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## Music Club Recital Tomorrow

### FINAL STUDENT BODY MEETING WILL FEATURE INSTALLATION OF 1941-1942 OFFICERS

Forrest Waters, popular sophomore student, will be installed tomorrow as president of the Associated Students of Humboldt State College for 1941-1942 by Milton Villa, out-going prexy, at the last regular student body meeting of the year. Waters was elected last Thursday in the primary election, defeating Chan Jenkins, the only other candidate for the office.

Tom Hansen will succeed Clarence Edsall at the vice-presidential post; Warren Elmore will succeed Rosie Ivancich as secretary; Milton Carlson takes over the position of treasurer, succeeding Herman Jones.

Humor enters in with the fact that Tom Hansen was temporarily appointed (having been duly sworn in with witnesses, etc.) treasurer by Milton Villa last Tuesday, May 13, to replace Herman Jones, whose resignation was accepted by the Executive Council last week. Hasen is treasurer now (serving a term of 9 days). He will (as promptly as he began them) cease such duties, May 22, when he is installed as vice-president of the student body. Milton Carlson, upon his installation will then act as treasurer for the duration of the semester.

The three women who were elected in the primary last Tuesday by a safe majority are: Dorothy Hunt, Barbara Bird, and Rosie Ivancich. Twelve men ran for the 3 board of Control offices, and only James Cady carried a majority in the primary. In the final election, held yesterday, Clarke Nellist, Fred Slack and Richard Tinkey ran for the two

The Student Body meeting will be held at 11 a. m. in the College auditorium. At this time, the revised Student Body constitution will be voted on.

### HSC SUMMER SESSION WILL FEATURE NEW COURSES

Beginning June sixteenth the Humboldt State College Summer session will be open to students. The visiting faculty will be completely new except for Mrs. Nene Pinkerton who has had education classes here before. Harry Griffith will be teaching Summer Session P. E. for the first time at Humboldt.

Nelson Hall will facilitate living problems for those who attend summer session as residents.

Due to efforts of President Gist, Maxine Biology at Humboldt has made steady progress and this course will be among the many interesting ones this summer.

For the first time in 20 years "Pop" Jenkins will not be on the summer faculty.

The Aviation course will also be presented in the same standing as the winter course.

Some of the new subjects to be offered are: ART IN THE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL; CONTEMPORARY LITERATURE; HISTORY AND PRINCIPLES OF P. E.; THE U. S. AND THE ORIENT; CURRENT PROBLEMS OF THE U. S.; and ECONOMICS OF CONSUMPTION, which will be of special interest to those in Home Economics and pre-secondary commerce.

Stan Pedley, assistant "Sempervirens" photographer, deserves a great deal of credit for the many hours he spent in the darkroom, enlarging prints and experimenting until the exact masthead proportions were decided on. The words "Humboldt State College in the Redwood Empire" were originally done in script, but it was later decided that all wording in the masthead should be done in the log printing used. # Humboldt Summer Session To Open June 16th

## SUMMER SESSION AT HSC TO FEATURE ALL NEW FACULTY

An entire change of instructional personnel from that of last summer session will characterize the 1941 session at Humboldt State College. President Arthur S. Gist will serve as director of the Summer's program again, but no member of last year's teaching faculty will be present this year.

Among the new instructors will be Dr. Floyd Franklin Caldwell, who is Associate Professor of Education at Chico State College. At Humboldt this summer he will be in charge of the demonstration school, and will teach classes in Elementary School Curriculum, Visual Education, and Educational Psychology. He will also hold conferences twice each week with those students who are taking the Curriculum Laboratory course.

The College feels extremely fortunate in obtaining the services of the superintendent of schools, J. Warren Ayer, who has arranged to teach one class, and of Mrs. Nene Pinkerton, supervisor of elementary education, who will conduct the demonstration school.

Mr. Ayer will offer a course in the "Professional Adjustment of the Teacher," which will be of special value to undergraduate

students working toward a teaching credential. The problems that confront a young teacher in his relationship to his classroom, the board of trustees, and the community will be analyzed and discussed.

Mrs. Pinkerton has selected as the theme for the Demonstration School which she will conduct in cooperation with the director Dr. Floyd Caldwell, "Let's Explore our Outdoor World."

Mrs. Pinkerton is a graduate of Humboldt State College, and has taken graduate work at the University of California.

Allen M. Ham, Arcata's versatile mayor, will be the instructor in history. Mr. Ham, who has been instructing the students of Arcata Union High School in U. S. history, civics, and social problems for twenty years, is well known to all Humboldters.

