## Formation Of Club For Establishing Scholarship Fund

The formation of a club designed to issue scholarships to worthy students or to make outright grants to activities when needed has been announced by Graduate Manager Bob Madsen. The "Humboldt State Scholarship Club" is to be composed of friends and alumni of the college who will raise funds for the advancement of student activities.

These scholarships, of which sixty per cent will be for athletics and forty per cent for dramatics and music, would cover nothing more than tuition. This represents the first attempt to provide any assistance for worthy students who participate in the extra-curricular activities of Humboldt State College.

All that is necessary to join the club is the payment of dues, with the minimum set at one dollar. Membership is open to all friends and graduates of the college. Men taking an active part in the formation of the club are Les Stromberg, president of the college alumni association; George Eldrid Hogan, county superintendent of schools and vice-president of the alumni association; and Jeremiah R. Scott, district attorney of Humboldt County.

Members will receive membership cards, a souvenir booklet outlining the activities sponsored at Humboldt by the club and will be able to attend an annual football banquet and theatre party.

Provisions for the granting of scholarships by the "Humboldt State Scholarship Club" are:

"Those entitled to scholarships under this funds shall present evidence of character and ability satisfactory to the college administration and be able to maintain high scholastic standards while in college."

"Any scholarships granted must first be approved by the president of the college and by the department head."

## Non-College Men May Study Flying

Young men who are not attending college may enroll in the aviation ground school courses to be offered at Humboldt State on the extension-student basis which will mean that they will pay a fee of twenty dollars for seventy-two hours of instruction.

The ground school will probably begin December 2. Courses will be held at the college on Saturday morning, probably 9 to 11 a. m. Instructors will be Dr. Harry MacGinitie, Homer Arnold, and Horace Jenkins, members of the college faculty.

The periods in that seventy-two class hours of the course will be distributed as follows: history of aviation, two class hours; meteorology, fifteen class hours; engines, five class hours; instruments, five class hours; radio uses and forms, two class hours.

Those interested in enrolling should register with Mrs. Bessie T. Woodcock, financial secretary of the college. President Arthur S. Gist suggests those intending to enroll should, for their own protection, have the proper physical examination.

## MacGinitie Talks On Marine Erosion

Dr. Harry D. MacGinitie, associate professor of physical science at Humboldt State, talked on "Marine Erosion" at the last meeting of the Arcata Kiwanis Club, at the Hotel Arcata.

The story of the effect of the waves on the land could be read, Dr. MacGinitie said, from the imprint made on the land, and that this was especially evident in the coastline immediately north of Arcata near Trinidad. It was evident, he said, that this particular stretch had been depressed and then uplifted, and that the uplifting was relatively recent, "geologically speaking."

Dr. MacGinitie also touched on the new air pilot's training course at Humboldt college and said that boys chosen for this course were fortunate, in that they would receive at a merely nominal fee flying instructions that would otherwise cost them much more.

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**The Toggery EUREKA****Three Addresses By Faculty Members Explain Aims of College Subjects**

The practical relationship between scholastic study and a successful life was the major theme of the speakers who addressed the Orientation class Friday, November 17. Each one stressed the importance, of preparing ourselves well for our social obligations which would tend to make the world an easier place in which to live.

Mrs. Monica Hadley, dean of women, stated that the basic policy of any physical education program should be to offer some activity that students enjoy and that they will need. That is the basis on which Humboldt's activities in this field are based. The social angle must be considered too, she continued. Correct physical activities will develop emotional control, friendship, and lay a foundation for hobbies all of which are essential if people are to live in harmony with their neighbors.

"If the unions, or even foreign dictators, knew the scientific causes and results of strife, perhaps there would be less of it today," Dr. Harry McGinitie, professor of biological and physical science, pointed out when showing why we should study these subjects. Science is the study of bodies of knowledge based on facts which can be proved. It is the basis of all scientific work. Nurses, doctors, dentists, engineers, all must first have a thorough knowledge of the principles of science before they can take up any of these vocations. Advertising would be a little less successful for the advertiser and more profitable to the consumer if modern sciences were studied more extensively, Dr. McGinitie said in closing.

Thought language and literature people study the world. Romance languages are the basis of culture. These were some of the facts brought out by Miss Adella Johnson of the French department when she presented her subjects, foreign languages, for consideration. In many vocations a good

And turn wrong from the pathway.

