ELECTION PRIMARIES TOMORROW

W.A.A. SPORTS DAY TO BE HELD TODAY

One of the major sports activities of the year will be held today when Humboldt State Women participate in the Women's Athletic Association Individual Sports Day. Golf, Archery, Tennis and Badminton finals will also be played off today, in advance of the main Individual Sports events. Spectators are invited.

NEW FINALS REGULATIONS EXPLAINED

A committee for reviewing practices associated with the giving of final examinations at Humboldt State College recommended to the faculty that no tests, reports, or extra work be given to students during the week immediately preceding the beginning of final examinations. Also included was the suggestion that all term papers or reports of any sort be made due at least one week before the beginning of final examinations.

The intention was to make it possible for students to begin to devote spare time to reviewing for finals a little earlier than is customarily done, and to make it possible for faculty members to have papers corrected earlier; thus speeding up the reporting of student grades. In short, the effect should be a "clear the deck" practice. The above recommendations were approved by the faculty and will be in effect for the current semester.

Another recommendation of the committee was that the faculty consider the advisability of giving examinations of three hours duration in courses given for more

than three units. When put in the form of a motion, this recommendation was amended to include all three unit courses in the three-hour-final group. The motion was passed as amended. Hence, all examinations in courses given for three or more units will be scheduled for three hours. The group favoring passage of the latter regulation argued that examinations on a two hour basis crowd students to too great a degree, and that the longer period would give students more time. Practically all members of the faculty expressed themselves as feeling that a two-hour examination is of sufficient length. This indicates that the actual examinations will not be longer than heretofore, but that students will have more time to work on the examinations and a little longer rest period between examinations.

The committee was appointed by President Gist and was composed of Myrtle McKittrick, Dr. Garff Bell Wilson, and Fred Telonicher.

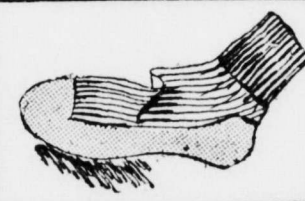