Mr. Ham is a veteran of the World War No. 1, with extended service in France and as a member of the Army of Occupation.

At Humboldt this summer, he will offer a course in Current History of the United States, and in the United States and the Orient. Mr. Ham will also teach a lower division course in Cultural and

### Regional Geography.

Craft work featured will include bookbinding, leather tooling, designing, block printing, stenciling and the making of reed and raffia mats and baskets. Mrs. Little has established a reputation as an artist and a skilled craftsman. She has also a thorough familiarity with the problems of teaching art in the public schools and offers work of distinctly practical character.

In the field of science, Dr. Doris Niles will offer courses in marine biology, ornamental plants, and natural science in the elementary school. According to President Gist, Humboldt's natural facilities have been pronounced the equal of any on the Pacific coast.

Dr. Garff Bell Wilson will offer an interesting course in Contemporary Literature, dipping into the fascinating reservoirs of modern fiction, poetry and drama to select some of the most representative or distinctive contributions. Dr. Wilson will also give a course in public speaking which will be open to lower division students as well as to upper division or graduate students.

Harry Griffith will be charge of the classes in physical education. He will give a course in the history and principles of physical education, which is required of all candidates for the special secondary credential in physical education. It has not previously been offered in summer session.

When summer session opens on June 16th at Humboldt State College, another one of the visiting instructors will be Dr. Marvin M. Peterson, professor of economics at Miami University of Oxford, Ohio. Dr. Peterson, comes to Humboldt under an exchange arrangement for the summer with Dr. Homer P. Balabanis, vice-president and professor of economics at Humboldt State, who will go to Oxford to teach in the Miami summer term.

A stranger to Humboldt State College, but no stranger to educators in Southern California is Fred M. Tonge, district superintendent of school in National City, Mr. Tonge will offer courses in School Administration, and Supervision Educational measurements, and State and County School Administration, drawing largely upon his varied and extended experiences as a teacher and a successful administrator.

Summer session will open on June 16th and close July 25th. The fee for the six weeks period is twenty dollars tuition. Nelson hall will be opened if present plans materialize, and reservations for rooms should be made as soon as possible with Mrs. Jessie T. Woodcock, financial secretary.

Every effort will be made to have the spirit of fiesta prevail. The benefits of such a spirit are stimulated participation, and this summer's recreation will be no exception.

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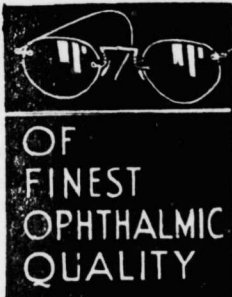
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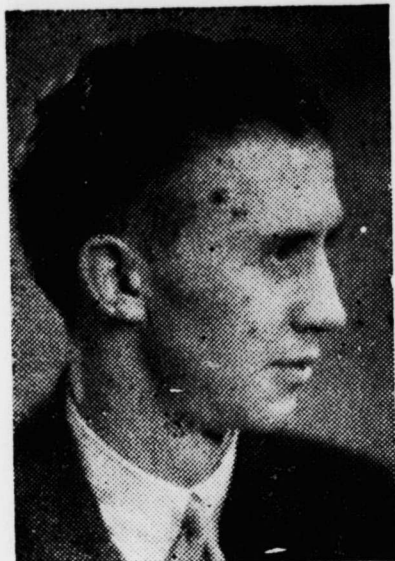
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## DR. G. B. WILSON CLIMAXES HIGHLY SUCCESSFUL YEAR OF DRAMA AT HUMBOLDT STATE

With the return to Humboldt of Garff Bell Wilson, (now Dr. Wilson) in the fall of 1940 after two years' leave of absence spent in graduate study at Cornell University, the college drama department took on new life and went on to an unusually successful season.

First on the season's program was Clare Boothe's anti-Nazi melodrama, "Margin For Error." This play was featured by the appearance of four freshmen, who, after a year of experience, now seem well on their way toward ratings as Humboldt's best. They are Marella White, Zane Nichols, Clarke Nellist and Nancy Jo Birnie. "Margin For Error" was a standout production to open the year.

Second production of the season was an evening of three one-act plays which presented several new faces and an interesting night of varying plays.

The second major production of the season was Paul Osborn's "On Borrowed Time" which will take its place among the all-time "Great" shows produced at HSC. Starring was Richard Jarboe, who with his excellent performance as "Gramps" brought to a close an illustrious career in Humboldt drama. Along with Jarboe in "On Borrowed Time" were little Maurice Elmore of the College Ele-

mentary School, and Jack Sivert as "Mr. Brink." The whole cast was excellent, and gave local audiences the best play of the year, and one of the best in many years.