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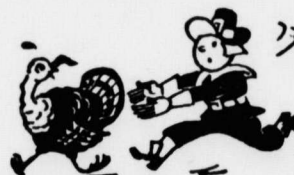
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## 'Ski Illustrated' Comes to Library

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## Improvements At Training School

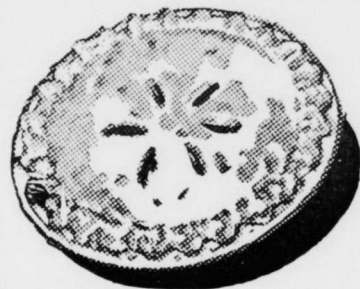

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## Requirements For Civil Service Ex.

Aviation is a broad field. In the civil service tests to be given in December there are eight optional fields for selection by those who place. The examination is for a senior Procurement Inspector; the salary is \$2,600 a year.

While none of those now enrolled in the course now being started at Humboldt are as yet eligible for this test, it may be interesting to know some of the requirements which must be met in examinations of this type.

The first requisite is that the applicant must be a citizen, and he must have at least seven years of progressive mechanical experience, or aircraft inspection experience.

His duties will consist of inspection of purchased aircraft materials, supplies, assemblies, etc., to determine specifications before delivery to the purchaser.

The applicant must have passed his twenty-fifth birthday but can not be more than fifty-three years old. He must be in perfect physical condition. Any defect, no matter how slight, will disqualify him. Eyesight and hearing must be up to the highest standard.

Application forms may be secured from the secretary of the Board of United States Civil Service or at any post office.

## 'Lone Wolf' Russia The Only Gainer In Present World War Says Fisher

"Russia thus far by playing the role of lone wolf has been the only gainer in the present World War, for it has been possible for her to strengthen her military and strategic positions," said Dr. Raymond Fisher in an address before the Arcata Women's Club on International day, Monday, November 20.

So far World War II has not followed the lines of World War I. This is due to Russia's changed diplomatic position and the changes made by France and Germany in their defenses against invasion. Dr. Fisher pointed out that despite the fact that Russia covers one-seventh of the land surface of the world, it is a land-locked state, possessing only warm water outlets on closed seas. Russia seeks to dominate and control a part or all of the seas. The war has enabled her to acquire domination of her northern Baltic and to block Hitler from further eastward expansion into the Russian Ukraine. By sharing in the conquest and partition of Poland, Stalin has placed an effective barrier across Germany's path through Poland to the Ukraine and to Rumania, whose oil Germany needs badly. Germany has to accept Russia gains because her hands are tied by the war in the west.

The existence of two strongly fortified lines, the Maginot Line and the West Wall has produced a military stalemate. Dr. Fisher continued, since neither side is yet willing to risk the human slaughter involved in attacking either line. Instead the war has become

more immediately than in the last war, an economic endurance test.

No one can predict the outcome with certainty. At present the odds favor France and Great Britain.

Czech disturbances point to discontent within Germany. Russia will probably not provide Germany with enough materials to win the war, but may send enough to protract it and so exhaust both sides, hoping thereby to prepare the way for the establishment of communism in Europe. Whatever the military outcome, economically and socially, Europe and the rest of the world too, will experience some profound and far-reaching changes if this war continues for any length of time, Dr. Fisher said in conclusion.

"Rising high in the region of Shasta, flowing 320 miles through forests, vineyards, and fertile farm lands, merging eventually with the blue Pacific by the Golden Gate, the Sacramento is a river of a thousand tales for history came latest and ran fastest along its banks," reads the introduction to the new book on the rental shelf in the library entitled "Sacramento, the River of Gold."

This book deals with the life of early California and its founders, with John Sutter and his dream of golden wheat fields, and with John Marshall and the discovery of gold.

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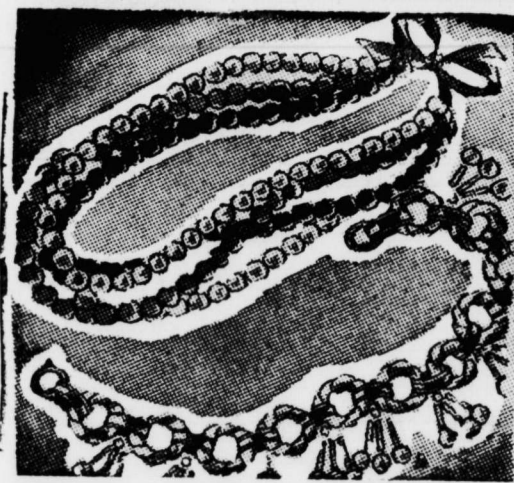
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
