The choir will leave the college by bus on either the 3rd or 4th of April, and will sing at South Fork, Willits, Ukiah, and other high school on the way. They will give one performance in a San Francisco church, and also plan to visit certain Art Galleries during their week-end in the city.

The Promenade Concert will mark the choir's appearance Monday afternoon in San Jose. They will return to Humboldt Tuesday, April 8.

1941 FOOTBALL SCHEDULE SET

The official schedule for Humboldt State College's 1941 season has been released by the executive council. Games on the schedule include three Far Western Conference games—Chico State, Cal Aggies, and College of Pacific—plus four other contests.

In 1941, Humboldt will be a regular conference member in football and will be eligible for the championship. The schedule is as follows:

September 27—S. F. State here; October 4—Open; October 11—Cal Aggies, there; October 18—Chico State, here; October 26 (Sunday) Santa Clara Frosh, here; November 1—College of Pacific, there; November 8—Cal Poly, there; November 14—Compton J. C., here.

Humboldt will be meeting College of Pacific and Compton Junior College for the first time in the school's history. The open date on October 4 may possibly be filled before the season begins, but may remain open.

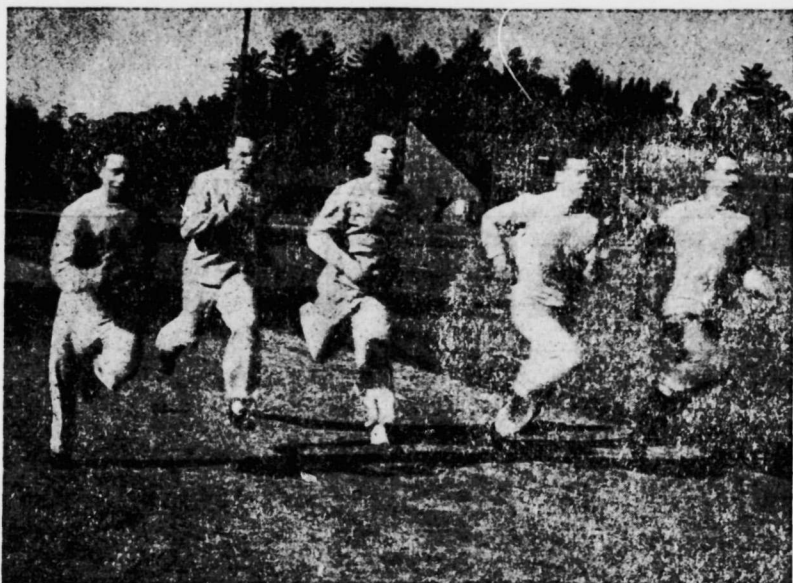

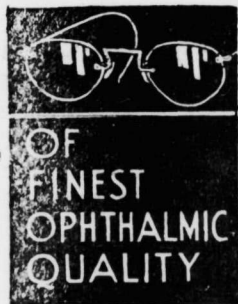

For years the associated students of Humboldt State College have been curiously lax in regard to one matter which would seem to be vitally important. We refer to the various major proposals which come up before the student body every year. For the most part, these proposals have been quietly and quickly passed by the unanimous vote of strangely trusting students.

We do not advocate opposition for its own sake, or any opposition which cannot be justified. However, there is certainly room for more discussion of amendments to the student body constitution and any other proposals that directly affect the associated students.

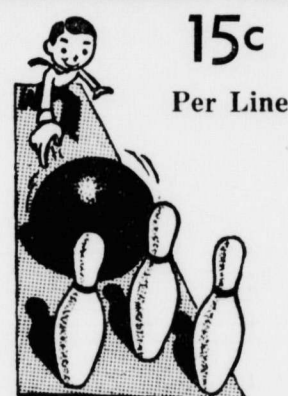
