The regular college A Cappella Choir and Arcata High's A Cappella Choir. The college Little Symphony Orchestra of forty-five members completes the group of approximately two hundred students which will present tonight's concert at 8 p. m. in the Big Gymnasium.

Estimated to last an hour and a half, the concert will include the "Song of Faith," by John Alden Carpenter, and "Ballad For Americans" by John La Touche and Earl Robinson, both to be sung by the entire chorus. Mr. Joel Carter, baritone, of Stanford University will be soloist. Mr. Carter appeared at Humboldt State in 1939 as one of the featured soloists in the "Elijah." He has also been featured in the "Ballad For Americans" in both San Jose and Palo Alto. Dr. Garff Wilson, director of Humboldt's Drama department, will do the spoken parts in the "Song of Faith."

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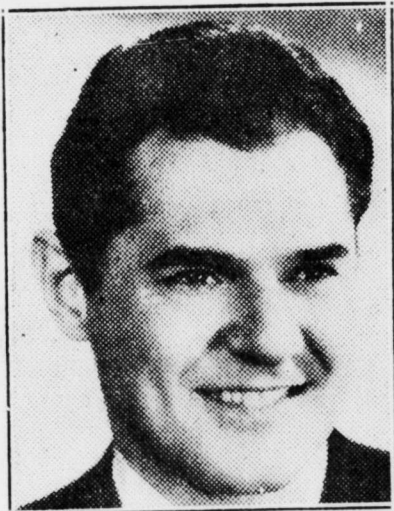
Glen Gray's Casa Loma Orchestra Appears May 4

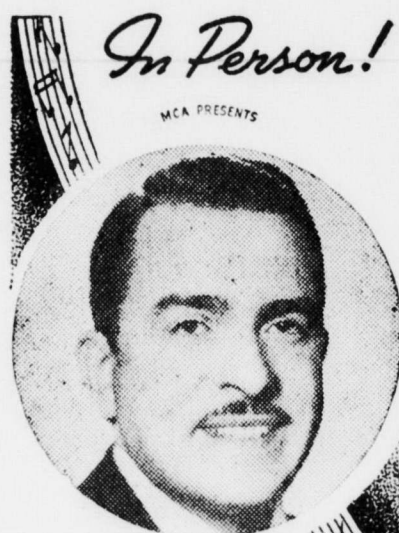
The band has introduced several famous compositions among the recent ones, "No Name Jive" and "Sunrise Serenade." Many of the

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President Gist, Fred Telonicher Speak At Banquet

Dedication of the game bird unit took place at Humboldt State College last Friday evening, April 25. William Spengler, president of the Redwood Council of Fish and Game Clubs, presided at the meeting which followed the 7 o'clock banquet in Nelson Hall.

Speakers of the evening were August Bade and William Avise of the State Game Farm at Yountville, President Arthur S. Gist of Humboldt State, and Fred Telonicher, instructor for the game bird class. Avise stated that Humboldt State is the first college in the United States to have both a game bird program and a fish hatchery in connection with their game management courses.

Interesting Letter From Phillipines

An interesting letter has been received by President Gist from a former Humboldt student, who is now teaching in the Phillipines. To quote from it in part:

Otton, Iloilo,
Phillippines, March 2, 1941

Sir:
I am a graduate of the Humboldt State Teachers College in the year 1925. Since I returned to the Phillipines in 1926, I was employed in the Bureau of Education, Phillipines, as a Supervising Teacher, now called "District Supervisor" in a big sized school district, having 140 school teachers, with two Elementary School Principals, and a head teacher for every school, and little over five thousand school children enrollment. I found no difficulty in controlling the teachers and pupils in my district. Being an administrator of the school, I have to deal mostly with the officials of the districts or towns. I am proud to say that what I learned from Humboldt helped me a great deal in my work.

HSC Prof., Student Pilot, Fly To San Francisco

At two o'clock last Friday afternoon, April 25, Herb Gomes, Humboldt State College senior, and George Murphy, faculty member, took off in a plane at the Eureka Airport and flew to San Francisco where Mr. Murphy attended the conference of the California State Association of English Teachers.

**Election Rules
Announced By
Executive Council**

The elective offices of the Associated Student of Humboldt State are: president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, and six members of the Board of Control. Following are the regulations governing the election of students to these offices:

Candidates for any student body office must have completed not less than thirty-two semester hours of work by the end of the semester in which the election is held.

No student can be a candidate for election to a student body office or for appointment by the Executive Council to an office who, at the time of such election or appointment, is on probation.

The nomination of officers shall be by signed petition of twenty-five members of the student body. Petitions for nominations shall be filed with the Executive Council not less than one week, nor more than three weeks prior to the primary elections, during which time a notice to the effect that nominations are in order shall be posted on the official bulletin board, and published in the Lumberjack, together with (1) a copy of this section, (2) a list of the officers to be nominated, (3) and the date of the primary election.

No student may sign more than one petition for each office, except for the office of Board of Control member, for which petitions may be signed for three men and three women.

There shall be two elections, primary and final. The primary election shall be held at least one week before the last student body meeting of the year; the final election shall be held three school days after the primary election. Candidates who receive the majority of the total votes cast at the primary election shall be declared elected. The ballot for the final election shall contain the names of the two candidates receiving the highest votes except in those cases where the candidate has been elected in the primary election.

Mr. Griffith came to Humboldt in 1939 from Riverside Junior College, where he was head of the Physical Education department.

As Director of Athletics, Mr. Griffith will be official athletic representative for the college, and will also plan the athletic program for both intramural and inter-collegiate sports. The athletic budget, facilities, and equipment will be under his direction. He will in addition, have many other duties which the position demands.
