desperate attempt to score in the last thirty-five seconds of play after Humboldt had scored its touchdown. They were unable to do very much before the final whistle sounded.

This was the fourth victory chalked up for the Lumberjacks this season out of five games they have played.

HOLDS TOURNAMENT

The men's athletics class which meets on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 10 to 11 a. m. are playing a round-robin tournament in touch football.

This Class Talks About The Weather

Students enrolled in one course at the University of Kentucky have more than usual interest in the weather. It Isn't Horseshoes; Isn't Bowling; It's a Combination Called 'Bochi'

Pete Petrovich, one of the college gardeners, and Jake Relac, janitor, often play Bochi on Sunday afternoon on the training field back of the college.

Explained by Petrovich, the game is played as follows: A small wooden ball is tossed out into the field about 30 to 50 yards from the players. When it stops, the players each roll large balls, resembling bowling balls, toward the smaller one. The player whose ball comes nearest the object ball, wins a point. The same principle is applied as in horseshoes where the object is to toss the horseshoe at a stake.

Contrary to Popular Opinion Research Shows Athletes Do Study

The popular picture of the college athlete who spends his time in class cutting out paper dolls was dispelled by Dr. Harry N. Click head of the department of psychology at Massachusetts State College, at Amherst, Mass.

"Contrary to popular opinion," Professor Click said in releasing the results of studies made on 325 State College students, "the greater the number of hours spent in college activities, the higher the mental test scores. The average college mark also increased slightly as the number of hours spent in college sports and activities increased."

An upper limit, however, was reached when more than 16 hours each week were spent in sports activities the psychologist said. When more than 16 hours are spent in activities, he pointed out, there is a definite drop in scholastic averages, indicating that the student is a "social butterfly" or neglecting his studies.

"In sports alone, the data indicated that both the highest mental test score and the highest scholastic average were attained by the group whose members devoted from one to five hours each week to sports," he added.

"Perhaps these results can be explained somewhat by the fact that students who do have a high mental test score are usually those who are able to work faster mentally," Professor Click explained. "Thus these students would have more free time to devote to various activities than would the slower students."

The author has, in a narrative manner, woven into her account information of value to other families on a similar tour.

"Modern American Painting," by Payton Boswell, Jr., is primarily a picture book of contemporary American paintings. The book includes eighty-six large reproductions in color of the finest and most significant paintings being done in the country. The illustrations are printed from the actual plates used in the large pages of "Life" magazine. Biography of every painter whose works are shown is included in the supplementary reading. The purposes and aims of each painter are discussed with his pictures.

Another new volume of art works is "A Treasury of Art Masterpieces" which includes 144 reproductions in full color. The pictures shown are from the European school from the time of the Renaissance to the present day. The editor, Thomas Craven, is said to be one of the finest interpreters of art now writing.

"Up until three years ago, there was also a high school connected with the grammar school. Now, we have thirteen pupils in all grades but the seventh.

"I am the only teacher, but I have nearly all equipment needed by any larger school, including a grand piano, phonograph, and instruments for a rhythm band.

"I was fortunate enough to secure a place to live about two blocks from my school. This is going to be very much to my benefit this winter when the heavy snows begin. After Christmas we are unable to get out because of the very heavy snowfall.

"The children and I will have to learn to ski as it is our only way of getting to school, or over to Alleghany. Our winter supplies are coming in now; and after Thanksgiving I do not expect anything but light first-class mail.

"The teachers of Sierra County attend their institute in Sacramento the early Thanksgiving vacation, along with all the other northern counties.

"I have met Mrs. Sidney Strand, nee Neale, of Eureka here at Goodyear Bar. She is a graduate of either the first or second class of Humboldt. She is teaching at Sierra City, about thirty-five miles from Forest.

"We are all enjoying it here, and we find the people and the community very pleasant."

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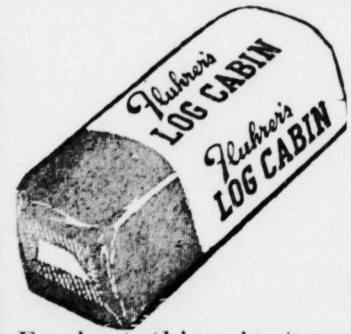


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