The season was brought to a close with the recent production of the gay comedy, "French Without Tears," which fitted the mood of the season so well that it was one of the year's favorites. The only out-and-out comedy of the season, "French Without Tears" was a timely selection for a closing production. The entire cast was more than capable, with no one standing out above the rest, and no one falling down in the least.

Credit must be given to John Van Duzer and his technical staff for their consistently good work in lighting and staging. Sets and lighting for all plays this year were never better. The outdoor scene in "On Borrowed Time" drew spontaneous applause from the public audience when the curtain was drawn on it for the first time.

## State Faces Lack Of Qualified Auditors Now

The state faces an acute situation in its lack of a sufficient number of qualified auditors and accountants according to a letter recently received by Mr. Bert F. Wilson, head of the Commerce department. A civil service examination for Auditor, Grade I and for Junior Accountant is to be held on June 21 in Eureka. The personnel board expects to place approximately 75 successful candidates. All applications must be from United States citizens and must be California residents for at least one year prior to application.

The position includes the less difficult technical accounting work in auditing state agencies, administering the state budgetary and accounting systems, or in maintaining a departmental accounting system.

For full information on how to secure application blanks, or any other points, contact Mr. Wilson, who has complete Civil Service information in his files. All bulletins are catalogued and filed according to desirability and date of examination.

Three Humboldt State professors will receive their Doctor's degrees this summer. Mr. James Hunter, who has been in residence only one semester, will receive his Ph. D. from the University of Syracuse, with a major in Philosophy. Mr. George Murphy, also in residence only one semester will receive his Ph. D. at Stanford University, with a major in English. Mr. Edmund V. Jeffers, who returned to Humboldt this past year after two years of graduate study at Columbia University, will return to Columbia this summer to receive his Ph. D. in Music Education.

Other faculty members who will continue studying for their doctor's degree include Mrs. Ellen J. Walter, University of Chicago, Mr. Fred Telonicher, Stanford University. Mrs. Walter is working for a degree in Home Economics and Mr. Telonicher is seeking his in biological sciences. John Van Duzer will attend U. S. C. where he will receive his masters degree

Miss Helen Connick of Eureka, a member of the 1939 class at Humboldt State College, will teach at the Freshwater School next year. For the past two years Miss Connick has taught at the Willow Creek school.

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## Amadeo Sandretto Eligible For Naval Air Corps

Amedeo Sandretto, student at Humboldt State College received a letter from the Naval Air Corp, to the effect that he was eligible to start training at Oakland soon and then go to Pensacola. He will be a ensign when he completes six months training at Pensacola.

This training presents an exceptional opportunity for young men who are interested in aviation. Three years after graduation from Pensacola, the student is promoted to Lieutenant (junior grade).

The training consists of actual flight training in all types of Naval aircraft, both single and multi-engined land and sea planes. The ground training consists of a thorough course in navigation, radio, engines, and airplanes structure. During this active duty these young men receive the full pay and allowances of their rank.

### Compensation and Benefits

While undergoing this training at Pensacola, the cadet is paid \$105.00 per month and supplied with uniforms, quarters, and books. After graduation and during the period of active duty he is paid the full pay and allowances of his rank as a commissioned officer, which for this period will range from \$245.00 to \$335.00 per month. During all this active duty, he is covered with government insurance. Upon graduation at Pensacola he is paid \$150. uniform gratuity. Upon completion of active duty these aviation officers are given a \$500.00 cash bonus. They retain their commissioned officer status in the Naval Reserve with subsequent promotion to higher grades.

### ORNITHOLOGY CLASS COMPLETES PROJECTS

Students of the Ornithology class, under the direction of Fred Telonicher, have completed projects for the semester. These projects consisted of the preparation of bird skeletons and skins. The class has made numerous trips to points in the vicinity of Humboldt State College in order to study birds of the forest, fields, streams, and marshes.

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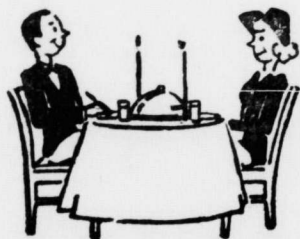

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## CONSTITUTION TO BE VOTED ON TOMORROW

Concerning the completely revised student body constitution, the Executive Council of the Associated Students has made the following statement:

(Quote): "For the past several weeks the Executive Council has been working diligently to revise the old student body constitution and by-laws which were enacted many years ago.

The extensive revision has been necessitated by the growth of our student enrollment, the increase in the number and importance of student activities, and the delegation of more self-government to the student body. The result is the present Constitution and by-laws, the passage of which is recommended by the executive council.

