A 24 yard pass to Jack Piersoll set the ball on the Wildcats 11 and in scoring territory. The scoring play was a pass, again by Lee, into the end-zone to Fred Iten, end.

A 50 yard drive into the fourth quarter netted 6 more points for the visitors. Satore and Novak led the last assault in the Humboldt territory, with Novak scoring from the 8 yard line.

Enrollment Climbs To 394; Decline Is Only 8 Per Cent

Humboldt's total enrollment to date has climbed to 394 students, making this semester's registration decline only a bare 8 per cent.

Freshmen (first and second semester combined) number 201; Sophomores, 95; Juniors, 50; only 38 seniors; three post grads; seven limiteds.

There are exactly the same number of new freshmen this year as last. The decline is mostly in the number of students who entered in January last year and completed less than the necessary number of units during the year to attain sophomore standing.

DECLINE IN UPPERCLASSMEN

There is a sharp decline in the number of senior and junior men. Thirty-three students make up the 8 per cent decline in total enrollment.

A further increase in enrollment is expected during the next three weeks. The ration of men to women is exactly the same as it was last year. The increase in freshmen offsets the decline in senior men. There's hope yet for the women.
