Two Full Teams Used By Humboldt In Defeating S. F.

The Humboldt State College football squad used a two-unit system in defeating San Francisco State College by a 19 to 0 score Saturday night at Albee Stadium; that is two complete teams were used on the field against the invaders for the first time in the history of the college.

All the scoring by Humboldt was done in the first half of the game. San Francisco State was hampered by injuries which hit the team before the Humboldt game.

A pass from Edsall to Cady scored an early touchdown. This touchdown pass-play came after a march down the field with Edsall and Brown carrying the ball.

A quick kick by Longholm early in the second quarter which went for fifty-five yards to the San Francisco State three-yard line set the stage for the second touchdown. A poor punt by Lowrie of the invaders went out of bounds on the twelve-yard line, and two plays later Longholm tore through tackle for the touchdown.

The final touchdown was scored by a pass over the goal line from Lee to Givins after the invaders had held Humboldt without a gain three times on the one-yard line, Eaton converted.

San Francisco State threatened once when Machi threw a long pass to Meller which went to the one-yard line. This threat was ended by Loy Montgomery, Humboldt lineman, who threw Holmgren, S. F. back, for a seven-yard loss.

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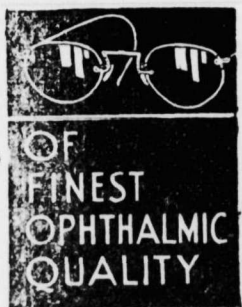
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State 'Jinx' Story In Woodland Paper

The trip of the Humboldt State football team to play the Cal Aggies recently has resulted in considerable publicity for the school, even though the Lumberjacks did take the short end of the score.

Bob Madsen, graduate manager, had sent publicity to the Daily Democrat at Woodland, where the team stayed some eight miles from Davis. Upon arriving in Woodland Madsen went to call on the Democrat force and was asked to write a story about Humboldt.

The Democrat published the story Saturday on the sports page in black-face type and gave Madsen a "by-line" as it is called in newspaper circles; that is, there was prefixed to the story the statement: "By Bob Madsen, graduate manager Humboldt State College."

The story, which was headed: "Jinx Hounds State In Trip Here" was as follows:

"Hampered by Friday the 13th, the Humboldt State Varsity football team arrived last night at Hotel Woodland five hours late. The first 'unlucky break' for the Humboldt squad arrived in Willits for lunch when part of the menu ordered was incorrect.

"Second mishap came when 'Bus' Foster, 210-pound tackle, received a slight eye injury when a piece of flying glass became lodged in his eye. A window in the chartered bus was broken when a squad member slammed the door.

"A few minutes later the bus broke down when a connecting rod burned out at Upper Lake. Unable to find parts or experienced mechanics, the char-

Fiction books are not numbered but have a letter "x" on cards and on back of books followed by author number.

Two Practicum Students Making Primitive Musical Instruments

Each member of Miss Helen M. Garvin's practicum-in-music class at Humboldt State has chosen a special project to work on for the elementary school pupils.

Two students, Virginia Vincent and Harold Jenkins, have chosen the making of primitive musical instruments as their project. The two practicum students have been teaching about thirteen elementary pupils the methods of making simple home-made bamboo flutes.

These are the directions which they are following.

First, find a straight hollow reed, or a piece of bamboo about twenty to thirty inches long. This bamboo can be secured at some furniture store. If possible, cut the bamboo so there is a joint at one end. Next, push out, or burn out with a red hot poker, all the joints except the end one. Do not push this one out unless it is necessary in order to push out the other points. If this joint must be removed, plug the hole tightly with a piece of cork after the other joints have been removed.

Then, at a distance of about the diameter of the tube from the cork or joint, bore or burn a hole through the tube. This hole should be a little smaller across than the diameter of the reed. This hole is the mouthpiece. Smooth and straighten the walls of the hole. The tone derived when air is blown through this hole is the lowest note and is known as "the fundamental note" of the tube.

Next, about one-eighth of the tube's length from the outer end, bore or burn a straight round hole through the wall of the tube. Open and close the hole as you play and see if the tone, when the hole is open is number two of the scale. If the note is too high, fill the hole with wax or paraffin and bore another hole lower down. If that does not make it high enough,

plug it up with wax and burn another hole.

When the hole for number two is placed right, make a hole for number three, leaving about as much space between the holes as there is between the first hole and the end. When you have two holes properly placed, you can play three-note tunes. Other holes may be added, but as a rule, three or four holes are all that are necessary in these simple flutes. There are many good three, four, and five-note tunes which are suited to them.

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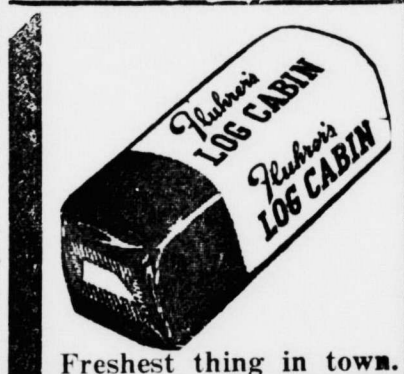