It is your duty as a citizen of our college democracy which we call the Associated Students, to study this Constitution and to come, prepared to vote on it, at the student body assembly Thursday. Approval by a two-third majority will put this Constitution and by-laws into effect.

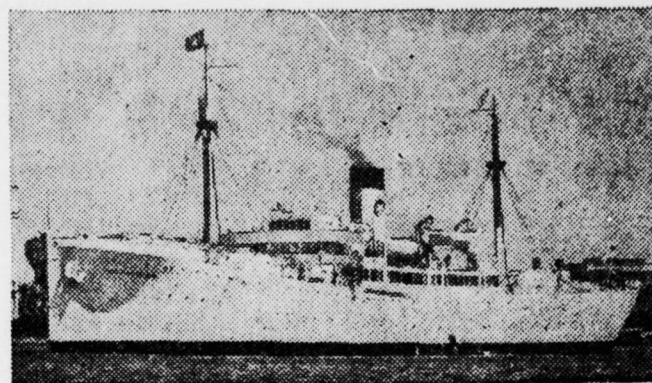
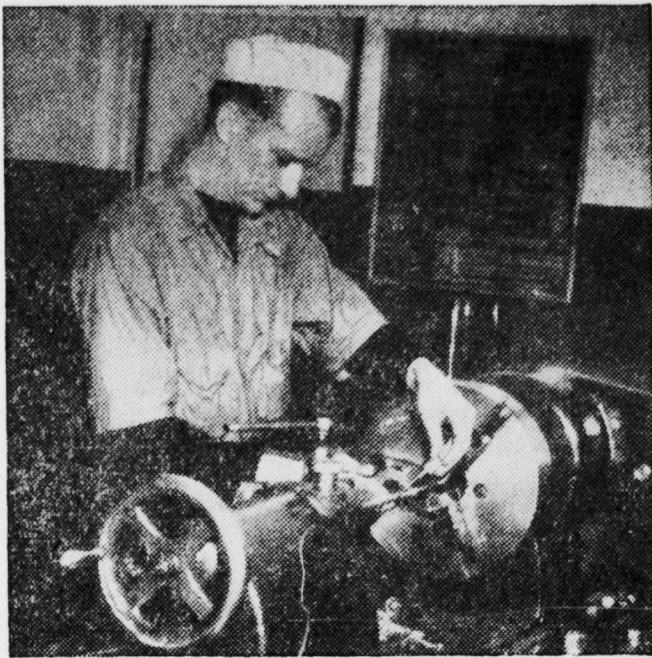
## U. S. TRAINS YOUTHS FOR SEA

Young American citizens in good physical condition 18 to 23 years of age are being enrolled for a seven months' course of instruction in the duties of the deck, engineers, and stewards departments. Enrollees are paid \$21.00 monthly; clothing, food, and quarters are furnished by the Government.

The training course qualifies these young men for jobs on American merchant vessels where pay starts at \$72.50 a month with food and quarters furnished.

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## Richard Jarboe, Veteran Thespian, Graduates June 6

With the graduation of Richard Jarboe this semester, Humboldt will lose its most faithful participant in dramatics. Jarboe's name has been synonymous with drama at Humboldt since the fall of 1935, when he entered HSC fresh from Arcata High School, and since then he has been Humboldt's most active thespian.

Jarboe's first major role was in "The Last of Mrs. Cheyney," the first play of the 1935-36 season, and with this play, he began a string of performances long to be remembered by local theatergoers. Next came "Outward Bound" and then in order, "The Tavern," "The Taming of the Shrew," "See Naples and Die,"

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For a year and a half in 1938 and 1939, he was absent from Humboldt while attending the University of California, and his absence from the drama department was felt keenly by students and the public alike.

His most unforgettable performances were as "Gramps" in "On Borrowed Time" this year, and as "The Vagabond" in "The Tavern." These two were his largest roles and were widely varying. Other outstanding characterizations were in "The Petrified Forest," "Outward Bound," "The Bishop Misbehaves," and "Sun-Up."

In addition to his acting, Jarboe has also been one of the most faithful of John Van Duzer's workshop crew. Even when acting in a play, he always found time to do carpenter work, painting or other of the numerous tasks in the production department. Always willing to cooperate, he was never heard to give disapproval of anything undertaken by his director.

The loss of Jarboe by graduation will be a loss felt by the students, the faculty, and especially Dr. Garff Bell Wilson, director of drama, and John Van Duzer, workshop and technical director. It will be a long time, if ever, until Humboldt State College and local paygoers forget him and his work in dramatics.

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
