### FACULTY POLL SHOWS ALMOST 100 PER CENT SUPPORT OF PRESENT FOREIGN POLICY

An even 90 per cent of the faculty of Humboldt State College went on record this week as supporting the foreign policies of President Roosevelt, according to Dr. Raymond Fisher, chairman of the committee which formulated the poll question.

The question was worded: "Do you support the foreign policies of our government in the measures which are being taken against the Axis powers?"

Further emphasis of this outstanding majority in favor of the question was added when the tabulation of the only three dissenting votes revealed that the answers did not disagree with our present foreign policy, but were simply "Uncertain." There were thirty ballots cast.

With the rising campus interest in the national emergency becoming more evident daily, President Arthur Gist decided to try a preliminary poll of faculty opinion. Dr. Fisher was appointed to frame the question and tabulate faculty reaction. The release of this faculty poll was timed for the day before the student debate forum tomorrow on the vital question of "Should the United States Declare War Now on the Axis Powers?"

This debate is being sponsored by the college social science and speech departments, under the direction of Dr. Raymond Fisher. How closely faculty opinion parallels student sentiment is a question which only tomorrow's assembly forum can answer.

### STUDENT OPEN DEBATE FORUM TOMORROW

The vital question to be answered by a Student Forum at tomorrow's Student Body meeting will be "Shall the United States Declare War on the Axis Powers Now?" After the debate by Hazel Hagne, Charlie Moore and Jack Sutherland, there will be an open discussion by the assembly.

This forum falls at a precipitous moment in the state of world affairs. Interest is high concerning the topic to be discussed, and heated debate is anticipated during the meeting. Dr. Fisher has announced that interventionist and isolationist views alike will be solicited.

### Junior Class Elects Officers

The Junior Class held a second meeting immediately following the assembly on Thursday. Vivienne Nelson, former vice-president, presided over the meeting until Stan Pedley was elected president. Howard Goodwin was elected vice-president.

### Jeffers Chooses Familiar Soloists For Coffee Cantata

Edmund V. Jeffers of the Music Department at Humboldt College has announced the selection of Mrs. Carla Petersen Butler, soprano from Los Angeles, Joe Carter, San Jose bass, and Ed Ruud, tenor from Fortuna, as soloists in "The Coffee Cantata" of Bach to be presented in the Presbyterian Church of Eureka by musical organizations from the college.

Joel Carter is best remembered in Humboldt for his lead part in the "Ballad for Americans," which was presented at Humboldt State last Spring. He has been featured in performances of "The Mikado," "The Chocolate Soldier" and other light operas in San Francisco and the bay region. He has often sung the bass solo in the "Messiah," the "Elijah," and numerous others oratorios and cantatas. Mr. Carter has also been soloist in the churches in San Jose, Oakland, and the Stanford Memorial Chapel.

#### PAST HONORS

Mrs. Butler began her career as a singer at Humboldt State, where she sang leads in "Carmen," "Faust," and the "Messiah." In 1935-36 she won two consecutive scholarships in voice from the Federated Women's Clubs of Humboldt.

Composers, lyric writers, publicity and continuity writers will

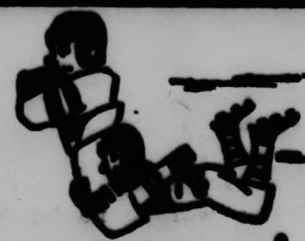
have a chance to have their work used. There is also needed many student managers and directors, and clerical help of all kinds.

## Fulkersons To Present Joint Piano and Cello Recital December 16

Mr. and Mrs. Charles Fulkerson will present the first in a series of Faculty and Student Recitals in the college auditorium Tuesday evening, December 16th. They will be heard in a joint recital of piano and cello selections.

Mrs. Fulkerson is a graduate of San Jose State College, where she appeared in many chamber music concerts and solo recitals. She played in the San Jose State Symphony Orchestra, appearing as soloist in her senior year. She studied with Michel Panha, formerly first cellist for the Philadelphia Symphony, and at present is studying with Wellem Dehe, principal cellist of the San Francisco Symphony.

For the past eight years she played in the orchestra of the famous Carmel Bach Festival. Another of her outstanding experiences was her work in chamber music with Ferenc Molnar at Stanford University.

### FORMER HSC STUDENT

Mr. Fulkerson transferred from Humboldt State College in 1930 to San Jose State, where he studied piano with the late Tamara Morgan. At present he is a student of Benning Dexter, graduate of Juilliard. He appeared on several recitals, and was soloist with the chamber music ensemble which was heard last May over NBC. This summer in Carmel he was one of the piano soloists for the Bach Festival.

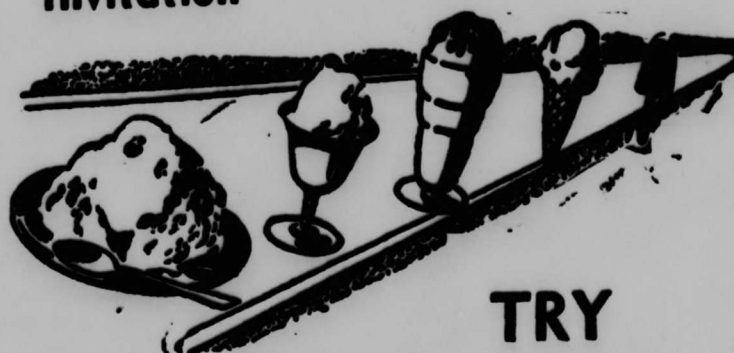

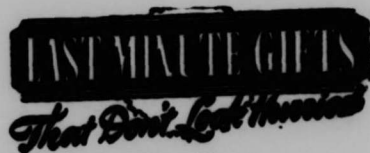
