'Dorm' Contract To Be Awarded By November 1

Contract for the new \$195,000 Humboldt State College dormitory and commons will be let November 1 and construction will start soon after that. President Arthur S. Gist of Humboldt State College announced today.

Plans and specifications were submitted to bidders September 22. All bids must be in by October 17.

Construction time for the new building will be 180 days, marking completion about July 15, 1940.

The new commons section will have a seating capacity of from seventy-five to eighty people. Equipment in the commons and kitchen will be the most modern available. No definite plans have been made for the removal of the old commons, but the space there is to be the site of a science building when funds for its construction are available.

The women's wing of the new dormitory will extend up Sequoia Street to the north and the men's wing will extend from the commons along Plaza avenue to the east. The dormitory will be provided with quarters for the women's advisor in the women's wing and with quarters for a men's advisor in the men's unit.

YOUNG SELECTED FOR INTERPRETERS' COURSE

During his vacation from the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis, Lloyd Young, a former Humboldt State student, visited the Humboldt campus last week. He has been chosen as one of the twenty students out of four hundred and fifty, to take a special French speech course which will train him to become an interpreter. STATE MEN SURVEYING H. S. C. ATHLETIC FIELD

Three engineers from the state architect's office are making a re-survey of the athletic field behind the college. After they have completed their work, the state architect office will draw the plans for its final completion. If possible, the work will be partially completed with W. P. A. assistance.

Plans include football practice and baseball fields, a parking space on the upper level by the gymnasium, a sodded and drained playing field, bleachers for 4,000 persons and a steel fence around the entire field.

Humboldt Defeats Linfield College In Opening Game

The Humboldt State College football team staged a brilliant aerial attack in the final minutes of play to come from behind to defeat Linfield College 12 to 7 before 2,000 fans in the opening game Friday night at Albee Stadium.

For a while it looked as if Humboldt would lose their first game of the season until they started a fifty-yard drive of passing and running plays with but ten minutes left to play.

Linfield was leading 7 to 6, and the ball was in Humboldt's possession on their own twenty-six yard line. Longholm shot a ninety-yard pass to Edsall to start the drive. Edsall went over for a first down on the next play. Longholm again passed to Edsall for a gain of 15 yards. In the next pass attempt, Longholm was spilled for a ten-yard loss, but was successful in getting off two more passes, one to Ellis who carried the ball down the field twenty yards to Linfield's twenty-yard line.

On an end run, Longholm picked up nine yards. Edsall made a first down, and then tossed a flat pass

The subject "Organized Labor in the U. S." has been chosen by Dr. Homer Balabanis for his winter series of Humboldt College extension lectures. These lectures will be open to both credit students and auditors and will carry two units of credit.

In his discussions Dr. Balabanis will analyze the structure and functions of labor unions, deal with the relations between employer and employee, and discuss government mediation in labor troubles.

This class will meet in the Eureka Senior High School on Tuesday evening.

The course will consist of fifteen two-hour lectures, and will carry the regulation state fee of \$10.

When the California State Polytechnic Mustangs meet Humboldt Saturday night at Albee stadium, they will have a line averaging 184 pounds and a backfield averaging 166 pounds.

This estimate is based on the starting line-up that the Mustangs used last week when they defeated the California Institute of Technology team, which was as follows:

The Mustangs are said to have several good passers and receivers and are using a more open style of play than in previous years.

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New Rental Books Proving Popular

Four new rental books which arrived in the college library last week, have been in constant circulation since the day they first appeared on the rental shelf.

A brief statement of the contents of each of the new books follows:

"Black Narcissus" is a novel by Rumer Goddin. It has much of the same mystic magic as "Lost Horizon."

In "The Chiffon Scarf" Mignon C. Eberhart has created an atmosphere tense and electric, with the same quality for the eerie which has made her novels famous.

"Children of God" by Vardis Fisher was the winner of the Harper Novel Contest, 1939. With vivid reality and gustiness, the author creates his story of the magnificent dramatic and fantastic chapter of American history in which the Mormons built a western empire.

In "Not Peace But Sword" Vincent Sheehan combines literary genius and historical sense in writing this book about the notorious year, March 1938 to March 1939. The international turmoil is graphically presented on the pages, pounded out at white heat.

John Van Duzer will act as technical director.


