## MILLION DOLLAR BUILDING PROGRAM PLANNED FOR HSC AFTER PRESENT WAR CRISIS

A building program for Humboldt State costing approximately \$1,000,000 is being planned by President Arthur Gist to be submitted to the State Planning Board. This board is the central-clearing house for the state public works program that is expected to develop after the war crisis is over.

Purpose of the planning board is:

1—To provide Public Work Reserves with a list of needed State projects which may be drawn upon if necessary to cushion effects of a post-emergency depression, and—  
2—To prepare an orderly, 10-year State public works plan for the use of the Governor, the legislature and other State officials in the determination of State policies. The State Planning Board is being assisted by the Public Work Reserve, a new Federal agency sponsored jointly by the Federal Works Agency and the National Resources Planning Board. The Board has undertaken the project at the request of Governor Culbert L. Olsen.

### 1941-43 BUDGET

Included in the 1941-43 biennium budget is an appropriation of \$315,675 for administrative expenses, and \$846,450 for construction work at Humboldt State College.

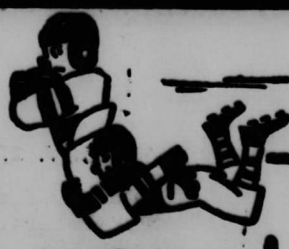

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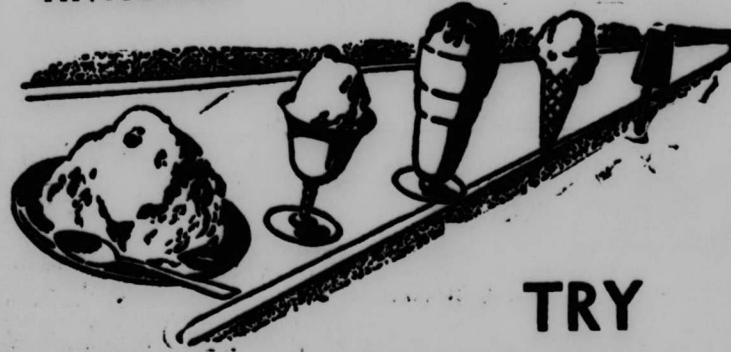
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
