Men's Association To Sponsor Dance After Chico Game

Pezzotti Resigns As 'Sempervirens' Editor; Job Open

FORREST WATERS LEAVES SCHOOL

The Executive Council accepted Monday the resignation of student body president Forrest "Doughnut" Waters, popular Humboldt junior. Waters was forced to resign the presidency in order to assume his new duties as a Humboldt county deputy sheriff. His promotion last week to the new position follows several months' work as a special traffic officer in the Eureka Police Department. It is in line with the type of work he intends to follow.

HANSEN NEW PRESIDENT

As vice-president of the student body, Tom Hansen automatically becomes student body president upon Waters' resignation. A new vice-president will be appointed at an early date. The vice-president heads the Board of Control, and several students are being considered at present by the council.

The news of Waters' leaving school has been received with surprise and regret on the part of the student body. He was acknowledged an able, popular president and an enthusiastic leader in campus affairs.

His widely varied career at Humboldt began when he was elected class president during his freshman year. Since then he has played Varsity football for 2 years (star halfback), was active in the Men's Association, member of the Executive Council, co-publisher of the Humboldt Gridiron, and student body president.

Sutherland Made Social Chairman

Jack Sutherland has been appointed Social Chairman of the year's campus events by the Executive Council. Any organizations wishing to schedule dances or other similar affairs should consult Sutherland. Any student body function must have the approval of the council before being announced.

The Lumberjacks, dumped last week by Cal Aggies 21-0, are determined to stop their two game losing streak and beat Chico. The Wildcats, one of Humboldt's oldest grid rivals, have yet to win a game this season.

GAELETS SWAMP LUMBERJACKS 35 TO 6

The big, fast St. Mary's gaelets swarmed over Humboldt State Sunday, October 5 by a score of 35 to 6.

From their first play when Norales stepped off 68 yards to a touchdown it was all St. Mary's. The Lone Lumberjack score came in the first quarter when Art McGrath, Star Humboldt End, caught Bill Lee's pass over the goal line while being crowded by two gaelets.
